

June at the Hudson's Hope Museum

We would like to welcome our summer staff to the Museum - Montana White and Christopher Fequet!

Have you every wondered where the name of your street comes from? In Hudson's Hope the majority of the streets are named after the pioneers, men and women that came to the area and settled, farmed, trapped and traded. Over the next couple of months, we will be giving you a little history on the people that your streets are named after!



Next Up - Fredette Avenue

Fredette Avenue is named after Dr. Louise Gilbert Fredette. Fredette came to Hudson's Hope with the Jamieson party in March of 1912. Dr. Fredette was born in Quebec in 1869 and came west in 1907. He was a trained as a veterinary surgeon and was married when he arrived in Hudson's Hope. He applied for title on his homestead in 1915 but was refused, so he headed back to Quebec for the winter, returning in 1917 with his wife. In 1917, with the help of some of the other early pioneers, he built his house and was granted the title to his land. Fredette appears to have spent a large amount of his time in Edmonton. When he was in Hudson's Hope his Medical skills were called upon often to help both animals and humans.

The museum is always looking for volunteers. If you have a keen interest in history or would just like to learn a little more about the valley we live in come out and volunteer – we have lots of scanning and accessioning of historical photos and artifacts to be done – training is provided.



At TELUS we understand how important it is for you to stay connected to your family, friends and business interests. So we are pleased to advise you that we are investing in some important upgrades to the TELUS wireless network in your community. This letter provides information on wireless "small cell" equipment that TELUS will be installing on existing poles in the area.

The use of wireless technology (smartphones, tablets, PCs) has increased substantially in your neighbourhood. To keep up with this demand and ensure reliable wireless services are there when you need them, we need to make some upgrades to the network. Upon completion, your neighbourhood will be on TELUS' LTE wireless network, one of the fastest in the world, with peak wireless data download speeds up to 225 megabits per second.

Given the largely residential character of your community, TELUS is using "small cells," some of the smallest wireless equipment available. Measuring 30 cm by 29 cm (approximately one square foot), these self-contained units include the antenna and electronics in an ultra-compact, low-powered package. The installations in your area will be similar to the installations shown in the photos on the following page.

We will do our best to minimize any disruption to you and your neighbours as we complete the upgrades. Each new small cell installation will take several short visits over a two week period.






FROM THE LIONS DEN

Taxes must be paid by **Tuesday**, **July 4th** to avoid penalty. A 10% penalty applies on the outstanding amount after this date, so even if you cannot make a payment, please claim your Home Owner Grant (HOG) prior to the deadline.

"Cracks in the ozone layer will cause screwball weather." That was the headline in a May 7, 1990 Grain News article. It was about the work of Tim Harris, then a climatologist for Timing Financial Advisory Services.

At the time, it sounded like it came from left field somewhere, but the Grain News is a pretty serious industry paper, and it turned out that not only grain farmers followed Harris' weather forecasts, but so did commodity traders trying to predict prices months ahead. Still – it was a novel idea in 1990. Harris predicted "patterns of extremes" in weather: droughts longer and drier; rainstorms more severe and destructive; fierce winds; unusual frosts; seasons that seem to shift, and so on.

I cut the article out and stuck it to the inside of a cupboard door so I could see if this Tim Harris really knew what he was talking about. Well, now, after 27 years of seeing weather records being broken year after year after year, and after contending with 'floods, fires and pestilence,' as the saying goes, I think the verdict is in. We do seem to have screwball weather.

As a District, we have to prepare as best we can to be ready to deal with weather events more severe than what we've seen in the past. Any replacements of infrastructure will have to be built to a higher standard than what was there before.





Police Report: May 2017



Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to approximately 35 calls for service over the last four weeks. Traffic enforcement efforts continued throughout this period with several written warnings and violation tickets being issued to drivers. One vehicle was towed for not having insurance and one vehicle was impounded for 7 days due to the driver not having a valid license. Remember to insure and plate your boat trailers as well.

