August at the Hudson's Hope Museum

Summer is in full swing at the Museum, all the Heritage flowers are in bloom and the cabins are open for visitors!

Have you every wondered where the name of your street comes from? In Hudson's Hope the majority of the streets are named after the pioneers. Men and women that came to the area and settled, farmed, trapped and traded. Over the next couple of months, we will be giving you a little history on the people that your streets are named after!

Next Up – Forfar Street

Forfar St. is named after Ed Forfar who was a police constable that lived and worked in Hudson's Hope. Originally Ed immigrated from Scotland in 1891 and worked as a stockman in Medicine Hat, he then homesteaded at the mouth of the Halfway River in 1911. He later sold the homestead to Phil Tomkins in 1919. Ed was appointed by the BC Provincial Police and he became the resident policeman in Hudson's Hope until 1927 when he was transferred to Stuart Lake. Ed was married to Molly and they had two children, June and Gregg.

District of Hudson's Hope Bylaw Information



District of Hudson's Hope Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw No. 872, 2017

Council adopted the "*District of Hudson's Hope Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw No. 872, 2017*" at the Regular Council Meeting held on July 10th, 2017. Bylaw 872, amends the *District of Hudson's Hope Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 822, 2013*" by changing the land use designation of the Atkinson property from Core Residential to General Residential.

District of Hudson's Hope Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 873, 2017

Council adopted the "*District of Hudson's Hope Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 873, 2017*" at the Regular Council Meeting held on July 10th, 2017. Bylaw 873 makes the following amendments to "*District of Hudson's Hope Zoning Bylaw No. 823, 2013*":

1. Incorporating a new R1b Zone: Low Density Residential (Atkinson).
2. Changing the Zoning of the Atkinson subdivision from R2 (Multi-unit Residential) to R1b (Low Density Residential)
3. Including all R1 (residential) Zones in the landscaping regulation.
4. Amending the RU1 (urban residential) zone from the driveway paving regulation to maximum of 12m.

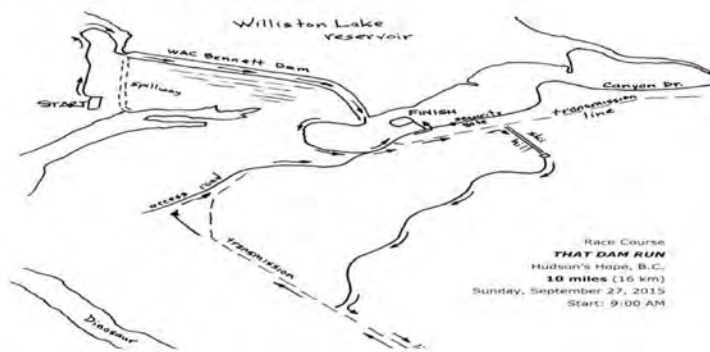

Funny weather continues. My minimum thermometer showed a low of 3 degrees a couple weeks back. Unusually cold for July. But cold and rainy has kept us free from those wildfires that are sweeping across the central interior of the province and that's a blessing. Our thoughts go out to those people in the rest of the province who have been forced to leave their homes and businesses. Three years ago, on July 16, 2014, we were in the unenviable situation of having to declare an emergency and order evacuation because of the McAllister fire.

We have not been asked to provide assistance to threatened communities but should the call come, we will do our best to fill the needs of those communities. As Bob Norton, our emergency coordinator points out, three years ago, a fire truck from Williams Lake was in the District parking lot, with a crew having come to lend our firefighters support.

I have called Prince George to indicate that our wet weather and relatively smoke-free air could be attractive to people with respiratory problems or people in need of space for pets. As other communities came to our aid, we will do what we can to assist those dealing with emergencies now.

