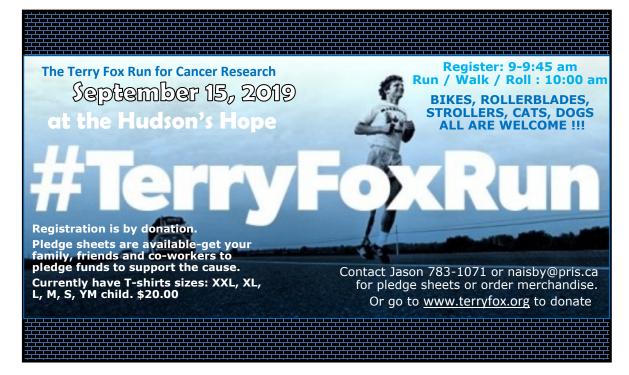

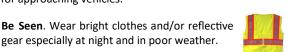

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Happenings at the Hudson's Hope Health Centre!

If you haven't heard yet, we have an inter-professional team consisting of a mental health clinician, dietician and social worker that come out from Fort St John to the clinic the $\underline{\mathbf{3}^{rd}}$ **Wednesday of every month**.

You do not need a referral from a doctor to book an appointment: Give the clinic a call if you would like to book an appointment with any of our team.

Below are some examples that the Social Worker (Jillian) may be able to help people with:

- Clients who need assistance/advocacy regarding financial hardship issues.
- i.e. long term care costs, dressing supply coverage, equipment costs, general difficulty coping financially while living independently or in care.
- Adult Guardianship Issues Adult Abuse and Neglect Concerns (financial, emotional, physical). Collaboration with RCMP investigation
- Housing concerns assistance finding suitable, affordable housing.
- Connection with different programs such as the SAFER program, Meals on Wheels, Lifeline
- Assistance with navigation of different government programs such as, Income Security, Revenue Canada, BC Housing, Ministry of Housing and Social Development (i.e. Income Assistance), Pharmacare, MSP, NHIB, INAC, WCB
- Capability Assessments
- Public Guardian and Trustee Referrals and collaboration
- Connection with and assistance navigating different organizations and societies linked to clients health concerns and disorders (i.e. MS Society, BCPA, Women's Resource Center, Palliative Care Society, CLBC, North Peace Community Resources Society, Cancer Societies)
- Connection to counseling services if requested
- Information regarding Power of Attorney, Representation Agreements, Wills etc.
- Assist clients with medical travel costs, both travel and accommodation
- Support with dying and bereavement issues, grief and loss, end of life support
- Support clients with new diagnosis (i.e. MS, paraplegia)



Police Report: SEPTEMBER 2019

Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to 51 calls for service between July 16th and August 12th. 51 written violations and warning tickets were issued to drivers between the above dates. Highway and road safety continues to be a big focus for the Hudson's Hope RCMP. Police have received reports to the increasing number of vehicles speeding along Beattie Drive,

therefore police will be monitoring this area especially into the following month with the school season just around the corner. Speeding fines can range from \$138.00 to \$196.00, with excessive speeding resulting in a \$368.00 fine and a 7 day impound of the vehicle. Please obey local speed limits within our community.

On July 20th, Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of shots being fired into the Peace River near the Farrell Creek Bridge. This occurred while boaters were out on the river, posing a serious public risk factor. Police attended the area and located several intoxicated persons camping along the creek. During the investigation a firearm was located and seized, and one of the persons was arrested for possession of stolen property after one of the associated vehicles was found to be bearing stolen licence plates.

On July 21st, Hudson's Hope RCMP conducted a roadside check stop along Hwy 29 at the Peace Canyon Access Road. During this check stop, police stopped and checked approximately 75 drivers and vehicles. Several violation tickets were issued for various offences, including expired insurance for travel trailers. Please take the time to verify that all vehicle registration and insurances are up to date prior to heading out for a weekend camping trip.

On July 28th, Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a possible poaching site located within a rural area of Hudson's Hope. Police conducted an investigation and located the site in which it appeared that several deer were shot out of season. This file has been forwarded to the local Conservation Officers who are continuing with the investigation. Poaching is a serious offence that can cause dramatic negative effects to the local wildlife populations. Anyone who observes a poaching offence can contact the Report All Poachers and Polluters hotline: 1-877-952-7277. Poaching offences can come with fines ranging from \$25,000 to \$100,000 fines with 6 months to 1 year imprisonment.

