#### District of Hudson's Hope Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 899, 2018

Council approve First and Second Reading of the 'District of Hudson's Hope Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 899, 2018' at the Regular Council Meeting held on June 26, 2018. This Bylaw amendment is in regard to Cannabis Related Businesses and is being created to allow Council the opportunity to review each proposal that comes forward on a case-by-case basis. A public hearing is scheduled for August 13<sup>th</sup>, 2018, prior to Third Reading and Adoption.

## DISTRICT OF HUDSON'S HOPE ADVANCE ELECTOR REGISTRATION

#### **ELECTOR QUALIFICATIONS**

#### RESIDENT ELECTORS:

- · 18 years of age or older on general voting day for the election or assent voting; and
- · a Canadian citizen; and
- · a resident of British Columbia for at least 6 months immediately before the day of registration; and
- · a resident of the District of Hudson's Hope for at least 30 days immediately before the day of registration; and
- · not disqualified under the *Local Government Act* or any other enactment from voting in an election and not otherwise disqualified by law.

#### NON-RESIDENT PROPERTY ELECTORS:

- · 18 years of age older on general voting day for the election; and
- · a Canadian citizen; and
- · a resident of British Columbia for at least 6 months immediately before the day of registration; and
- · a registered owner of real property in the District of Hudson's Hope for at least 30 days immediately before the day of registration; and
- · not entitled to register as a resident elector; and
- · not disqualified under the *Local Government Act* or any other enactment from voting in an election and not otherwise disqualified by law; and
- if there is more than one registered owner of the property, only one of those individuals may, with the written consent of the majority of the owners, register as a non-resident property elector.

#### LIST OF REGISTERED ELECTORS

Beginning 4 September, 2018 until the close of general voting for the election on Saturday, October 20, 2018, a copy of the list of registered electors will be available for public inspection, at the District of Hudson's Hope office in Hudson's Hope, during regular office hours, Monday to Friday, excluding statutory holidays. Before inspecting the list, a person must sign a statement that they will not inspect the list or use the information included in the list except for the purposes of Part 3 – Electors and Elections of the *Local Government Act*. An elector may request that their address or other information about them be omitted from or obscured on the list of electors.

#### **OBJECTION TO REGISTRATION OF AN ELECTOR**

An objection to the registration of a person whose name appears on the list of registered electors may be made in accordance with the *Local Government Act* until 4:00 pm on 14 September, 2018. An objection must be in writing and may only be made by a person entitled to be registered as an elector of the District of Hudson's Hope and can only be made on the basis that a person whose name appears on the list of electors has died or that a person whose name appears on the list of elector of the District of Hudson's Hope.





## **Hudson's Hope Essential Services House Construction Project**



Students from Hudson's Hope Secondary will be swinging hammers alongside others from Fort St John as part of school coursework this fall. Called the Essential Services Home Project, BC Hydro and School District 60 (Peace River North) are working together to BChydro construct a new house in the Lucas Subdivision, formerly the Atkinson property, in Hudson's Hope. "The experience is invaluable for the Grade 11 and 12 students," said BC Hydro Project Manager

Mattias Gibbs. "They will be involved from foundation to lock-up." As mentioned in The Bulletin last month, students will receive a full semester of high school elective credits, earn Level One carpentry certification and earn apprenticeship hours towards their journeyman's ticket. The 1,375 square foot house will feature nine-foot ceilings, custom maple kitchen, three bedrooms, two bathrooms, natural gas heat and hot water, a large deck and attached garage. The new home will stand beside others in the subdivision which will also feature apartments and duplexes. A sod-turning ceremony will break ground at the new project construction site early in the new school year, September 6, 2018.

Lots happening this summer, including some very hot temperatures, and some heavy rains.

All good, though!

#### **First Responder Pre-Hospital Care:**

For many years we've been lobbying the province to provide more ambulance service, based in Hudson's Hope. However, thanks to the efforts of Bob Norton, Director of Protective Services, we are getting closer – by doing it ourselves. We now have a First Responder Program, which consists of nine qualified responders who act when an ambulance call comes in. If they arrive before the BC ambulance crew, they provide care until the ambulance arrives. That's critically important if the ambulance is coming from Fort St John or Chetwynd, when a wait could be up to 45 minutes or an hour. First responders do not transport, but are very well qualified to provide emergency care for patients awaiting an ambulance. They can even deliver babies if need be!

#### As Bob Norton says:

"The First Responder program will allow Hudson's Hope Fire Rescue to work in conjunction with BC Emergency Health Services to provide timely pre-hospital patient care, and to positively impact patient outcomes within our community. We feel very fortunate that we have the ability to provide this valuable service, and believe that it will be of great benefit to our residents."

We are indeed lucky to have local residents who are willing to spend the many hours of studying to receive First Responder certification, all so they can volunteer to help community members in stress. Thank you all!