Ambulance Service:

Trouble with ambulance service continues to plague us. Some years ago, we worked very hard to persuade the province to establish a paramedicine program, using the model set up in other provinces, where it was integrated with ambulance service. So in rural areas such as ours, the ambulance attendant would become full-time and if no calls came, they would have other health-related duties to attend to. The paramedicine program was established, and we are grateful for that. It has meant that people receive support which allows them receive assistance at home, and may make the difference that allows them to stay in their home rather than enter an institution. The model adopted though, does not prioritize ambulance calls and once again we find ourselves without that essential service at times.

Recently, for two days in a row, emergency circumstances required that a patient be transported to hospital without delay. There being no ambulance attendants available, the clinic was closed and Dr. Courtenay accompanied the patient in the ambulance. This really is an untenable situation and it needs to be resolved.

In the past, provincial authorities seemed to acknowledge that ambulance service in rural areas was deficient and they tried to improve it. In recent years though, an attitude seems to have developed that people who live in remote or rural places choose to live there and should not expect to have the same level of service as those who live in large centers. If that is so, then what we are experiencing is the

"new normal." So once again, we will have to make ambulance service a top priority when we talk to senior governments. But if the authorities really are content with this situation, we have a lot of work to do on persuading them about the "need" before we can get to tackling the "how."

Big Projects:

We have a lot of big projects underway, the three largest being the public works shop, the solar project and the sewer lagoons.

Shop

Paving the parking lot was the last job to complete the shop and that is now done, so that huge project now has a big check mark beside it. It's also paid for. The funds came from a reserve fund that had been built up over many years.

Solar Generation

The solar panels and racks have arrived. The arena will be the first building tackled. Peace Energy Co-Op hired six Hudson's Hope students to work on the installation. It's a great opportunity for young people just getting into the work force to get experience in a new rapidly growing industry. It could lead to a career, or it could lead to reliable summer jobs as they pursue higher education or it could just provide them with the knowledge to install solar in their own home. Thanks, Peace Energy, for hiring local!

Funding for the solar project is from the Strategic Priority Fund. Usually grants require a significant percentage (often 30 to 50%) of total cost to be paid by the municipality. But this grant provides 100% of the cost, so no municipal funds are involved.

Sewage Lagoons

Work has begun on the sewage lagoon upgrade. We felt that our existing lagoons were working fine but we're told that they did not meet present standards and new legislation requires municipalities to register their sewage plants under the new Municipal Wastewater Regulations. We received funding under the Small Communities Fund (a division of the Build Canada Grant). The District is responsible for one-third of the cost of the project.

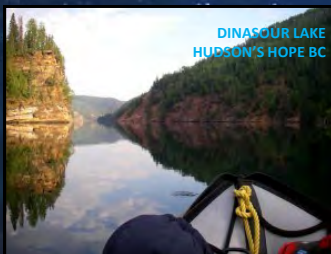

Police Report: July 2017



Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to approximately 45 calls for service over the last four weeks. Marine and Highway safety was a focus of the Hudson's Hope RCMP during this time. Many written warnings and violation tickets were issued for noted infractions under the Motor Vehicle Act, Small Vessel Regulations, and the Liquor Control and Licensing Act.

Three ride-on lawn mowers were stopped on local streets and drivers were warned to discontinue this practice. Please trailer your mowers to get them to their destination as they are not allowed to be driven on roads. Off road vehicles such as the District tractors are properly licensed, insured and permitted on roads for work purposes.

On June 28th, RCMP and the Hudson's Hope Animal Control officer attended a local residence to speak with the owner of dog which had nearly caused a traffic collision in the school zone due to being allowed to roam at large. Several vehicles had to slow quickly to avoid the dog just as a school bus approached. The owner had been warned several times in the past regarding the dog and was issued two bylaw tickets for allowing his dog to be at large and for not having the dog licensed. Please contact the District office for information on local bylaws such as dogs and noise.

On June 29th, police were called to a disturbance on the street in Hudson's Hope with a possible impaired driver who was driving dangerously on local roads. The vehicle left prior to police arrival however a license plate was obtained by a witness which led police to the owner of the vehicle. The owner denied being involved and refused to identify who was in possession of his vehicle at the time. The owner was subsequently issued violation tickets as owners can be held accountable for the way their vehicle is driven by others.

