Homeowner Information to Building Permits

The District of Hudson's Hope wants to assist homeowners and contractors to avoid unnecessary delays and expense in planning and construction of residential projects. Below explains when permits are required, requirements for the permit, possible other documents that may be required and other information to assist you in obtaining your building permit. Additional information is available at the District Office or online at www.hudsonshope.ca

A BUILDING PERMIT IS REQUIRED TO:

- construct a new home;
- locate mobile / modular home;
- construct a commercial, industrial or public use building;
- construct a new accessory building e.g., carport, farm building, garage or storage shed;
- renovate existing buildings;
- undertake any structural work such as interior partitions;
- enclose a porch or roof over a sundeck;
- move or demolish a building;
- re-roof a building;
- reconstruct after damage;
- plumbing system changes;

INFORMATION TO BE SUBMITTED WITH A BUILDING PERMIT APPLICATION

The following items must be supplied along with a completed Building Permit Application before a Building Permit can be issued. A Building Permit fee is based on the value of the building or structure and will be calculated by the Building Official.


1. BUILDING PLANS


Two sets of detailed building plans. If you cannot draw the necessary building or site plans, then you should obtain the services of a qualified person.

Example Floor Plans

- scale not less than 1:50 metric (1/4 inch to 1 foot);
- size and location of windows and doors;
- location of all plumbing fixtures;
- location of all mechanical equipment.

- all rooms, size and use of each;
- all dimensions;
- finished and unfinished areas: —





2. SITE PLAN

- full legal description of lot: lot number, plan number; district lot number (from your tax notice or Title);
- lot dimensions;
- adioining street names;
- locations and uses of existing and proposed buildings or additions;
- distances from all property lines for existing and proposed buildings or additions;
- location of legal road access to the property;
- size, location and number of parking spaces;
- existing and proposed wells or other water sources;
- location of existing or proposed sewage disposal fields on property;
- location of any watercourses on property showing distances from existing or proposed buildings or additions;

This information is intended to assist the general public in applying for a Building Permit within the District of Hudson's Hope.

BUILDING INSPECTIONS (Typical)

The Building Bylaw requires inspections at the following stages of construction;

- Footings prior to pouring concrete.
- Backfilling after completion of damp-proofing, drain tile, and drain rock (if required), but prior to backfilling.
- Plumbing before any part of the plumbing system is covered.
- Framing after the entire rough-in plumbing, electrical and mechanical equipment is installed and the framing is completed to lockup stage, but prior to insulating.
- Insulation and Vapour Barrier after all insulation and vapour barriers are installed, but prior to covering.
- Final when the building or portion thereof is completed and ready for occupancy, but prior to occupancy thereof.

An Occupancy Certificate is required prior to occupancy of a building. In order for an Occupancy Certificate to be issued, all inspections above must be approved.

2019 Business License



Reminder...

Business License Invoices are due upon receipt.

If not paid by **March 15th** you will need to **re-apply** for your license.

Should you have any questions, please contact the District Office at 250-783-9901

The 2019 Business License statements have been mailed out. If you no longer require your Business license, please call the District Office to have your license cancelled. If you do not have a business license or are unsure if you require one, please stop in or email rhonda@hudsonshope.ca for more information.

Bylaw No. 504 clearly states "that no person shall carry on, within the Municipality, any business unless he or she is the holder of a valid and subsisting license issued to him or her under the bylaw by the License Inspector and shall pay therefore, to the License Inspector, the sum stated in the bylaw". The annual cost for a business license is \$50.00

If you are operating a business without a license, you are in direct violation of Bylaw No. 504.

A "business" is defined as any activity in which you receive monetary compensation for any services that you may provide within the community.

It's Easy and Inexpensive


The cost is \$10.00 if your pet is spayed or neutered or \$30.00 if they are not. Stop by and pick up your license at the District Office, it only takes a few minutes.

Reduced Fines



The Fee for a dog picked up at large is \$60.00. There is an additional fee of \$60.00 if they are not licensed (this does not include any boarding fees, if applicable).

BC Hydro Generate Opportunity (GO) Fund of \$800,000 over eight years.

This fund was established in 2016 and targets non-profit organizations serving communities impacted by Site C. The fund is administered on behalf of BC Hydro by Northern Development Initiative Trust. Grant review and decisions are made by a committee composed of two representatives from each of the impacted communities, Fort St. John, Hudson's Hope, Taylor, Chetwynd and Electoral Areas B, C and E.

Applications are accepted continually throughout the year but reviewed quarterly. The next review/intake is February.

To date, three Hudson's Hope organizations have been awarded grants and the district council would like to see many more as our community is the most impacted. We are encouraging your organization to apply.

Hands-On Numeracy. Our school has applied for, and received a grant to focus on "transferring" numeracy skills that are taught in the classroom. For the next 10 school months, students will be working in pairs to reinforce a variety of concepts (such as measurement, units, ratios, fractions). DISTRICT OF HUDSON'S HOPE COUNCIL NEWS



It's been another busy month for council and staff.