#### **Trans Canada North Montney Mainline Extension:**

Representatives from TransCanada Pipelines and their prime contractors came in on Friday, July 20<sup>th</sup>. The pipeline gathers gas from the Upper Halfway area, comes south and east, just skirting the municipal boundary before dipping into the valley near Farrell Creek. It passes under Farrell Creek near the Gentles' property, and is drilled under the Peace River just east of Farrell Creek. From there it goes southeast to the Saturn Hub area where the gas can be dispersed through existing pipelines to all parts of North America.

#### **Farrell Creek Road:**

If there was any doubt, the July 21/22 weekend rainstorm pretty well confirmed that the Farrell Creek Road, especially the hill off Hwy 29, is in bad shape and in need of some major work if we expect it to stand up to heavy industrial traffic.

The whole road is in need of work, but especially the hill just off Hwy 29. On the weekend, it was down to one lane, restricted to 50% axle weight and heavy trucks were directed to detour via the Beryl Prairie Road. When it stopped raining, and dried out a bit, it did stabilize but at this writing, it remains single lane. There is considerable urgency to get a fix, as construction of Trans Canada's North Montney Mainline pipeline is scheduled to start in mid-August. The shortest route for the many loads of 42" pipe, heavy equipment, and paving material is up the Farrell Creek hill and Road.

The Peace River Regional District (PRRD) has created a North Peace Rural Roads Committee, consisting of Karen Goodings (Area B), Brad Sperling (Area C), Taylor Mayor Rob Fraser and myself. The committee has brought together a "Rural Roads Task Force," made up of representatives of user groups. We have been advocating for work on all rural roads, but the Farrell Creek Road has emerged as the most urgent priority.

In response, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure, (MOTI), has moved all their district paving budget to do a total overlay of all existing pavement on the Farrell Creek Road. They had previously planned to do just skip patching. MOTI's short term plan is to start repairs as soon as it dries out and get it back to a 2 lane, 100% axle load as soon as possible. The long term plan is to speed up Geotechnical testing to find the best realignment for an improved route.

#### **Disposal Well:**

Ben Jones, President of Canada Energy Partners Inc., has signed a non-binding letter of intent to sell the disposal well located near Peace Canyon Dam for \$1.05 million. The potential buyer has not been disclosed, but closing is to occur by August 27<sup>th</sup> unless there are regulatory delays. The disposal rights to three sections of land are included in the sale. Canada Energy Partners retains the disposal rights to another 45 sections but cannot drill another disposal well on that land for three years from the date of closing.

## The Importance of a 9-1-1 Address

Properly displaying your civic number on your house or at the end of your drive ensures fast emergency response for the AMBULANCE, FIRE and POLICE Services. Precious minutes can pass while the emergency vehicle attempts to locate the emergency incident.

It is strongly recommended that you ensure that a civic address is posted with the following guidelines in place:

- the civic address the District has assigned to the premises must be displayed on the principal building on the premises and must be legible from a minimum distance of fifteen (15) metres;
- where a building is set back from the street or roadway fronting the property such that the assigned street address is not clearly legible from the street or roadway, or where landscaping or architectural appurtenances or other obstructions obstruct the address, the assigned street address shall also be displayed at the driveway entrance from the street or road serving the building on a weather-resistant sign permanently mounted on a post and visible from all direction of traffic flow; and
- letters or numbers displayed on a building must be of a colour which contrasts with the background colour of the building or sign.

## Police Report: July 2018



Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to approximately 45 calls for service over the last four weeks. During the month of June, the Hudson's Hope RCMP issued 56 Motor Vehicle Act Warnings and Violation Tickets.

Hudson's Hope RCMP have been receiving calls regarding speeders in the construction zones on Hwy 29. Please be aware that the temporary posted speed limit signs in the construction zones are enforceable maximum speeds within the zone. Those in contravention may be issued a violation ticket with associated fines of \$196 to \$253 along with 3 points. Construction zones have two ends and construction zone speeds pertain to the entire zone. Please adjust your speeds accordingly when construction zones are posted. They are there for the safety of the workers.

On June 19<sup>th</sup>, 2018, Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to a report of a break and enter at a resource camp. A suspect vehicle was reported leaving the scene and described as a light color, quad cab Ford 250/350 truck, older model with dents on the fender, and two dark red tidy tanks on the back. Anyone with information regarding the truck or owner of the truck, can contact Hudson's Hope RCMP or Crime stoppers.

On June 24<sup>th</sup>, 2018, the Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to a fight on Ellis Crescent. An intoxicated male with facial injuries was located by police. The male did not know who caused his injuries and was released from custody once cleared medically by paramedics.

On July  $2^{nd}$ , 2018, the Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to a domestic assault. A male was arrested and charges are being submitted to Crown Counsel for approval

On July 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2018, the Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to a complaint of Elk poaching in Farrell Creek. Police and BC Conservation attended the scene and the investigation is continuing.