On August 4th, Hudson's Hope RCMP assisted Fort St. John RCMP with an abduction attempt on a flagger that occurred within the Fort St. John jurisdiction near the area of Szoo Road along Hwy 29. A blue Power Wagon van with a grey pinstripe down the side, and tinted windows, stopped by a flagger, and an unidentified person exited the van and attempted to abduct this flagger. The victim was able to fend off the assailant, with the van fleeing the scene. This file is still under investigation with the

RECYCLING PAPER PACKAGING FOR DRY GOODS

Paper packaging is recycled into new boxes, paper towels, tissues, paper-based plant pots, the paper cover for drywall liner, kraft paper, brown paper products including paper towels

Accepted Materials

- Corrugated cardboard boxes used for shipping, grocery and liquor store boxes and pizza boxes
- Cardboard and boxboard boxes used for cereal, shoes, tissues, pizza, frozen entrees, desserts, detergent, etc.
- Carrier trays for bulk bottled water, soft drinks, cans, food, etc.
- Cores for paper towels and toilet tissue
- Moulded boxboard packaging for egg cartons, take-out beverage trays, paper-based plant pots
- Paper bags (also called kraft paper) and envelopes
 Multi-layered paper bags for flour, sugar, etc.



Not Accepted

- Cardboard boxes with wax coating, such as empty boxes, made available for residents to transport their groceries home
- Paper bags with multiple layers that include a foil layer
- Paper bags with a plastic layer
- Paper towels, napkins (include with green waste, if applicable)

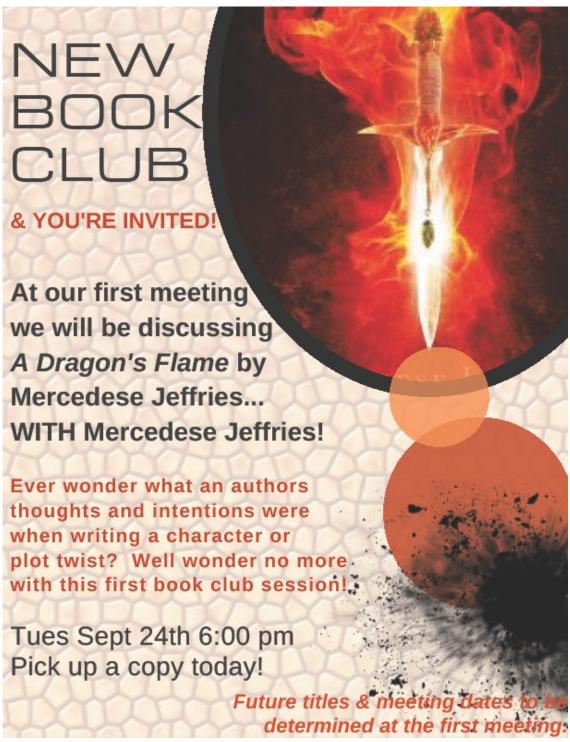

We would like to invite you to come in and check out the Bedaux Exhibit which is back on display after a 6-year hiatus and journey around Alberta and British Columbia.

Charles Bedaux was captivated with the country surrounding Hudson's Hope after embarking on a hunting trip in the area in 1932. His

attempt, two years later, to take five Citroen half tracks across the northern wilderness of British Columbia is known throughout the world. This "Champagne Safari" did not reach its Telegraph Creek destination but it gave much needed employment to local cowboys during the Depression. The role of the Hudson's Hope cowboys has been overshadowed by historical emphasis on Charles Bedaux's lifestyle and adventures. Through profiling the lives of these cowboys, this exhibition highlights their important role as wranglers and packers to the expedition. Included in the exhibition are copies of the maps showing the arduous route from Fort St. John to Telegraph Creek and previously unpublished photographs.

DISTRICT OF HUDSON'S HOPE PUBLIC WORKS NEWS & VIEWS



Wow! Where did the summer go? School is back in session so watch out for children as they run for the bell or race to get home.

