#### **Adult Programs - Amber Norton, Library Director**

**Conspiracy Book Club:** Our first meeting was so thought provoking! For our meeting in November, we will focus on Antarctica and be covering topics such as Nazi technological and land exploration in WWII, flying saucers, Atlantis Theory, Atlantic Treaty, Operation Highjump, etc. We're still working on finding an equitable source to obtain the title that we really want, so stay tuned to our in-library book display to see the next recommended title.

**Walk-In Book Club:** Did you know that we have a book club that doesn't have a group meeting? Well, we do! Starting back up this fall we will be choosing a new book from our in-library book club sets every three weeks. This means we will have two titles on the go at all times! If you'd like to be part of this club, just ask! We share your name with the other book club members so if you run in to them out and about during your day, you can stop and chat about your latest title. Easy peasy!

#### **InterLibrary Loans - Nancy Smith, ILL Clerk & Bookkeeper**

Did you know we house a collection of book club sets that includes over 100 titles that are shared among 5 federations including over 60 libraries?! On average, we send around 4 sets per week throughout the province! Some months our average is over 7 sets of 10 books per week! Let us know if you are interested in starting up a new book club or if there are any items that we can order in for you.

#### Children's Programming - Toni Sandford, Children's Programmer

School is back in, there's a chill in the air, and the leaves are cascading about us. This means we are well into fall children's programming at the library. This year's plans revolve around STEAM fun. STEAM is an educational program developed to prepare students for study in the fields of science, technology, engineering, art, and mathematics (STEAM). In addition to theme specific learning, STEAM aims to foster inquiring minds, logical reasoning, and collaboration skills.

**Library Club** for K-Grade 4 will meet on Wednesdays from 3:30 to 4:30 This month our books and themes will include Thanksgiving, marvelous marbles, elephants and dragons. Children will be challenged to build teepees with newspaper, learn mathematical marble games, and build a large marble run, while on elephant day kids will explore how to build a bridge that holds 21 jungle animals and finally on dragon day create dragons and clay dragon eggs.

**StoryTime & Stay and Play** for Parents & Tots Tuesdays 10:00-11:00am Preschool children will experience various aspects of STEAM at their age level along with action songs, games and a time of play afterwards with friends. Storytime is a good place for children to begin to understand routine in a fun setting without big expectations. October themes include Thanksgiving, Dr. Seuss Day, Mice, the Forest, and Harvest Halloween.

#### Young Adult Programming: Shellie Howard, YA Programmer

Through our YA Programs we strive to be more inclusive to a wider range of ages. We offer programs that strive to keep our young people interested as they grown in to early adulthood.

**LEGO Challenge** for ages 8+ goes from 3:15 until 4:45 on Mondays This program provides a great venue to explore science, technology, engineering, art and math. Our weekly challenges range from easy to obscure. For instance in the past we have made simpler projects such as making flags to building a replica of a well-known tower, such as the Tower of Pisa or the Eiffel Tower!



#### **Travelling Eye Clinic**

Dr. Herriot will be providing comprehensive eye examinations for individuals of all ages. We encourage all children to have their eyes examined yearly and adults at least every two years as they are important for early detection of vision problems including eye disease. The examination fees are \$35 for children, \$110 for adults, and \$60 for seniors.

### District of Hudson's Hope Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw No. 888, 2017

Council gave Third Reading and adopted the "District of Hudson's Hope Official Community Plan Amendment Bylaw No. 888, 2017" at the Regular Council Meeting held on August 28<sup>th,</sup> 2017. Bylaw 888, amends the District of Hudson's Hope Official Community Plan Bylaw No. 822, 2013" by changing the land use designation of Parcel A(R33952) of Block 7, Section 19, Township 81, Range 25 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> Meridian Peace River District Plan 1679 Except Plans H733, 27536, and PGP 36042 from Light Industrial to General Residential. A Public Hearing was held August 28<sup>th</sup>, 2017 at the Regular Council Meeting.

