Homeowner Information to Building Permits

The District of Hudson's Hope wants to assist homeowners and contractors to avoid unnecessary delays and expense in planning and construction of residential projects. Below explains when permits are required, requirements for the permit, possible other documents that may be required and other information to assist you in obtaining your building permit. Additional information is available at the District Office or online at www.hudsonshope.ca

A BUILDING PERMIT IS REQUIRED TO:

- construct a new home;
- locate mobile / modular home;
- construct a commercial, industrial or public use building;
- construct a new accessory building e.g., carport, farm building, garage or storage shed;
- renovate existing buildings;
- undertake any structural work such as interior partitions;
- enclose a porch or roof over a sundeck;
- move or demolish a building;
- re-roof a building;
- reconstruct after damage;
- plumbing system changes;

INFORMATION TO BE SUBMITTED WITH A BUILDING PERMIT APPLICATION

The following items must be supplied along with a completed Building Permit Application before a Building Permit can be issued. A Building Permit fee is based on the value of the building or structure and will be calculated by the Building Official.


1. BUILDING PLANS


Two sets of detailed building plans. If you cannot draw the necessary building or site plans, then you should obtain the services of a qualified person.

Example Floor Plans

- scale not less than 1:50 metric (1/4 inch to 1 foot);
- size and location of windows and doors;
- location of all plumbing fixtures;
- location of all mechanical equipment.

- all rooms, size and use of each;
- all dimensions;
- finished and unfinished areas: —





2. SITE PLAN

- full legal description of lot: lot number, plan number; district lot number (from your tax notice or Title);
- lot dimensions;
- adjoining street names;
- locations and uses of existing and proposed buildings or additions;
- distances from all property lines for existing and proposed buildings or additions;
- location of legal road access to the property;
- size, location and number of parking spaces;
- existing and proposed wells or other water sources;
- location of existing or proposed sewage disposal fields on property;
- location of any watercourses on property showing distances from existing or proposed buildings or additions;

This information is intended to assist the general public in applying for a Building Permit within the District of Hudson's Hope.

BUILDING INSPECTIONS (Typical)

The Building Bylaw requires inspections at the following stages of construction;

- Footings prior to pouring concrete.
- Backfilling after completion of damp-proofing, drain tile, and drain rock (if required), but prior to backfilling.
- Plumbing before any part of the plumbing system is covered.
- Framing after the entire rough-in plumbing, electrical and mechanical equipment is installed and the framing is completed to lockup stage, but prior to insulating.
- Insulation and Vapour Barrier after all insulation and vapour barriers are installed, but prior to covering.
- Final when the building or portion thereof is completed and ready for occupancy, but prior to occupancy thereof.

An Occupancy Certificate is required prior to occupancy of a building. In order for an Occupancy Certificate to be issued, all inspections above must be approved.

Payments to the municipality can continue to be made using cash, debit-card, cheques, electronic transfer of funds (ETF), and bank drafts.



RECYCLING Did you know that PRRD changed their system

last year so that plastic bags and other recyclable soft plastics need to be put in different bins than before?

Instead of putting them in the usual bins for plastics #1-7 and tin, they now need to be put in one of two new bins - located on the south end and along the west side of the rows of blue bins.

A lot of people aren't aware of this change though because it wasn't really advertised, the signs on the old bins didn't change much and the new bins are hard to notice unless you're looking for them. Hopefully we'll receive some additional yellow bins from PRRD soon, as the two we currently have do not meet our needs.

Check out the RecycleBC guide pictured below to see what kinds of soft plastics are actually recyclable and what kinds are not.



DISTRICT OF HUDSON'S HOPE PUBLIC WORKS NEWS & VIEWS



As I write this the weather is getting warmer and we are all itching for those spring and summer activities, grass cutting, weeding and cleaning the gravel from our lawns. February was a busy month for our crews, it always seemed to snow on a Friday or Saturday making snow clearing a weekend activity, although we were able to get away from the overtime in the last few weeks. This was offset, however, by the discovery of our water leak close to the reservoir and a frozen sewer brought to our attention by a diligent resident.

Water and Sewer Works

The water leak, which we first advised you of through a PSA in January was discovered after a resident informed us of an emerging pond in an easement west of the reservoir; the end of Ardill Street. Upon investigation and excavation District personnel found a broken curb stop (shut off valve). The excavation allowed replacement of the damaged connection with little disruption to the overall water system. The work was completed during normal business hours with the assistance of a local contractor.



On the last weekend in February, we were advised of a sewer blockage on MacDougall Street. Crews worked through the cold weekend and were able to clear a frozen section on Sunday morning. The photo on the left shows two of our staff working hard to clear the blockage on the frozen Saturday afternoon. Thank you to all the staff who are relentless in providing great service to our community.

Disposable Wipes

During the week of March 4th, we experienced a second sanitary sewer blockage. For your benefit and the benefit of all sanitary sewer users, be careful what you flush. Newer styles of flushable wipes are truly flushable as they are made of a fibrous material similar to toilet paper, but other styles of wipes and the majority of baby wipes are not.

A recent study in the United States showed that most items causing blockages were non-flushable paper and garbage like disposable hand towels (34%), baby wipes (38%), cosmetic and surface wipes (19%), and feminine products (7%). If you are not sure, please throw them in the trash. A clogged sewer line on your property may cost you a significant amount to repair and the District has no obligation to repair blockages beyond the property line.