Many of our seasonal staff have left us to return to school or college, this includes Public Works, Pool and Recreation staff. We thank them for the effort and dedication they gave to the District for the summer and wish them all the best in their future studies.

Due to the somewhat damp summer, the grass never stopped growing this summer. This took additional staff time to keep the parks and facilities looking good. We had other work planned and some of our minor activities may get pushed to next year when our seasonal staff are back.

The pool has closed, and the campgrounds will be closing after the September long weekend. But, in another few weeks the Arena will be opening for hockey, figure skating and other ice related activities. Staff will be installing the ice towards the end of September and program registration will be occurring over the next couple of weeks.

August was a challenging month for our water system. There was never any danger to safety, but there were a lot of little things that kept our staff hopping at the Water Treat Plant and at our River Pump House. For every location a pump is needed, we run two pumps to ensure redundancy in our system. The use of the pumps is rotated to ensure they work when needed. This provides the ability to conduct repairs on one while maintaining water service to the District as required.

A failure in one of our River Pumps created the need to close the Commercial Water Stand for a couple of weeks. This was strictly a precautionary measure to ensure we could guarantee fire suppression needs and potable water to our residents.

The repairs to the River Pump have been completed, and we took the opportunity to upgrade the controls on the Commercial Water Stand from a key lock to a PIN pad. The PIN pad allows us to capture the usage information electronically, easing the tracking and billing process for commercial users.

The library electrical service is being updated from 100-amp service to 200-amp service. This will improve the ability to run the computers, printers, fax machines and the air conditioning without "browning out".

Capital Works that have been complete this year include:

- The Beryl Prairie Well pump change
- Commercial Water Stand Updates
- Water & Hydrant Replacement (to occur in September)
- Beryl Prairie Fire Hall Septic System Replacement
- Beryl Prairie Playground renewal
- Gravel Replenishment
- GPS Equipment
- Bear proof recycling bins (for campgrounds and parks)

This year the District initiated a GPS/GIS project as part of Asset Management. District personnel collected data on the location of various infrastructure, such as water valves, manholes (storm and sewer), catch-basins and road signs. The information was geo-coded and mapped into an electronic database. Late in the summer, the District's recreation trails, and some recreation facilities were added to the database and maps.

Each type of infrastructure was placed in layer so that we can provide/display just the information that is required and not every item. The information can be used by District staff in the location and maintenance of infrastructure or provided to consultants working on our behalf. Future phases of this work will include condition assessments, development of maintenance and replacement strategies and asset planning.

This is the unofficial end to the summer, but we expect the warm temperatures to continue. Look up recreation trails on-line, https://hudsonshope.ca/adventure/parks-and-trails/, hard copy maps are available at the District office and the Visitor Centre. Get out and enjoy what nature has to offer.

What is an overdose

An overdose is when more drugs have been taken than the body can handle.

What are opioids?

Opioids such as heroin, oxycodone, fentanyl, vicodin, codeine, morphine and methadone suppress breathing, and in cases of overdose, can result in severe brain damage and even death due to oxygen deprivation.

What is fentanyl?

Fentanyl is a synthetic opiate narcotic, a prescription drug used primarily for cancer patients in severe pain. Fentanyl is extremely toxic. A piece of fentanyl the size of one or two grains of sand can cause an overdose. It is roughly 50 to 100 times more toxic than morphine.

Fentanyl is a contaminant you cannot see, smell or taste. It can be found in pills sold as fake oxys & other club drugs, in powder as heroin or fentanyl, & can be mixed in to other drugs like cocaine & crystal meth. People do not often think the substances they are using contain fentanyl.

Follow these tips to reduce the risk of overdose:

- Don't use alone
- Start with a small amount
- Mixing substances, including alcohol, increases
 - risk of overdose
- •Use where help is easily available (e.g. around other people)
- •Use less. If you took a break, as your tolerance is lower
- •If you have ever experienced an overdose, this may increase your risk to overdose again
- •Make a plan/know how to respond in case of an overdose

Take Home Naloxone Program

The Importance of a 9-1-1 Address

Properly displaying your civic number on your house or at the end of your drive ensures fast emergency response for the AMBULANCE, FIRE and POLICE Services. Precious minutes can pass while the emergency vehicle attempts to locate the emergency incident.

