## May at the Hudson's Hope Museum

# A Big Thank you goes out to past and present board members for all their hard work!

Have you every wondered where the name of your street comes from? In Hudson's Hope the majority of the streets are named after the pioneers, men and women that came to the area and settled, farmed, trapped and traded. Over the next couple of

months, we will be giving you a little history on the people that your streets are named after!

#### Next Up - Kyllo Street

Kyllo street is named after the Kyllo Family, Edith and Melvin Kyllo. Edith came to Hudson's Hope in 1929 to work as the teacher for the community and Mel arrived in 1930 to set up a barbershop in town. Sadly, the small town did not need a

barber, so Mel tried his hand at gold panning, and farming. Later in his life

Mel worked as a Judge for the Small Claims Court, as a coroner and he was a councilman for Hudson's Hope. Edith taught on and off at the school and raised four boys (Ken, Glenn, Da-

vid and Martin) in a small log cabin (that Mel built) on the

edge of town! Edith was very involved in helping to collect and record information on life as a pioneer in the area and was very involved in starting the Hudson's Hope Historical Society. She also wrote the Hudson's Hope section of The Peacemakers and worked as the curator at the museum for many years!

The museum is always looking for volunteers if you have a keen interest in history or would just like to learn a little more about the valley we live in come out and volunteer – we have lots of scanning and accessioning of historical photos and artifacts to be done – training is provided.

May 12, 2017. Successful applicants will be notified within 90 days of the deadline.

# B.C. hunting licences are changing in 2017

Here's what you need to know:

- You can buy any of your licences through the BC Hunting online system, and at Service BC, FrontCounter BC and participating vendor locations.
- Starting in spring 2017, there won't be a paper version of your resident hunting licence or other non-species licences. The old hunting booklet will no longer be used.
- Hunting licences will be visible on your Fish and Wildlife profile, but you don't need access to your profile while hunting. Conservation officers can view your Fish and Wildlife profile on their mobile devices to check your credentials, licences and LEH authorizations.
- A new, redesigned paper species licence will be introduced. You must carry species licences with you while hunting and you must cancel the licence by notching it as soon as you harvest an animal.
- Starting in Spring 2017, if you buy a species licence online, it will be mailed to you. If you want to hunt within a few days of buying your species licence, you should buy it at a vendor or at Service BC or FrontCounter BC.

Proposed Bylaw No. 872, 2016 is amending Official Community Plan Bylaw 822 to note the land use change from "Core Residential" to "General Residential" for the area of the District of Hudson's Hope described below.

Proposed Bylaw No. 873, 2016 is amending Zoning Bylaw 823 to change the zoning designation from "R2 Medium Density Residential" to "R1 Low Density Residential" for the area of the District of Hudson's Hope described below.

Lot A, Plan 14064, Part of the NW 1/4, Section 13, Township 81 Range 26 West of the  $6^{\rm th}$  Meridian Peace River District

Lot A, Plan 16585 Part of the NW 1/4, Section 13, Township 81 Range 26 West of the  $6^{th}$  Meridian Peace River District (Atkinson Property – Addresses to be assigned).

Proposed Bylaw No. 872, 2016 is also amending Official Community Plan Bylaw 822 to note the land use change from "Light Industrial" to "General Residential" for the area of the District of Hudson's Hope described below.

Proposed Bylaw No. 873, 2016 is also amending Zoning Bylaw 823 to change the zoning designation from "M1 Light Industrial" to "R2 Multi-Unit Residential" for the area of the District of Hudson's Hope described below.

Parcel A(R33952) of Block 7, Section 19, Township 81, Range 25 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> Meridian Peace River District Plan 1679 Except Plans H733, 27536, and PGP 36042.

Once adopted, it will amend the current Official Community Plan, Bylaw No. 822, 2013 and Zoning Bylaw No. 823, 2013.



Usually if you get early snow in the fall, you get an early spring in the next year to go along with it. In fact, we kind of think we should be entitled to it. Not this year! Winter started early and ended late. Ah well, nothing like some late wet, sleety snow to build up the moisture in the ground. We should be in for some good warm weather now to bring the grass and set us up for a great garden season!

#### **BC Provincial Election:**

#### **District Solar Array Project:**

Peace Energy Co-Op, based in Dawson Creek, submitted the successful proposal to install a 350 kilowatt solar array for the District. This will see solar panels installed on the new Public Works Shop, Arena, District Office, Curling Rink, and Tourist Info Centre. Ground mounted panels will provide power to the aerators for the new sewage lagoons. There may be more funds available through the grant which we accessed. If so, additional installations could be made.

The output of the panels put on each building is designed to match as closely as possible the historical usage of that building rather than producing excess electricity. That's because electricity fed into the grid in excess of the building's needs is credited to us at just 9.999 cents per kilowatt hour, while the District is paying between 11.25 and 12.84 cents/kWhr. So the District's best return on the solar investment is achieved by matching the solar output to the building demand as closely as possible, keeping excess production to a minimum.

