Hudson's Hope Gets Funding for Wastewater Facility Upgrades

Project approved under Canada's Small Communities Fund



Residents of Hudson's Hope will benefit from improvements to wastewater infrastructure thanks to joint funding from the governments of Canada and British Columbia through the Small Communities Fund.

This project will upgrade the wastewater facility in Hudson's Hope by adding an influent screen and truck waste receiving facility; an air diffusion system for two lagoon cells; deepening and lining two lagoon cells; the construction of a new blower building and aeration system; and related electrical and control systems. When completed, the plant will have a capacity to better treat an increased volume of wastewater before releasing it back into the natural environment..

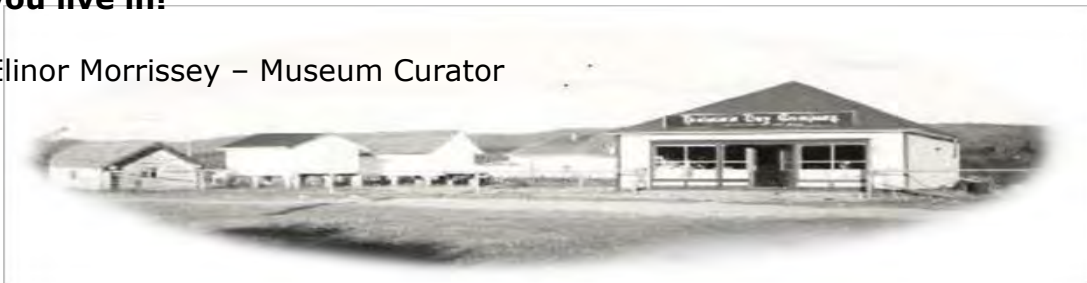

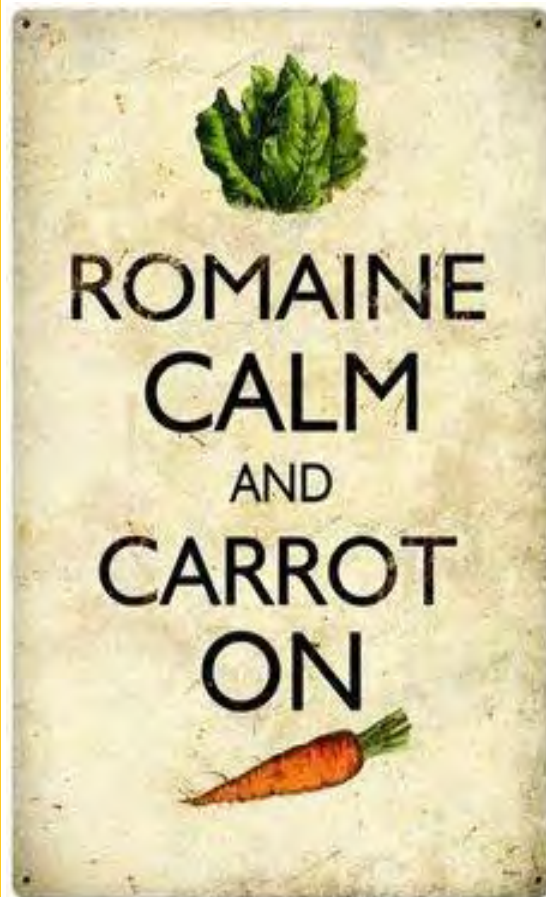

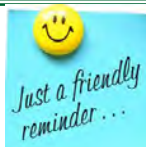

REMINDERS



Are you unsure of what to recycle or how to sort your recyclables? The following list describes items that are typically accepted at most recycling centers and have the least amount of "rules":

Aluminum Cans: You all know these, the Coke, Pepsi, and Sprites of the world.

Steel Cans: Soup cans, veggie cans, coffee cans, etc., including the can lids. And you don't even need to remove the labels.

Magazines and slick inserts: After you are finished with that People magazine and all those catalogs and Wal-mart ads that arrive in the mail, they can be recycled.

Corrugated Cardboard: Shipping and packaging boxes, usually identifiable by a squiggly layer of paper sandwiched between sheets. Used pizza boxes are often NOT accepted.

Paper and Paperboard: Office paper, notebook paper, cereal boxes, non-Styrofoam egg cartons, some pre-packaged food boxes. Some paper items like paper milk cartons and drink boxes are lined with wax or plastic and are often not accepted.

Plastics: Milk jugs, shampoo bottles, detergent bottles, vitamin bottles, plastic soda and water containers etc. Most centers will accept those plastics labeled with the PETE 1 and HDPE 2 symbols and many more are accepting plastics labeled 1 - 7. These can generally be found molded into the bottom of the containers. If you can't identify the type of plastic, don't include it. Most facilities also require that you remove the cap since it is usually made of a different type of plastic.

Glass: Beer bottles, wine bottles, pickle jars, jelly jars, etc. Occasionally a center will accept only certain "colors" of glass. Light bulbs, Pyrex, ceramics, and mirrors are NEVER accepted. In some places, glass is becoming less accepted because of the potential of worker injuries due to broken glass.