On July 1st, police were called to a commercial vehicle collision on Carter Street. No injuries resulted from the collision but wires and a pole were damaged due to the load being high and catching the wires.

On July 3rd, police responded to a report of an overdue boater on Williston Lake. The RCMP helicopter was called in to assist as the weather was too poor for a boat patrol. The boater was spotted headed to shore

and was eventually met by police. His travel plans were delayed by the adverse weather.

On July 22nd, Hudson's Hope RCMP and Hudson's Hope Fire Services were called to Dinosaur Lake campground for a structure fire. An old, u-built, combination truck trailer and camper unit was found engulfed in flames. The unit was parked in a free camping space near the ATV trail to the right at the beginning of Dinosaur Lake road. No persons were located at the scene and police ask anyone that may have observed people or vehicles in that area or know anyone associated to the camper, to please contact the Hudson's Hope RCMP directly and quote file 2017-198.

Cst. Mark Richardson will be transferring from Hudson's Hope at the beginning of August. We would like to wish him and his family all the best on their next adventure. 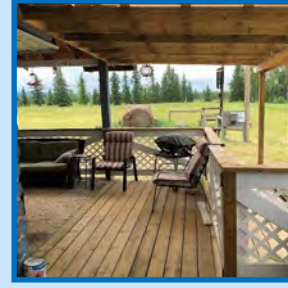

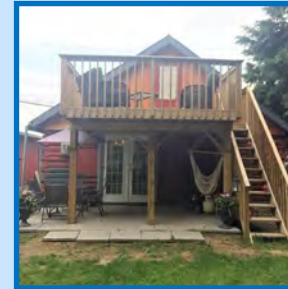
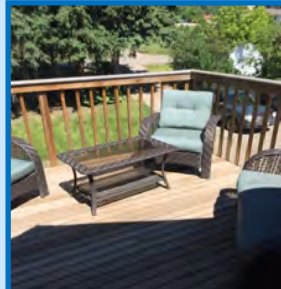

3. Pay attention to weather conditions: While weather conditions may not seem as essential as wearing a lifejacket or PFD, understanding what the climate and forecast will be like during an upcoming boating experience can be crucial for staying safe while aboard a vessel.

4. Bringing safety gear on board: From marine first aid kits to sunscreen, drinking water, flashlights, sound signaling devices and manual propelling devices, there are a variety of safety devices that should be brought on a boat in order to reduce the likelihood of emergencies.

The Importance of a 9-1-1 Address

Properly displaying your civic number on your house or at the end of your drive ensures fast emergency response for the AMBULANCE, FIRE and POLICE Services. Precious minutes can pass while the emergency vehicle attempts to locate the emergency incident.

It is strongly recommended that you ensure that a civic address is posted with the following guidelines in place:

- the civic address the District has assigned to the premises must be displayed on the principal building on the premises and must be legible from a minimum distance of fifteen (15) metres;
- where a building is set back from the street or roadway fronting the property such that the assigned street address is not clearly legible from the street or roadway, or where landscaping or architectural appurtenances or other obstructions obstruct the address, the assigned street address shall also be displayed at the driveway entrance from the street or road serving the building on a weather-resistant sign permanently mounted on a post and visible from all direction of traffic flow; and
- letters or numbers displayed on a building must be of a colour which contrasts with the background colour of the building or sign.

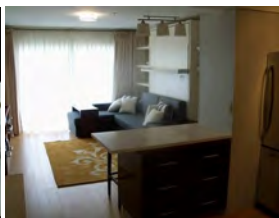
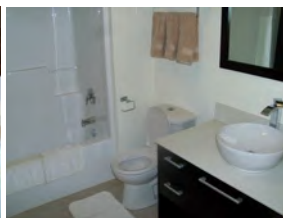