#### District of Hudson's Hope Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 889, 2017

Council gave Third Reading and adopted the "District of Hudson's Hope Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 889, 2017" at the Regular Council Meeting held on August 28<sup>th</sup>, 2017. Bylaw 889 amends the "District of Hudson's Hope Zoning Bylaw No. 823, 2013" by Changing the zoning of the Parcel A(R33952) of Block 7, Section 19, Township 81, Range 25 West of the 6<sup>th</sup> Meridian Peace River District Plan 1679 Except Plans H733, 27536, and PGP 36042 from M1(Light Industrial) to R2(Multi-unit Residential). A Public Hearing was held August 28<sup>th</sup>, 2017 at the Regular Council Meeting.

#### Hudson's Hope Safe Premises Bylaw No. 890, 2017

Council adopted the "Hudson's Hope Safe Premises Bylaw No. 890, 2017" at the Regular Council Meeting held on August 28<sup>th</sup>, 2017. The bylaw's purpose is to govern how owners maintain their property in allowing tenants to inhabit their property re the safety conditions thereof. It spells out the owner's safety responsibility in maintaining standards and living conditions of the property before a landlord may allow someone to inhabit such property. And should a landlord find the property has deteriorated from the initial acceptable conditions the landlord must vacate the premise until such premise has been brought back to the bylaw's standard.

**What a wonderful Fall we're having!** I've never seen such a variety of color in the early evening light as we've had this fall. Yellows, browns, rusts, oranges, reds – Mother Nature has made use of every hue in the color spectrum this year. Blue sky and sunshine, with enough rain thrown in to keep things bright – there's just nothing like it!

#### **BC Utilities Commission Community Meetings on Site C:**

The position of the Council has been that Site C should be referred to the BC Utilities Commission to determine whether it is in the public interest. Ordinarily, referral would be the standard procedure for a large public project. Site C was referred once before, in 1980, and the Commission at that time recommended that it be indefinitely postponed because the need for the electricity was not established and if there was need for that much power, it had not been shown that Site C was the best place to get it.

In the 1990's, Site C was looked at again. At that time, it didn't get referred to the BCUC, because before it went that far, the BC Hydro Board of Directors decided against it, on the grounds of the cost, environmental effects, and impact on First Nations.

This time around, the provincial government under then-Premier, Gordon Campbell, passed legislation exempting Site C from scrutiny by the BCUC. When the government changed this summer, the policy changed, and Site C was referred to the BCUC despite the fact that construction has been underway for about a year and a half.

So we now have a BCUC enquiry, albeit very late in the process and under much narrower terms of reference than would have been the case in normal circumstances. As part of their process, the present four-man panel is holding community meetings in nine BC communities.

The Commission will have meetings in the North Peace on the following days:

#### **Grants Program: Northern Development Initiative Trust (NDIT):**

The NDIT grant fund originated from the sale of CN Rail. There are four divisions: Northeast, Northwest, Prince George and Cariboo-Chilcotin/Lillooet. There are three categories of funding: Business Development, Community Development and Capacity Building. We have taken advantage of the Community Halls & Recreation Program. There's the Fabulous Festivals & Events (think rodeos, winter carnivals, dam runs etc.). Then there's the Marketing Initiative Program (Farmer's Market maybe?) and so on.

There are four intake dates:

- \* Tuesday, January 30
- \* Tuesday, March 27
- \* Friday, June 29
- \* Thursday, September 6

In the past, the Northeast has not spent all its allotted funds. This year, they did. That suggests that the available funds might not last through four intakes. So if any groups are planning a project that might be eligible for NDI funding, it would a good idea to apply early. If you wait for the June or September intake, you might be too late.

I wonder if we'll ever get to the point where we don't have to talk ambulances!! But there is some positive news:

Ambulance attendants now have some paid shifts as opposed to the \$2/hour standby shifts that was the previous standard.

A recent arrangement allows patients to be transferred from the clinic to a hospital through a 911 call rather than waiting for the patient transfer network.

A one-year trial of a fixed-wing air ambulance based in Fort St John has been initiated and is working well.

An agreement between BC Emergency Services and STARS Grande Prairie is in progress. It would involve a helicopter autolaunch service to transport trauma patients from the scene to the closest trauma centre.

