Up Next – MacDougall St – Is named after Jack MacDougall and Family- Who arrived in the Peace area as an experienced Fur Trader in 1915. He arrived in Hudson's Hope with his father, and the rest of the family (Mother MacDougall and six other children, arrived in the spring after the school season had let out. They arrived in the Peace Region via the E.D & B.C Railway and river boats. The MacDougall Home was called Glenmore Ranch and was located close to Lynx Creek.

The museum is always looking for volunteers if you have a keen interest in history or would just like to learn a little more about the valley we live in come out and volunteer – we have lots of scanning and accessioning of historical photos and artifacts to be done – training is provided.

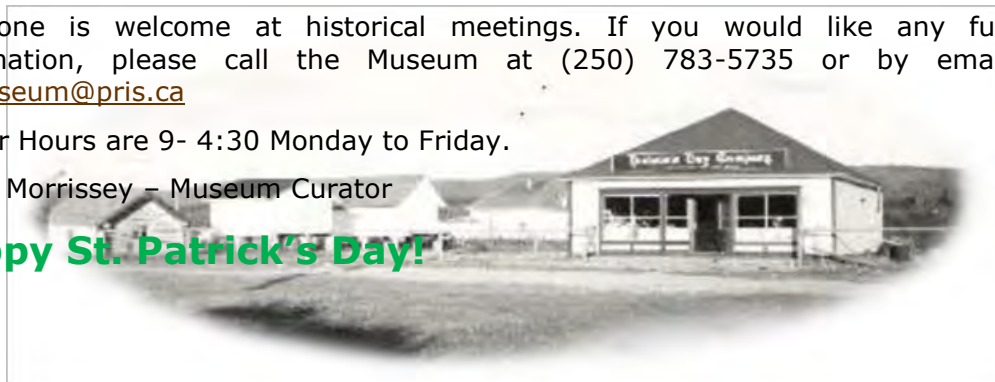

Well, February is almost gone; the days are getting longer and the sun has some real heat in it these days. The 2018 Winter Olympics will be over by the time this reaches readers, but as of now (Monday, 19th), Canada has done well and it's been worth staying up into the wee hours of the morning to see some really close competitions.

Tuesday, March 6 – Presentations Reporting on Local Research Findings

In the February Bulletin, I outlined some of research projects that are going on in or around Hudson's Hope. Researchers from two of those projects will be in Hudson's Hope to present their findings to the public on **Tuesday, March 6.**

Dr Aaron Cahill and his assistants from UBC have been researching the movement of natural gas through soil at two sites in the Beryl Prairie / Farrell Creek areas. Marked natural gas is injected into the soil and its route and speed of travel is recorded. At one site, the soil is dry and at the other, saturated. The data collected will be helpful should there be leaks from wells or pipelines. This work that has never been done before and the researchers have been pleased and surprised by the some of the results. Come hear them on March 6.

Carlos Salas, from Geo-Science BC, leads the project that collected data using instrumentation hanging from a helicopter that flew a grid over the whole of the northeast during the last few years. You may have seen it. The data collected was used to map out likely locations of underground water aquifers. Some wells were then drilled to ground-proof the findings from the aerial program. Carlos made a presentation in Hudson's Hope about a year or so ago, going over the preliminary results. The project is now complete and he will be reporting the final results. Some people found his information useful when they were considering whether to drill a water well on their property.

Hopefully Carlos will mention some of the new projects that Geo-Science BC is looking into. One is using technology developed by NASA to detect methane. There are natural methane leaks in our area and there are fugitive emissions of methane from the oil/gas industry. Methane is a far more potent greenhouse gas than carbon dioxide and if the leaks can be identified, measured, and significantly reduced or eliminated, it would be a big step in the fight to combat climate change.

If you are interested in finding out more, mark your calendar for **Tuesday, March 6, 7 pm.** Location is the Community Hall.

Hudson's Hope a "Living Lab?"

The two projects described above could be the vanguard of more research in the area. I've talked to different scientists / researchers about the possibility of conducting the projects around Hudson's Hope. Some see merit in having scientists locate projects in one area where they can collaborate and in some cases feed off each other's findings. There are a couple other projects already underway. Marten

Geertsema, landslide specialist with Forests, Lands and Natural Resources (FLNRO), and also adjunct professor with UNBC, has been monitoring the Brenot Creek slide for over four years, using drone photography, field cameras and soil samples. He has involved a University of Victoria professor who is designing a project to look into the movement of soil through water, who will be up in the spring.

There will be more projects. The more of them that can be centered in the Hudson's Hope area, the more we will know about what benefits and risks result from our activities, and the better equipped we will be to make good decisions. Having some interested scientists and well-informed residents keeping track of things can't be a bad thing! And those researchers all stay in our hotels, eat in our restaurants, and can become advisors when we are in need of their advice!

Update from Previous Topics

Disposal Well: In the January Bulletin, I reported that the OGC report indicated that the disposal well opposite the airport could be re-opened if a number of conditions were met. I'd contacted the owner, Ben Jones, but hadn't yet heard back. He responded shortly after, saying that he intended to re-open the well, but needed some time to make the required changes, so he didn't know whether it would re-open before or after break-up.

The OGC says they are about to re-issue the permit and that they are willing to come to Hudson's Hope to explain what happened and what the future holds for the disposal well.

When a date and location of that meeting is finalized, it will be advertised.