Friendly reminder that all garbage shall be contained in **securely tied plastic bags** and shall be placed in a District of Hudson's Hope garbage container for collection.

Protective Services

Canadians enjoy an abundance of aquatic activities through thousands of waterfronts (ocean, lakes, rivers, and private pools) and recreational facilities. Tragically, hundreds of Canadians die each year in water-related fatalities. Men are four times more likely to drown than women. And while boating-related fatalities have trended downward over the past 10 years, still 80% of victims in boating deaths are not wearing lifejackets. These facts led the Lifesaving Society in partnership with the Canadian Safe Boating Council to research if talking to women would effectively influence their husbands to wear their lifejackets.

Guess what? The 10 year phase-in period for becoming a certified motor-boat operator is over. Now, anyone operating a motorized boat in Canada - regardless of age - must hold a Pleasure Craft Operator (PCO) card.

Alcohol is a major contributing factor in drowning among men (51%) especially when powerboating (50%). Although progress has been made in the reduction of automobile drinking and driving offences over the past 10 years, incidences of drinking and driving a boat continue to be common place. To reduce drinking-and-driving-a-boat behaviour we draw similarities between the dangers of the two activities: drinking and driving a car and drinking and driving a boat.

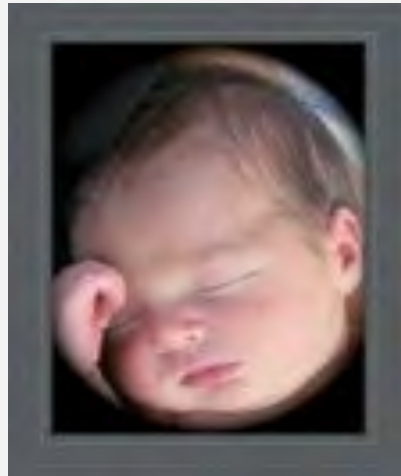

A big welcome to a little bit of rain and a little cooler weather! It's reduced the fire hazard, at least for the present. We sure don't want a repeat of last year's evacuation!

Public Works:

Hudson's Hope is fortunate to have received a **\$1.5 million Building Canada / Small Communities Fund grant** for our waste-water facility. This will allow us to upgrade our lagoon treatment system. Final design can now get underway with construction slated for 2016. Many thanks to our CAO and staff for preparing the application, and to both senior levels of government for creating the program and approving our participation in it. Hudson's Hope couldn't tackle such a big project without the outside assistance.

Still on the topic of Public Works, we're working our way through several projects, some of which have been on the "To Do List" for some time. One of those was the **Water Valve Replacement Project**, which was completed this spring. Installation of those valves allows sections of the town to be isolated so that if a leak occurs, the affected area can be shut off but the rest of the town will continue to have water.

We were fortunate to coordinate our **paving** needs with those of BC Hydro so there was little delay in getting our roads repaved after digging them up for

the valve replacement. At the same time, the paving budget stretched far enough to do Adams Street, the library parking lot and some patching. To finish it off, the line painter worked his magic this week and crosswalks and traffic lines brighten up the black tarmac.

For those inclined toward hiking around town, check out the spiffy **new bridge** that was recently installed on the trail down to the ferry landing from the intersection of Beattie and Dudley Streets.

The in-ground irrigation system for the **Hudson's Hope Ball Diamond** is complete and the grass and diamond are much improved since a couple years ago.

Finally, there's been a bunch of miscellaneous projects completed in the last few months:

- replacement of the thermostat in the swimming pool and of the coolers and furnaces in the arena;
- installation of a back-up generator for the water plant, and an alarm system on the lift station at Dudley and Holland;
- crushing of a multi-year gravel supply
- purchase of a street sweeper, a steamer, and wood chipper.
- Looking to the near future, we are expecting delivery of a new water tanker for the Fire Department, and a washroom for the Ball Diamond.

Many of you attended BC Hydro's Open House on July 14. I had asked that they allocate a portion of it to a "sit-down" meeting as I know many of you prefer that format. They declined to do that on the 14th but were willing to do it on the 27th. However, as a result of the shooting in Dawson Creek later that week, they have shut down all interaction, saying they would come to Hudson's Hope for a meeting in September. The negotiation session for Hudson's Hope was also postponed until September.

Construction, however, was not postponed and road improvements near the dam site are scheduled to begin the first week of August.

Police Report: July 2015



Over the last month, Hudson's Hope RCMP Detachment responded to approximately 40 calls for service.

Some incidents of note during the month are as follows:

On June 20th, Hudson's Hope RCMP were called to a domestic disturbance. No assault or threats and the couple separated for the night.

On June 21st, Hudson's Hope RCMP attended another domestic dispute, no charges at that time.

On June 30th, a complainant reported that someone had broken into his pick-up camper at the Dinosaur Lake campground, and stole a clear plastic drybox full of food, and a custom blue Coleman Cooler, wheeled and the handle has a ceramic piece on it (Coleman written on it) wrapped rope look. Value of the loss for the stolen cooler and food about \$300.