In 2000, the District's total BC Hydro payments for the year were \$67,968.07. In 2016, they were \$171,913.26, an increase of \$103,945.19, or about 250%. This was despite some large conservation measures, such as replacing light bulbs in municipal buildings and in all the District-owned streetlights with LED lighting.

Hydro rate increases have become an annual occurrence. We are almost at the end of 5 years of annual increases that, when compounded, add up to 28%. Our increase this year was 3.5% on April 1st. In April next year, rates will go up another 3%. The government announced annual increases for 2019-2023 as well, but did not finalize the amount. BC Hydro is anticipating a 2.6% increase annually. That puts us to 2024, when Site C is expected to come on-line and rate-payers will start to see the Site C cost appear on their Hydro bill, which will continue for 70 years. So there's no end in sight to Hydro hikes. Peace Energy estimates that this addition of solar electricity will result in annual savings of \$49,540 per year for the District.

In addition to the cost savings, I believe there will be spin-off benefits and opportunities for residents. According to Peace Energy Co-op (PEC), the Hudson's Hope Solar Initiative will be the largest municipal solar project in BC, and one of the largest across Canada. It will help put us on the map.

There's an educational component too. Part of PEC's proposal for the District's solar project is to hold a public seminar before construction starts, and another when it is finished. In September, they will offer a seminar at the school so that students and staff can look at the benefits and career opportunities that are available in this fast-growing industry.

There is a lot of interest in solar energy in and around Hudson's Hope. Peace Energy hosted an information seminar in early March, which they report was attended by 80 people, mostly from Hudson's Hope but also from surrounding communities, including Prince George. A group of residents who are considering solar on their homes will have some on-the-ground expertise in the community over the summer to consult with. In addition, they are exploring a "group-purchase initiative through which they could leverage economies of scale to get bulk prices.

This is an innovative project that will hopefully benefit not just the District but also individual residents.

#### **Disposal Well:**

There is no word from anyone on the situation with the disposal well. We are still trying to get a meeting.







# Police Report: March 2017



Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to approximately 15 calls for service over the last four weeks which included calls for abandoned vehicles, a commercial vehicle collision, lost property and injured animals. Hudson's Hope RCMP continued with traffic enforcement and conducted road checks to ensure safety of motorists.

On March 21<sup>st</sup>, 2017 Hudson's Hope RCMP and Hudson's Hope Fire and Rescue members attended Farrell Creek Road for a serious collision involving a commercial vehicle and tanker. No injuries resulted from the collision however the tanker was compromised and spilled part of its contents. The scene was quickly contained and cleaned up. A Commercial Vehicle enforcement officer attended and conducted a mechanical inspection of the vehicle. The file is still under investigation and the driver may be issued a violation ticket.

On March 29<sup>th</sup>, 2017 an abandoned vehicle parked at the entrance to Farrell Creek road was reported to police. The owner was unable to be reached and the vehicle was towed as it was blocking commercial vehicles from entering Hwy 29 safely.

On March 29<sup>th</sup>, 2017 Hudson's Hope RCMP mediated a family dispute over dog ownership. The incident was reported to police as a theft but was eventually clarified as a civil dispute over mutually owned property. All parties were referred to civil court to determine ownership.

On March 30<sup>th</sup>, 2017 a concerned citizen alerted police of possible stranded boaters on Dinosaur Lake. The citizen had noticed a vehicle and boat trailer parked in the lot overnight and became concerned for the boaters as they had not returned on the same day. Police elicited assistance from another boater who made contact with the possibly stranded boaters. All were fine and were just camping overnight. Thanks for the assistance fellow citizens.


Charlie Kehl also won a \$50.00 cash price for winning the "sport in science" category.

#### # 1: Know the Risks

Although the consequences of various disasters can be similar, knowing the risks in your region can help you better prepare. Across Canada, we face a number of hazards, such as earthquakes in British Columbia, blizzards in Nunavut and tornadoes in Ontario. In addition to natural disasters, there are other types of risks, such as power outages and industrial or transportation accidents.

#### # 2: Make a Plan

Every Canadian household needs an emergency plan. It will help you and your family know what to do in case of an emergency. Your family may not be together when an emergency occurs. Plan how to meet or how to contact one another, and discuss what you would do in different situations.

It only takes 20 minutes to complete a personalized plan online. You can then print it out. Most of this information can be filled out on your own. You may need to get some information from your municipality. To complete your emergency plan online, visit the 'Make an emergency plan' page from the GetPrepared.ca website.

#### # 3: Get an Emergency Kit

In an emergency you will need some basic supplies. You may need to get by without power or tap water. Be prepared to be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours. Make sure your kit is easy to carry and everyone in the household knows where it is. Keep it in a backpack, duffle bag or suitcase with wheels, in an easy-to-reach, accessible place, such as your front-hall closet.