Rural Roads: I reported that the Regional District had commissioned a report for government outlining the need to improve rural roads. That report is now completed. The condition of thirty rural roads in the North Peace was summarized and needs were analyzed. They were then prioritized. I'm pleased to report that the Beryl Prairie and Farrell Creek Roads are in the top five. If the province does decide to put some funds into rural roads, our two should be in line for some improvements.

Spring is coming! Be alert for crocuses!

Safety and Bylaw Enforcement



Eye Safety Month

More than 2,000 eye injuries occur on the job site every day and about one in 10 of them require missed work days to recover. Of the total amount of work-related eye injuries, 10 to 20 percent will cause temporary or permanent vision loss in the affected employees, and while many people think that eye injuries primarily occur in manufacturing, construction or trade jobs, nearly 40 percent of work-related eye injuries occur in offices, healthcare facilities, laboratories and similar environments.

Flying objects, tools, particles, chemicals and harmful radiation, are the causes of most eye injuries. And in many cases, implementing safe work practices and utilizing appropriate personal protective equipment could prevent them entirely.

March is Workplace Eye Safety Awareness Month and that is why we are taking this opportunity to remind you of a few tips to help protect your eyes while on the job. Always wear the appropriate safety eyewear for your job site or role, even if you are just passing through a hazardous area. If working in an area with particles or dust, be sure to wear safety glasses with side shields to protect against flying objects.

When working with chemicals, always wear safety goggles or face shields to protect against splashing.

When working around hazardous radiation like welding, lasers or fiber optics, be sure to use special-purpose safety goggles and helmets designed specifically for the task.

So remember - something as simple as putting on a pair of safety glasses can prevent serious eye injuries. These injuries are painful, and cause many lost workdays and sometimes lead to permanent vision loss. So during the month of March, and year round, remember to wear your safety glasses!

Bylaw Information March 2018

Each month we will illustrate the requirements and limitations of the zones within the District of Hudson's Hope.

The following is an excerpt taken from the *District of Hudson's Hope Zoning Bylaw No. 823, 2013*.

11.0 R2 ZONE: MULTI-UNIT RESIDENTIAL

The intent of the R2 zone is to diversify the communities by permitting higher density residential uses close to the Town Centre.

11.1 Permitted Uses

In the R2 zone, the following uses and no other uses are permitted:

1. Accessory buildings and structures.
2. Apartments.
3. Bed and breakfasts.
4. Day care centres.
5. Duplexes.
6. Home occupations.
7. Secondary suites.
8. Single-detached dwellings.
9. Townhomes.

11.2 Zone Specific Regulations

On a parcel located in an area zoned as R2, no building or structure will be constructed, located or altered, and no plan of subdivision approved which contravenes the regulations set out in this section. Column 1 sets out the matter to be regulated and Column 2 sets out the regulations.

11.3 Other Regulations

Any parcel in the R2 zone with a single-detached dwelling or duplex situated on it is subject to the regulations established in Section 9.2 (for the R1 zone), instead of the ones established in Section 12.2.

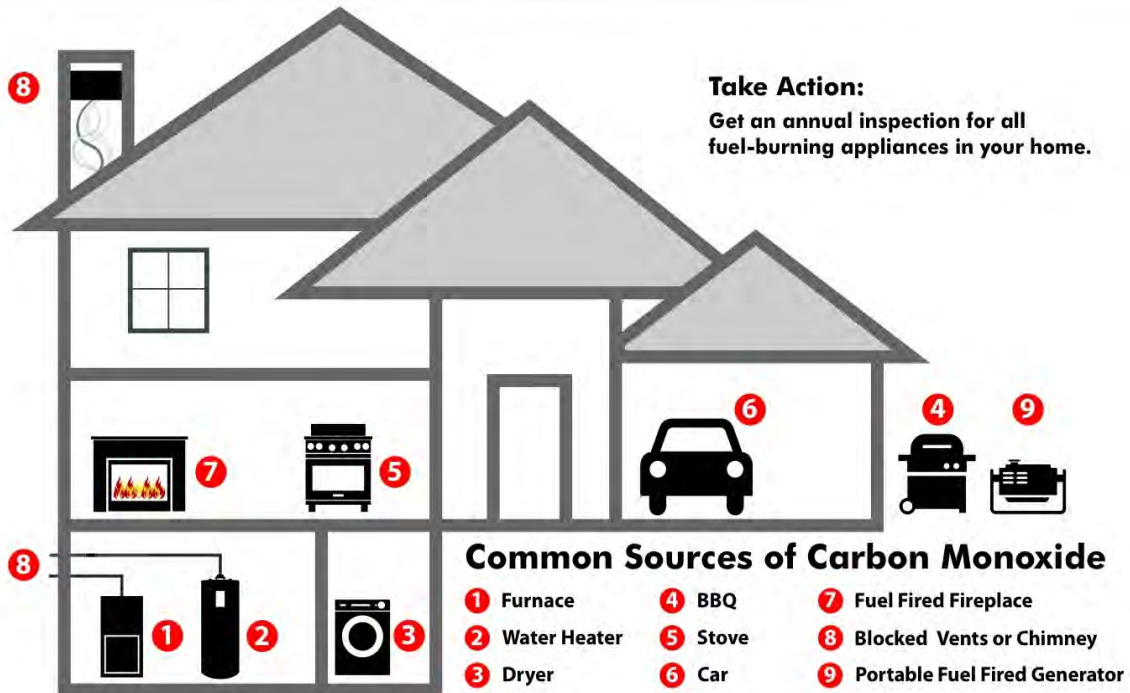