On July 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2018, the Hudson's Hope RCMP apprehended a male reported to be suicidal. He was taken to Fort St John hospital for assessment and release a short time later.

On July  $8^{th}$ , 2018, the Hudson's Hope RCMP assisted Chetwynd RCMP in locating a male suspect who assaulted another male with a weapon. The male was located and arrested. A charge of assault with a weapon is being submitted. The injured male was treated at hospital and released the same day.

On July 11<sup>th</sup>, 2018, the Hudson's Hope RCMP were called to a collision involving a motorcycle and a moose on Canyon Drive. The driver of the motorcycle was taken

to hospital with minor injuries. The moose and motorcycle were gone prior to police arrival. It is unknown if the moose rode the motorcycle away.

On July 16<sup>th</sup>, 2018, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a stolen jerry can of gas from a property on Fredette Ave. that occurred over the previous week. Anyone witnessing the theft or suspicious person(s) in that area can contact the local detachment to provide information.

On July 16<sup>th</sup>, 2018, the Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to a single vehicle roll over on Hwy 29. A tractor trailer logging unit had hit the cement barriers on a curve and rolled over down an embankment. The driver was trapped for a short time and extricated by Fire and Rescue. The driver was taken to hospital with non-life threatening injuries. Speed and driver inexperience are believed to be contributing factors.

On July 16<sup>th</sup>, 2018, the Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to a dispute at Dinosaur Lake campground. A male and female were arguing over vehicle keys and had to be separated for the night to prevent further escalation of the disturbance. Alcohol was a factor in the dispute.



## Hudson's Hope Speed Watch



Hudson's Hope RCMP has implemented their Speed Watch program to monitor speeding on various roads within the district. Speed Watch volunteers monitor vehicle speeds using a radar reader board. The reader board is not a photo radar board and the volunteers do not issue tickets. The speed watch volunteers document speeds of vehicles and report back to RCMP and ICBC for statistical purposes that assist in identifying areas needing enforcement.



Located at 9904 Dudley Drive, at **6:00 p.m., on Monday, August 13<sup>th</sup>, 2018** to allow the public to make verbal or written representation to Council with respect to Council's intention to adopt a Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 898, 2018.

Proposed Bylaw No. 898, 2018 is amending District of Hudson's Hope Zoning Bylaw No. 823, 2013 to change the following:

a) Schedule "A", Section 3, the definition of 'Parking Space' is hereby amended to read:

Parking Space means an off-street space of the size and dimensions to park one vehicle in conformance with the Bylaw exclusive of aisles, ramps or obstructions.

b) Section 4.6.6 is replaced with:

Landscaping Plans and Procedures

- a) Applications for Building Permits to construct or alter the siting, size or dimension of a building or structure in the R1 zone, R2 Zone, C-zones and M-zones will be accompanied by a detailed landscape plan for the site, boulevard and/or roof if applicable.
- b) The developer and/or property owner must provide security in the form of an irrevocable standby letter of credit or cash in the amount of \$500 on issuance of the Building Permit. The security or cash will be used to ensure that the landscaping will be completed within twelve (12) months of the date of issuance of the Occupancy Permit. If the landscaping is not completed within twelve (12) months, the District may draw upon the security and/or utilize the security to complete the required landscaping according to the approved landscape plan.
- c) All required landscaping and fencing must be maintained in good condition; and fencing must be maintained in a uniform, intact, and upright condition with no gaps caused due to deterioration or disrepair. In the event of failure to comply, the District may enter upon the site and maintain the landscaping at the expense of the property owner, the cost of which will be added to the owner's current year's taxes.
- c) Low Density Residential (Atkinson) is amended to read "R1b Zone: Low Density Residential (Lucas)"
- d) R1b Zone: Low Density Residential Zone Specific Regulation is amended by adding:

11. Exterior cladding	Acceptable materials include stained wood, acrylic stucco, metal
	siding (except aluminium), cementitious wood fibre siding, fibreglass,
	factory finished composite wood siding, brick, stone and concrete
	block. Vinyl, aluminium, or roofing material is prohibited.

## Tips to Stay Safe While Boating

- **2. Avoid alcohol**: According to the Canadian Red Cross, 37 per cent of boaters in Canada consume alcohol each time they are on the water, while alcohol has been linked as a factor in more than 40 percent of deaths in recreational boating incidents.

Beer, liquor and wine can negatively impact a boater's judgment and make him or her less likely to maintain control of core motor functions compared to individuals who do not drink on the water, which underscores the importance of being sober while boating.

- **3. Pay attention to weather conditions**: While weather conditions may not seem as essential as wearing a lifejacket or PFD, understanding what the climate and forecast will be like during an upcoming boating experience can be crucial for staying safe while aboard a vessel.
- **4. Bringing safety gear on board**: From marine first aid kits to sunscreen, drinking water, flashlights, sound signaling devices and manual propelling devices, there are a variety of safety devices that should be brought on a boat in order to reduce the likelihood of emergencies.