#### Safety and Bylaw Enforcement



#### School Zone Safety: Keeping an Eye out for the Kids

Back-to-school season is upon us and that means all drivers will need a refresher course on school zone safety.

School zones are busy spots. Parents (and school buses) are dropping off and picking up children, crossing guards are directing traffic, and kids are milling about, talking and playing with their friends. There's a lot going on and there's a lot to look out for as a driver.

#### Watch for school zone signs

No one expects you to know where every school is, but you are expected to watch for the signs letting you know when you're entering a school zone. These five-sided, yellowish signs featuring two students with books in hand, are basically universal across the country.

When you see these signs, slow down, watch for children, and be ready to stop at a moment's notice.

#### Reduce your speed

Speed limits around schools are always lower—slow down and obey the posted speed limit. In fact, slower is better. According to the World Health Organization, a pedestrian has a 90 per cent chance of survival if hit by a car travelling at 30 km/h or slower, but less than 50 per cent chance of surviving an impact when the vehicle is going 45 km/h. The speed limit around schools is lower for a reason, so drive slowly because speeding in a school zone is strictly enforced.

#### Do not pass a stopped school bus

School bus safety is important. In most cases, traffic in both directions must stop for school buses when its red lights are flashing, as this means children are either loading onto the bus or off. Only once the flashing lights stop and the bus begins to move again, should you continue along your way, cautiously.

#### Do not pass other cars while in a school zone

No matter how slow the car is going ahead of you, do not pass it in a school zone. It's simply dangerous.

#### **Common sense rules**

Children can be unpredictable, and you may need to act fast to avoid an accident. When in a school zone, keep in mind that kids could be present on any side of the vehicle. Don't drive distracted, and avoid using your hands-free device. It's safest to avoid backing up, making U-turns or three-point turns as well. Be patient, and be ready to stop at all times.

#### **Bylaw Information October 2017**

Each month we will illustrate the requirements and limitations of the zones within the District of Hudson's Hope.

The following is an excerpt taken from the *District of Hudson's Hope Zoning Bylaw No. 823, 2013*.

#### **6.0 RU1 ZONE: RURAL RESIDENTIAL**

The intent of the RU1 zone is to permit single-detached dwellings and duplexes on large un- serviced rural parcels.

#### 6.1 Permitted Uses

In the RU1 zone, the following uses and no other uses are permitted:

- .1 Accessory buildings and structures.
- .2 Bed and breakfasts.
- .3 Duplexes.
- .4 Home occupations.
- .5 Keeping of bees, domestic animals, fowl, poultry, pigs, sheep or furbearing animals for domestic purposes.
- .6 Secondary suites.
- .7 Single-detached dwellings.

#### 6.2 Zone Specific Regulations

On a parcel located in an area zoned as RU1, no building or structure will be constructed, located or altered, and no plan of subdivision approved which contravenes the regulations set out in this section. Column 1 sets out the matter to be regulated and Column 2 sets out the regulations.

#### **PUBLIC NOTICE**

Effective at noon on Wednesday, 20 September 2017, all open burning will once again be allowed within the District of Hudson's Hope.

The current prohibition on the use of some fire-related equipment will also be lifted for the District of Hudson's Hope at noon on 20 September 2017:

- The use of burning barrels or burning cages
- The use of sky lanterns, tiki torches or fireworks
- Binary exploding targets

Although fire danger ratings have dropped in the district due to recent rain and cooler temperatures, residents are strongly encouraged to exercise caution with any outdoor burning activities.

Anyone planning to burn a pile larger than two metres high by three metres wide or conduct a grass burn over 0.2 hectares (Category 3 fires) must obtain a burn registration number ahead of time by calling 1-888-797-1717.

# Police Report: September 2017



Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to approximately 50 calls for service over the last four weeks. With the school year now underway, local RCMP members have begun school zone speed enforcement in an effort to keep the zone as safe as possible for students walking to and from school. Drivers are asked to be vigilant of pedestrians and obey the 30 km/hr zone.

On August 19<sup>th</sup>, Hudson's Hope RCMP conducted a road block and checked drivers for Motor Vehicle Act violations and for sobriety. One driver was found to not have a valid licence and was issued a violation ticket.