It is strongly recommended that you ensure that a civic address is posted with the following quidelines in place:

- •the civic address the District has assigned to the premises must be displayed on the principal building on the premises and must be legible from a minimum distance of fifteen (15) metres;
- •where a building is set back from the street or roadway fronting the property such that the assigned street address is not clearly legible from the street or roadway, or where land-scaping or architectural appurtenances or other obstructions obstruct the address, the assigned street address shall also be displayed at the driveway entrance from the street or road serving the building on a weather-resistant sign permanently mounted on a post and visible from all direction of traffic flow; and
- •letters or numbers displayed on a building must be of a colour which contrasts with the background colour of the building or sign.

Homeowner Information to Building Permits

The District of Hudson's Hope wants to assist homeowners and contractors to avoid unnecessary delays and expense in planning and construction of residential projects. Below explains when permits are required, requirements for the permit, possible other documents that may be required and other information to assist you in obtaining your building permit. Additional information is available at the District Office or online at www.hudsonshope.ca

A BUILDING PERMIT IS REQUIRED TO:

- construct a new home;
- •locate mobile / modular home;
- construct a commercial, industrial or public use building;
- •construct a new accessory building e.g., carport, farm building, garage or storage shed;
- renovate existing buildings;
- •undertake any structural work such as interior partitions;
- enclose a porch or roof over a sundeck;
- •move or demolish a building;
- •re-roof a building;
- reconstruct after damage;
- plumbing system changes;

INFORMATION TO BE SUBMITTED WITH A BUILDING PERMIT APPLICATION

The following items must be supplied along with a completed Building Permit Application before a Building Permit can be issued. A Building Permit fee is based on the value of the building or structure and will be calculated by the Building Official.

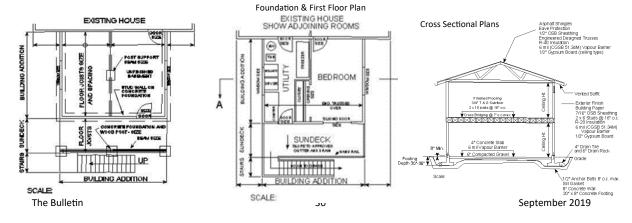
1. BUILDING PLANS

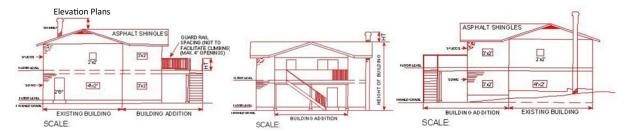
Two sets of detailed building plans. If you cannot draw the necessary building or site plans, then you should obtain the services of a qualified person.

Example Floor Plans

- scale not less than 1:50 metric (1/4 inch to 1 foot);
- size and location of windows and doors;
- location of all plumbing fixtures;
- location of all mechanical equipment.

- all rooms, size and use of each;
- all dimensions;
- finished and unfinished areas; —





2. SITE PLAN

- full legal description of lot: lot number, plan number; district lot number (from your tax notice or Title);
- lot dimensions;
- adjoining street names;
- locations and uses of existing and proposed buildings or additions;
- distances from all property lines for existing and proposed buildings or additions;
- location of legal road access to the property;
- size, location and number of parking spaces;
- existing and proposed wells or other water sources;
- location of existing or proposed sewage disposal fields on property;
- location of any watercourses on property showing distances from existing or proposed buildings or additions;

This information is intended to assist the general public in applying for a Building Permit within the District of Hudson's Hope.

BUILDING INSPECTIONS (Typical)

The Building Bylaw requires inspections at the following stages of construction;

- Footings prior to pouring concrete.
- Backfilling after completion of damp-proofing, drain tile, and drain rock (if required), but prior to backfilling.
- Plumbing before any part of the plumbing system is covered.
- Framing after the entire rough-in plumbing, electrical and mechanical equipment is installed and the framing is completed to lockup stage, but prior to insulating.
- Insulation and Vapour Barrier after all insulation and vapour barriers are installed, but prior to covering.
- Final when the building or portion thereof is completed and ready for occupancy, but prior to occupancy thereof.

An Occupancy Certificate is required prior to occupancy of a building. In order for an Occupancy Certificate to be issued, all inspections above must be approved.