Hopefully, we have seen a turn in the weather, and we can start planning and working on our spring clean-up and some of the spring works that contribute to the beauty in the community. Council has considered the budget and we have enough direction to move forward with various projects. Community Spring clean-up will proceed in the fourth week of April Please register and obtain your item stickers at the District Office. We will not enter properties to collect large items, nor will we be collecting regular garbage as part of this spring clean-up. Your regular household garbage will be collected as per your normal schedule.

At the end of April or beginning of May we will start working on the pool in preparation of another summer of swimming. Subject to liner repairs and other opening duties, the pool will open on the Victoria Day weekend.

District of Hudson's Hope Officer Bylaw No. 903, 2019

Council adopted the 'District of Hudson's Hope Officer Bylaw No, 903, 2019' at the Regular Council Meeting held on March 11, 2019. This Bylaw establishes officer positions and sets out the administrative structure under which the business of the District shall be conducted.



Police Report: MARCH 2019

Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to approximately 40 calls for service over the last four weeks. The Hudson's Hope RCMP continued efforts to maintain public and road safety by conducting several check stops in conjunction with Motor Vehicle Act enforcement. With the weather improving, more animals are travelling along and across local roads and highways. Please use caution especially during periods of reduced visibility.

On February 27th, 2019, Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to a call regarding a deer with a wooden stool stuck on its head. Police made several attempts to get close to the deer to offer assistance however were unable to make contact. Local BC Conservation officers were advised and are monitoring the incident. Locals are asked to secure their outdoor furniture and ensure their property does not contain anything harmful to wildlife.

On March, 13th, 2019, Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to a collision involving two logging semi-tractor trailer vehicles. The two trucks collided on a sharp corner. One vehicle received minor damage and the other received substantial damage as it collided with a bridge guard rail after the collision. The occupants were not seriously injured. One driver was issued a violation ticket for failing to keep right and the matter was referred to Commercial Vehicle Safety Enforcement (CVSE) and ICBC for further follow up.

With May long weekend approaching, Hudson's Hope RCMP wish to remind outdoor enthusiasts to be cautious while participating in outdoor activities such as riding off road vehicles (ORV) and marine vessels. Police will be increasing ORV, marine and Highway patrols during the long weekend and strictly enforcing all licensing and safety requirements to ensure a safe weekend for all. As always, enhanced targeting of impaired operation of vehicles and vessels will be a primary focus for police throughout the weekend.

Important notes:

Liquor Possession and consumption:

It is illegal to consume or possess open liquor in a private boat, regardless if it is in motion or not, unless the vessel is equipped with permanent sleeping accommodations, permanent cooking facilities and a permanent toilet, or has a valid liquor license.

Outdoor smoking and vaping of Cannabis:

- 1) A person must not smoke or vape cannabis in or on any of the following places, if the place is a public place that is outdoors:
- a) a skating rink, sports field, swimming pool, playground or skate park;
- b) A spray pool or wading pool within the meaning of regulations under the Public Health Act or a splash pad;
- c) a deck, seating area, viewing area or other place used in association with a place to which paragraph (a) or (b) applies.
- d) A person must not smoke or vape cannabis within a prescribed distance from the places to which subsection (1) (a) to (c) applies.
- 1) A person must not smoke or vape cannabis in a prescribed area of any the following places:
- a) a park within the meaning of the Park Act;
- b) a regional park within the meaning of the Local Government Act;
- c) an outdoor area established by a local government for purposes of community recreation;
- d) a permanent public park over which the Park Board has jurisdiction under section 488 of the Vancouver Charter.

Consumption of Cannabis in vehicles and boats

A person must not consume cannabis while

- (a) operating a vehicle or boat, or
- (b) in or on a vehicle or boat being operated by another person.

A person must not operate a vehicle or boat if the person knows that another person is smoking or vaping cannabis in the vehicle or boat regardless of whether the vehicle or boat is in motion.



PROTECTIVE SERVICES

SPRING BURNING

As the weather starts to warm up many folks are beginning to plan some spring-time cleanup activities including the removal of yard waste and debris. Please remember that under the Fire Protection & Life Safety Bylaw 775 which was adopted in 2010, no person shall light or start an open air fire within the District without first having obtained a Burning Permit from the Fire Chief or his designate. These permits are available at the District Office and can be issued for a onetime event or for an extended period of up to one year.

The only time a permit is not required is during the following situations:

- Burning refuse or garden waste only in an incinerator covered with a screen to prevent flying sparks and is approved by the Fire Chief
- The cooking of food using a portable barbeque apparatus
- Burning on privately owned lands or in developed campgrounds where fireplaces, stoves, and/or fire pits are provided and approved by the Fire Chief
- Burning by the Fire & Rescue Services for the purposes of training

If you are contemplating an open burn:

- Consider your options to compost, recycle, or haul the material to the Hudson's Hope Transfer Site.
- Be a good neighbour. Burn only when it will not affect the health and welfare of the community.
- Call the BC Ministry of Environment to check the ventilation index at 1-888-281-2992. The index must be "good" for the day of the burn and "fair" or "good" for the second day of the burn.
- Check the wind conditions. If the wind is strong enough to carry sparks and embers to other combustible materials postpone your burn.

Remember that your burn must comply with the Environmental Management Act and the Open Burning Smoke Control Regulation as well as the British Columbia Wildfire Act.

Please remember these measures are in place to protect the health and safety of you and your neighbours. If you have any further questions regarding your burning activities please stop by the District Office to speak to Bob Norton the Director of Protective Services, or call 783-9901.