On August 19<sup>th</sup>, Hudson's Hope RCMP attempted to stop a vehicle for failing to stop for a stop sign. The truck fled from police initially however the owner was located a short time later. The offender was found a short time later and was issued a violation ticket. The offender was also arrested for careless use of a firearm and charges have been submitted to Crown counsel.

On August 20<sup>th</sup>, Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to a rural property for a neighbor dispute over cattle trespassing. The dispute escalated from verbal arguments to assaults and police were called to mediate a resolution. No charges have been submitted at this time however if the dispute continues charges will be re-assessed.

On September 3<sup>rd</sup>, Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to a local residence for an intoxicated female throwing items around the house. The female was arrested for Mischief and held in cells to sober up.

On September 10<sup>th</sup>, Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to a residence for an assault with a weapon. A female had forced entry into a residence and held a knife to the neck of the occupant. The victim sustained minor injuries from the assault and was able to escape through a window. The female was located a short time later and arrested. Police have recommended six charges for this incident.

On September 14<sup>th</sup>, Hudson's Hope RCMP was advised of a theft of flat deck trailer near Farrell Creek Road. Anyone with information about the theft is asked to contact the RCMP or Crime Stoppers and quote file 2017-287.

The Hudson's Hope RCMP continues to receive calls for cattle and farm animals trespassing on private property and for being at large on the highway. Animal owners are reminded that their animals cannot be at large and are liable for damages and injuries caused by their animals. Owners may face civil action for damages, bylaw tickets for each animal at large, and may face criminal charges should their animals cause injury or death as a result of causing a collision on any road way. Animal owners should make themselves aware of their responsibilities under the Range Act and local Bylaws.

#### Driver distraction trends

More than 800 crashes occur every day in B.C., many of these caused by distracted driving.

Police statistics show that more than a quarter of all car crash fatalities in B.C. in the last five years (2011 to 2015) were related to distracted driving. That's an average of 78 deaths per year, making distracted driving the second-leading cause of motor vehicle fatalities in B.C., behind speeding (89) and narrowly ahead of impaired driving (66). The B.C. government banned the use of personal electronic devices while driving as of January 1, 2010 and added tougher penalties that took effect June 1, 2016.

#### B.C.'s mobile device law

According to section 214.2 of the Motor Vehicle Act, a driver cannot operate a handheld electronic device (including hand-held cellphones, smartphones, tablets and other electronic hand-held devices such as music players, GPS Navigation Systems, etc.). Also, a driver cannot communicate using text messages or email on any type of electronic device. Drivers in the Graduated Licensing Program (GLP) are restricted from using hands-free cellphones while driving. Drivers with a regular licence are permitted to use hands-free cellphones and devices that can be operated with one touch or voice command, provided that the device is securely fixed to the vehicle or worn securely on the driver's body.

Any driver caught texting, emailing, <u>holding a cellphone</u> or other hand-held electronic device while driving will be fined \$368 and receive four driver penalty points (total \$543 minimum). GLP drivers who receive one ticket will have their license reviewed by the Superintendent and may face driving prohibitions. Fully licensed drivers who receive two tickets in a year will have their license reviewed by the Superintendent and face possible three to six months prohibition. In addition to the suspension, two tickets in one year will cost you \$1,256 (two fines at \$368 each, plus eight penalty points at \$520) and if you have points from other tickets (e.g. speeding), it will cost you even more.




Bats are integral to healthy ecosystems, yet little is known about bat populations, their habitat requirements, and threats to bat species around Williston Reservoir, and within the Peace Region. Across North America, bats are experiencing precipitous population declines due to a devastating disease, White Nose Syndrome (WNS), resulting in two bat species in Northern B.C. being federally listed as endangered.

Because WNS strikes in the winter and kills bats while they hibernate, this project seeks to identify important bat habitat and establish baseline winter bat data, to help monitor populations and inform future plans for dealing with WNS using acoustic monitors, roost loggers deployed in caves, bat capture and telemetry. The study will help answer critical questions about bat ecology in Williston Reservoir.

Some of the bat capture and telemetry is occurring at Alwin Holland Park.