Nice to see our various council committees up and running. They serve an important bridge between the community and council and form an essential part of council's decision making process. Thanks to all those who take the time to participate, your efforts are appreciated and do make a difference.

Rural Roads Task Force (RRTF) members met with Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MOTI) senior officials in late January. Many regional road concerns were discussed, two of which have important impacts for our community.

The Farrell Creek Road and slide remains a top priority for the RRTF. According to MOTI the last geotechnical work that had been completed on the hill was done in 2005. Currently new geotechnical information is being collected which, when analyzed, will provide options for future road improvements. Unfortunately this process will take some time. In the mean time, MOTI will maintain road access as best they can. It is apparently still a very active site.

The Beryl Prairie Road is also an important priority. MOTI has committed to enhanced maintenance, including dust control for 2019.

Did you know that Hudson's Hope is part owner of the North Peace Airport? Well we are, along with the District of Taylor, City of Fort St. John, and Electoral Areas B and C, we form a Society which is responsible for overseeing the operations and management of the airport.

Over the past several months the Society has been transitioning away from the Regional District and taking a more active role in the financial and policy management of the airport. It's been a lot of hard work, but this transition is virtually completed.

It's important to note that the Society has hired a private contractor, North Peace Airport Services, to operate the airport. The Society and Operations have been working closely together to run an efficient and sustainable airport. To date, no tax dollars from the member owners has been needed. The Airport Improvement Fees which passengers pay to use the airport have been sufficient to cover operational and capital costs.

Passenger numbers remain impressive, in the 260,000 annual range, with direct flight connections to the United States, Asia, and Europe. Also convenient daily service to Edmonton, Calgary, Vancouver, and Prince George.

For a small airport, we are one of the best in Canada!

In the past 30 years I've worked on the prairies and in the great lakes area, so the cold and snow are not new to me. I must say, though, the scenery here is stunning and I'm looking forward to the other three seasons.

Through this missive, I am hoping to provide you monthly updates on the activities within the Department, what we have achieved and what we plan on doing in the next month or two. I also may add some tips on public works or vehicle care. This month's tip is on how to defrost your car windows quickly.

Since my arrival, it seems that it snows on weekends and is clear during the week. Your crews are doing their best to plow the snow from the roadways, sidewalks and parking lots, while avoiding excessive overtime. It takes about one (1) day to plow the roads for the average snow fall but we do occasionally get behind. Sidewalks, secondary roads and some parking lots will be cleared on the second day of our winter maintenance activities. We are reviewing and updating our winter maintenance policy. If you have any concerns or comments, please let me know.

In early January, we noted an unusually high level of water passing through the reservoir. We found the source of the water use in a broken service connection. Plans were made and the repair was completed during the second week of February.

The Beattie lift station collects the sanitary sewage and pumps it to the lagoons. Upgrades are needed for this vital infrastructure. This work is planned for 2019 and engineering designs are being prepared now. We have applied for a Federal/Provincial grant to cover the estimated \$300,000 cost. Further details will be provided when known.

Although we are still gripped in the midst of winter, work is underway to ensure another successful swim season. The pool liner will be repaired as soon as the temperatures warm up and the snow melts from the pool deck and basin. We will also be installing a new chemical control unit to better monitor the chlorine levels in the pool water. This, hopefully, will give us less out-of-service hours than in the last couple of years. Now we just need the sunshine and warmer temperatures so we can start the work, and you can go swimming or relax on the deck.

Speaking of warmer weather, we have a new playground structure for Beryl Prairie. This will be constructed once the snow has melted and the ground has dried out. The playground structure will be located behind the Beryl Prairie fire hall. Look for it in the spring.

Defog & Defrost Car Windows Fast with these Tips:

- **1. Turn your heater on.** Start your engine, and using the defroster setting, crank the heater up all the way to absorb excess moisture within your vehicle. Remember: Hot air can hold more moisture.
- **2. Press the A/C button.** This may sound counterintuitive to the whole heater thing, but really what you're doing is activating a setting on your car's A/C system that helps dry the air within the cab faster with the help of the coils in your A/C system.
- **3. Turn air recirculation off.** You need fresh air to enter the car as well. Winter air is cold, and as it does not hold much moisture, it is dry. Bringing it into your car ups absorption capacity to more quickly dry the saturated air trapped within.
- **4. Crack your windows.** This helps exchange the humid air in your car with dryer outside air, speeding up the process.
- **5. Defrost Windows.** While the above defogging action is taking place, de-frost your windows. This is an entirely separate process that should NEVER (EVER) include hot water. Defrosting quickly takes a minor amount of pre-planning but saves a snow-capped mountain of headache later. If you can't stand scraping, put together a simple solution of 2/3 cup Isopropyl or rubbing alcohol and 1/3 cup water, pouring the mixture into a spray bottle. This solution will not freeze (rubbing alcohol has a freezing point of 138 degrees below freezing), and can be stored easily in your car, allowing you to easily spray away windshield ice wherever you're stranded.




