- 3. Grants will not be provided for travel expenses;
- 4. The applicant organization must be registered as, or belong to a parent Society under the laws of British Columbia and/or Canada, and;
- 5. Upon completion of project the applicant must submit a final report to the District outlining how funds were expended.

District of Hudson's Hope Council Procedure Amendment Bylaw No. 900, 2018

Council adopted the 'District of Hudson's Hope Zoning Amendment Bylaw No. 900, 2018' at the Regular Council Meeting held on November 26th, 2018. This Bylaw amendment changes the order of business at all regular Council meetings to the following:

- (b) Notice of New Business;
- (c) Adoption of Agenda;
- (d) Declaration of Conflict of Interest;
- (e) Adoption of Minutes;
- (f) Business Arising from Minutes;
- (g) Public Hearings;
- (h) Staff Reports;
- (i) Committee Meeting Reports;
- (j) Bylaws;
- (k) Correspondence;
- (I) Reports by Mayor and Council;
- (m) Old Business;
- (n) New Business; and
- (o) Public Inquiries.

District of Hudson's Hope Tax Exemption Bylaw No. 901, 2018

Council adopted the 'District of Hudson's Hope Property Tax Exemption Bylaw No. 901, 2018' at the Regular Council Meeting held on December 10th, 2018. Section 224 of the Community Charter stipulates that Council by Bylaw may exempt land or improvements from taxations for a period up to 10 years under the provisions of Section 224(2). A notice will be posted in regard to the proposed tax exemptions.

Conservation Officer Service Reminder Hudson's Hope

It has recently been brought to the attention of the British Columbia Conservation Officer Service (BCCOS) that urban deer are potentially being fed within Hudson's Hope. Feeding deer, or any kind of wildlife, causes the animal to lose its fear of humans resulting in a higher risk to public safety.

The BCCOS recognizes that in some British Columbia (BC) communities, there are increasing numbers of human-deer conflicts in urban and rural areas. This is not unique to BC; it is a North American phenomenon. Deer inhabit residential areas because they feel protected from predators and have access to an abundance of food. Deer are not considered dangerous wildlife but may act aggressively to protect themselves or their fawns. As with any wildlife, they must be given respect and space.

It is important that homeowners understand the consequences of attracting deer into town. Feeding can increase the dependence of deer on people, lead to aggressive behaviour and facilitate disease transmission and habituation. Deer are

long-term residents of both remote and semi-rural areas and humans will have to adapt and co-exist with wildlife. It is incumbent upon landowners to make reasonable efforts to protect their properties from deer before the Conservation Officer Service can take reasonable action.

Strategies for successful co-existence could involve:

- Selecting landscaping plants that are unpalatable to deer.
- Building suitable fences for play areas and enclosing gardens.
- Acquiring an assertive dog (but keeping it under control and on a leash).
- **Never feed deer** and educate your neighbours who do.
- Educating your children about wildlife.





DISTRICT OF HUDSON'S HOPE COUNCIL NEWS



Happy New Year to all of you. I hope you had as enjoyable holiday season as we did with our family. We are rested and ready to get down to business for another year!

I would like to welcome two new District employees recently hired to join our Public Works Department.

Mokles Rahman and his wife Fatema joined our community in early December. They have three grown children living in Calgary. Mokles has accepted the position of Director of Public Works and has extensive municipal experience in engineering and public works. He has previously worked for the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo and the City of Moose Jaw.

Mark Sture and his wife Dana will be joining us on January 2nd. They have two grown children living in southern Ontario. Mark will be our new Public Works Manager. Mark also has strong municipal experience and will be responsible for managing the day to day Public Works operations. Mark has previously worked for the City of Moose Jaw and St. Thomas, Ontario.

I would also like to formally welcome Cpl Brendan Harkness. Cpl Harkness is our new RCMP Detachment Commander and has been with us since the summer. Now that his training sessions have been completed, he is able to spend more time in the community.

December has been a busy time for council and staff.

In early December council and senior staff spent the better part of a Saturday participating in a Strategic Planning Exercise, the objective being to identify and prioritize key goals and objectives that will guide council over the next four years. It was a very productive day. There was considerable discussion around asset management, infrastructure priorities, economic development, recreational opportunities and capital projects, to name a few.