On April 21st, Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to Jamieson Subdivision for possible shots fired. The investigation revealed that the shots were actually fireworks being set off by two males who should have known their actions would cause concern for residents.

On May 3rd, a concerned citizen phoned the RCMP to report a forest fire near Farrell Creek. Several spot fires were observed along a ridge in the area. The investigation revealed that it was an intentional fire and under permit. No people, livestock or structures were at risk and the wet conditions were favorable for the fire to not get out of control.

On May 9th, Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to a local residence for a female laying in the yard. The female was found to be conscious when police arrived and was cleared by paramedics shortly after.

On May 21st, RCMP, Provincial Ambulance, and local Fire and Rescue responded to Geddes Bay beach for an injured male that had crashed his dirt bike. The male sustained serious injuries and had to be flown out by helicopter.

The Hudson's Hope RCMP would like to thank ICBC, Hudson's Hope School, The District of Hudson's Hope, BC Ambulance, and all the volunteers who made this year's Bike Safety rodeo a success. A big thank you to all the youth who participated this year. You were Awesome!

The RCMP will be conducting more frequent check stops in an effort to combat impaired driving and make our roads as safe as possible. More river and lake patrols will also occur over the next few months, focusing on safe boating for all. Boat operators are encouraged to familiarize themselves with all regulations pertaining to licensing and the safe operation of vessels.

Off Road Vehicle compliance will also be a focus for Hudson's Hope RCMP this summer and fall. Several ORV patrols were conducted over May long weekend. Many operators were found to not be wearing a required helmet.

DROWNING: IT CAN HAPPEN IN SECONDS

Drowning is a leading cause of preventable injury and death in children under 10 in Canada.

Sixty per cent of drownings occur in the four summer months from May to August, according to the Canadian Red Cross.

For parents and caregivers of children, part of the problem could be perceptual. In our popular imagination, drowning involves a protracted commotion: thrashing, gasping and cries for help. But when a drowning occurs in real life, it often happens swiftly and silently.

The difference between our ideas about drowning and the reality of it can give us a false sense of security.

Parents and caregivers can help to prevent drownings by taking a few basic precautions:

ACTIVELY SUPERVISE CHILDREN when they are in or around water. For children under five and weak swimmers, active supervision means staying close -- within arm's reach. The Canadian Lifesaving Society recommends a supervision ratio of at least one adult for every baby, and one adult for every two small children. With older children, including good swimmers, it is still important to watch closely. Do not rely on a "buddy system" to keep kids safe, or make older children responsible for younger ones.

For extra protection, especially if you are watching more than one child, have children under five and weak swimmers **WEAR LIFE JACKETS** when playing in and around water. While boating, always wear your own lifejacket and ensure children are outfitted with lifejackets that fit them properly.

LEARN FIRST AID AND CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation). It doesn't take long to get trained in these lifesaving skills. Many people have been saved from drowning by bystanders who knew how to properly administer First Aid and CPR.

Put your kids in **SWIMMING LESSONS**. Although formal swimming lessons can't "drown-proof" children, some studies show kids who receive swim training are less likely to drown. If your own swimming abilities could use some work, consider enrolling in adult learn-to-swim or swim improvement class. Some courses, like the Lifesaving Society's Swim to Survive program, focus on water survival skills.

FENCE IT: if you have a backyard pool (including above-ground pool or temporary pool that will not be emptied after each use), or if you have a spa or hot tub, the best practice is to fence it off completely on *all four sides*. The fence should be at least four-feet high, with no gaps larger than four-inches. Access should be restricted by a latching, self-closing gate. It may be useful to keep in mind that chain link fences may be easier for children to scale than a fence made of vertical metal bars. Regardless of the fence style, four sided "isolation" fencing is more effective than three-sided "perimeter" fencing where the house is used as the fourth side. **canadasafetycouncil.org**