On July 2nd, at approximately 2:00am, Hudson's Hope RCMP were called out for a report of a emergency "SPOT" device activation with the GPS coordinates at the approximate 17km marker of the Johnson Creek Service Road. Members attended the mushroom picking camp area where the owner of the beacon, from Quebec, was located sleeping in his tent. There were no problems, the owner and had been playing around with the device before bed and accidentally activated the emergency signal.

On July 2nd at 9:15pm, Hudson's Hope members were called out for a report of threats made with a firearm. A description of the suspect was provided. Members patrolled and pulled over a matching vehicle. The vehicle turned out to be a different vehicle from the threats, but the driver was impaired. The driver provided two "FAIL" results into two separate roadside devices. That vehicle was impounded for 30 days and a 90 day driving prohibition.

Shortly after, members located the suspect vehicle in regards to the firearms threats. This driver was also impaired, providing two "FAIL" samples. The driver also had his vehicle impounded for 30 days and a 90 day driving prohibition. The suspect was heavily intoxicated and thus lodged in police cells overnight to sober up. The accused was released in the morning with a Promise to Appear and charges are being recommended to Crown Counsel.

On July 3rd at approximately 4:00am, Hudson's Hope RCMP were called out for a reported theft of a vehicle and that someone had possibly entered another unlocked home. One male from out of town was located, arrested, and held in cells overnight. Although a small community with a low crime rate, police would like to remind the community to keep your doors and vehicles locked. We are a community located on a highway, and people with bad intentions do pass through the town. Let's not make Hudson's Hope an easy target. Secure and lock your vehicles, do not leave items of value inside, and most of all do not leave the ignition keys inside.

On July 5th, police received a report of a dispute in progress, and when attending the location, arrested a driver for impaired driving. The vehicle was impounded for 30 days and a 90 day driving prohibition was served.

Other files for the month involved abandoned vehicles, seizure of marijuana and pipe, uttering threats, civil dispute, bear compliant, prohibited driver, false alarms, multiple party complaints, careless use of a firearm, breach of probation, and assisting multiple detachments with arrest warrants.

We would like to welcome the arrival of Cst. Bill McKenna and his wife to our detachment.

Preventing auto crime

After a decade of consistent decline, auto crime is once again on the rise in B.C. According to police data, vehicle thefts increased by 31% and vehicle break-ins by 17% in 2014.

Thieves look for opportunities. Vehicles left running and unlocked are easy targets for crimes of opportunity. Older vehicles are easier targets. Older vehicles are easier targets because they are less likely to have the most effective security features. Older vehicles tend to have **weaker door locks** and are **less likely to have electronic engine immobilizers** installed (only as of September 1, 2007 were all cars, vans, light trucks and SUVs required to have anti-theft engine immobilizers at the time of manufacture).

Top 10 items stolen from vehicles—remember that **what's in your vehicle is also at risk**. According to police reports, these items are the most popular:

Smartphones	Personal electronics—tablets, laptops, iPods, GPS
Work tools	Credit cards and identification
Stereo equipment	Cash and change
Car parts and accessories	Garage door openers
Sunglasses	Keys

What you can do

Don't give thieves a chance:

Never leave your keys unguarded, such as at the gym or in a restaurant. According to police data, **approximately one in five vehicles are stolen using the owner's keys**, so be sure to keep them on you or locked in a secure place.

Park in **secure, well-lit areas** near pedestrian traffic. Always lock doors and close windows, even if you're away from your vehicle for just a few minutes.

Remove possessions from your vehicle—shopping bags, tools, spare change, electronics, brief cases, etc. Put anything that could tempt a thief **in the trunk**.

Wait for **garage door gates to close** behind you so thieves don't have a chance to get in the parkade.

Keep your **garage door opener out of sight**.

If you have an older vehicle, use an anti-theft device, such as an **electronic engine immobilizer** or **steering wheel lock**.

Don't store a **spare or valet key** in your vehicle.

Have exterior lighting outside your residence that will illuminate your driveway. More lights means less opportunity to hide in the shadows.

Use anti-theft devices

Electronic immobilizers are anti-theft devices that cut off power to a vehicle's fuel, starter, or ignition system when not in use. If your vehicle is equipped with a passive electronic immobilizer, **you may be eligible for discounts and savings**.

Vehicle alarms will draw attention to would-be thieves with sirens, beeps and other loud noises. Some systems will also trigger flashing lights.

Steering wheel locks are good visual deterrents. However, they may not be enough protection if your vehicle has a moderate to high risk of being stolen.

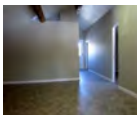

BC Hydro is continuing to conduct environmental and engineering field studies on and around the Peace River between the Williston Reservoir and the Alberta border to inform detailed mitigation and monitoring planning. In December 2014, the Site C project received approval from the provincial government to proceed to construction.

This notice provides a list of field work planned for August 2015. Helicopters may be required for some of the work listed below. BC Hydro will obtain permits, and complete environmental management plans and archaeological assessments as required.

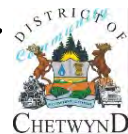