The Beattie Park tree light up is always a special event for our community. Unfortunately, due to prior commitments, I was unable to attend this year. I would like to thank acting mayor Gibbs and councillor Markin for stepping in, in my place. Also I'd like to thank all staff for their roles in the preparation and organization of this event. The park looks amazing!

Some of you may have been following the Caribou recovery discussion. This is a very controversial and complex issue. In short, the Province and area First Nations are close to signing an Agreement in Principal regarding the creation of an area dedicated to the protection of Caribou. At this time specific details are rather limited. Council recognizes and respects the need, but also supports the Peace River Regional District's position requesting meaningful input into the discussion process. We will keep the community informed as details unfold.

On December 18th, BC Hydro held a public meeting regarding Williston Reservoir Operations for the spring of 2019. Apparently, the freshet (filling of the reservoir) has been well below the average for the past two years. In fact it has not been this low since 1958. As a result, Hydro has informed the Water Comptroller that they may need to draft below 2150 feet for the 2019 season. If this is required, we can expect the reservoir level to be much lower than usual.





Police Report: December 2018



Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to approximately 40 calls for service over the last four weeks. During the month of November, the Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to 7 motor vehicle collisions and conducted two check stops in an effort to combat impaired driving.

The Hudson's Hope RCMP reminds drivers to be prepared for winter driving conditions. Please drive appropriately for the conditions. Remember to clear the snow from all windows as well as the roof of your vehicle. Equip your vehicle with safety and emergency gear that may be needed.

On November 20th, 2018, Hudson's Hope RCMP were advised of a theft of a yellow generator with wheels, taken from an area in Farrell Creek. Anyone with information regarding the theft is asked to contact local police or Crime Stoppers.

On December 9th, 2018, Hudson's Hope RCMP conducted a traffic stop with a vehicle that had failed to stop for a stop sign and spun its rear wheels as it drove off. The driver was found to be operating a motor vehicle without a valid license and was issued violation tickets for not having a driver's license and for failing to produce insurance. The vehicle was impounded for 7 days as the driver was a vehicle impound candidate. The driver was also issued an unlicensed driver prohibition.

On December 15th, 2018, Hudson's Hope RCMP and local Fire and Rescue, responded to a single vehicle in the ditch on Canyon Drive. No occupants were inside the vehicle. The owner called police a short time later and reported the vehicle stolen. The driver was interviewed and warned about making a false statement to police as it was suspected that the driver was not being truthful. The driver then confessed that the truck was not stolen as initially reported. Speed and road conditions were a factor in the collision and no injuries were sustained.

The Hudson's Hope RCMP were pleased to be involved with several local community events over the last few weeks including the Christmas Parade, the School Pancake Breakfast, the Science Fair, the Craft Fair, and local Christmas dinners.

Preparing an Emergency Kit for Your Car

Slippery or snow-covered roads, reduced visibility and bitter cold are all conditions that can make driving difficult and even dangerous during cold weather months. Winter also brings an increased risk of getting stuck in your car, so dress warmly before heading out.

Emergency Car Kit

If you have a car, prepare an emergency car kit and keep it in the vehicle. The basic remergency kit for cars should include the following items:

Check off the items for your 72-hour emergency kit as you accumulate them.

Top of Form

Food: That won't spoil, such as energy bars

Water: In plastic bottles so they won't break if frozen (change every six months)

Blanket

Extra clothing and shoes

First aid kit: With seatbelt cutter

Small shovel, scraper and snowbrush

Candle in a deep can and matches

Wind-up flashlight

Whistle: In case you need to attract attention

Roadmaps

Copy of your emergency plan and personal documents

Also keep these inside your trunk

Sand, salt or cat litter (non clumping)

Antifreeze/windshield washer fluid

Tow rope

Jumper cables

Fire extinguisher

Warning light or road flares

Heating Safety

There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fireplace. But did you know that heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

BE WARM AND SAFE THIS WINTER!

- Weep anything that can burn at least three-feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms monthly.

Heating Equipment Smarts

Install wood burning stoves following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.

Install and maintain CO alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning. If you smell gas in your gas heater, do do not light the appliance. Leave the home immediately and call your local fire department or gas company.

FACT

Half of home heating fires are reported during the months of **December**, **January**, and **February**.




