Operating Engineers Local 115 identifying workers for northern BC projects

Burnaby, BC. Local 115 of the International Union of Operating Engineers (IUOE) is launching a new website and an advertising campaign to identify skilled workers for major industrial and resource projects underway or proposed for northern BC.

Full Page ads are appearing in both the Alaska Highway News and the Prince George Citizen on November 6th to draw the attention of interested workers and to ask them to go to www.jobsfornorthernbc.ca where they can identify what sort of equipment they have operated and what opportunity is of interest to them.

“Site C, a \$9 billion project, is well underway,” says Brian Cochrane, Business Manager of IUOE Local 115, “and with all of the planned capital expenditures for construction projects including gas pipelines, LNG facilities, mines and investments in other major infrastructures, skilled operators will become in a much higher demand than the current market.”

“All of these projects will require skilled and experienced operators to run the equipment,” Cochrane says. “IUOE Local 115 has a proud reputation in BC for supplying some of the highest skilled operators to these types of projects. We know that with the projected demand we need to reach out to the broader labour market across BC. We want to make sure that British Columbians get access to these projects and be first in line to benefit from these major investments. We want to reach out to those who have the experience, are looking for work, and who would like to advance their careers with us.”

Cochrane says that his local and other affiliates of the BC Building Trades are concerned that too many jobs at Site C are, so far at least, going to contractors from Alberta and workers from outside BC.

“We’re all BC taxpayers,” he says. “We want to see BC projects, especially those like Site C which is being paid for by BC taxpayers, employ local people who will pay their taxes here, buy their groceries here, and send their kids to BC schools.”

“The first major contract for Site C, worth about \$60 million, went to an Alberta company. We think BC Hydro should do what it can to ensure that money stays in the province, and we think most British Columbians feel the same way.”

PRELIMINARY RESULTS – DOMESTIC SEWAGE RECEIVING FACILITY

On November 7, 2015 from 8:00 am to 8:00 pm (local time) the Peace River Regional District held a referendum in Electoral Areas B and C on the following question:

“Are you in favour of the Peace River Regional District Board adopting Domestic Sewage Receiving Facility Service Establishment Bylaw No. 2217, 2015 which will permit the Regional District to establish a domestic sewage receiving function at the Charlie Lake Sewer Treatment Plant for Electoral Areas B and C, at a maximum annual tax requisition limit that is the greater of \$500,000 (Five Hundred Thousand Dollars) or \$0.114 per \$1,000 calculated on the net taxable value of land and improvements and assessed on improvements only.”

PRELIMINARY RESULTS – POTABLE WATER SERVICE

On November 7, 2015 from 8:00 am to 8:00 pm (local time) the Peace River Regional District held a referendum in Electoral Areas B, C and D on the following question:

"Are you in favour of the Peace River Regional District Board adopting Potable Water Service Establishment Bylaw No. 2212, 2015 which will permit the Regional District to establish capital and operating reserve accounts to construct or upgrade potable water tank loader sites in various locations throughout Electoral Areas B, C and D at a maximum annual tax requisition limit that is the greater of \$2,000,000 (Two Million Dollars) or \$0.331 per \$1,000 calculated on the net taxable value of land and improvements and assessed on improvements only?"
