Police Report: NOVEMBER 2019



Hud- son's Hope RCMP responded to 30 calls for service between October 24th and November 12th. 45 written violations and warning tickets were issued to drivers between the above dates. Highway and road safety continues to be a big focus for the Hudson's Hope RCMP. Police have received reports to the increas-

ing number of vehicles speeding along Beattie Drive, therefore police will be monitoring this area frequently, especially with the school season now in effect. Speeding fines can range from \$138.00 to \$196.00, with excessive speeding resulting in a \$368.00 fine and a 7 day impound of the vehicle. Speeding in school zone fines range from \$196.00 to \$253.00. Please obey local speed limits within our community.

On October 16th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a vehicle on fire near the Farrell Creek bridge. Local Fire attended the scene and confirmed that no persons were injured or within the vehicle. Upon further examination, it was confirmed that this vehicle is the one that has been left in place since July due to the truck being on Crown land and having no ownership. Environment Canada was notified but to date, no actions have been taken.

On October 26th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP conducted a road-check near Ardill Ave. where police checked multiple drivers for sobriety. During the stop, one driver was issued a 24hr driving prohibition for being found under the influence, and police also found several drivers with open cannabis within the vehicle, which was seized. As a reminder with the new Cannabis Act regarding the transportation of cannabis in a motor vehicle:

"An adult can operate a vehicle, whether or not the vehicle is in motion, if the following conditions are met: If the cannabis was produced by a federal producer, is still in the packaging from its purchase by a consumer and the packaging has never been opened; Cannabis is not readily accessible to the driver and any passengers in the vehicle, or There are no more than 4 cannabis plants that are not budding or flowering.(CCLA, sec. 81(2)."

Contravention of the above Act can result in a \$230.00 ticket and full seizure of all cannabis found.

On November 5th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of several break and enters/thefts that had occurred to oil field lots and buildings along the Core Rd. and Farrell Creek Rd. with several large items being stolen. Oil field security personnel have obtained and provided evidence of several vehicles that may be involved and this continues to be an open police investigation.

On November 8th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of an aggressive male deer (buck) that was observed chasing a loose dog. Police conducted patrols but were unable to locate the exact deer but the dog was unscaved and returned to its owner. As a reminder, it is that time of the year where the bucks only have one thing on their minds, "Love is in the Air" (quoting John Paul Young), and to refrain from approaching and or attempting to feed any deer or other wildlife as well as keeping your dogs secure from roaming freely.

Protect yourself against auto crime:

Hudson's Hope may seem like an isolated community and far from crime one would expect in a larger town, however, thefts of vehicles and thefts from vehicles do occur here. Please take the time to lock your vehicles and remove any valuables from inside even if you are only away from your vehicle for a short time such as when getting your mail or running into the store. Don't keep your wallets, purses or spare keys inside the vehicle even it is in your driveway.

What you can do:

- Treat your keys like cash. Never leave your keys unguarded, such as at the gym or at the office.
- Park in secure, well-lit areas. Always lock your doors and close the windows, even if you're only away from your vehicle for a few minutes. When possible, try to park in areas near pedestrian traffic.
- Remove valuables from your vehicle. Shopping bags, tools, spare change, electronics, and brief cases can all tempt a thief. If it can be stolen, put it in the trunk.
- Wait for garage door gates to close behind you. Don't give thieves a chance to sneak in to a parkade.
- Keep your garage door opener out of sight. Store your garage door remote in a glove box or other concealed place, or take it with you.
- Use an electronic engine immobilizer or steering wheel lock. Additional antitheft devices can help secure your vehicle, particularly if it was manufactured before 2007.
- Don't store a spare key in your vehicle. Keep your spare key or valet at home or on your person.
- ◆ Electronic immobilizers are anti-theft devices that cut off power to a vehicle's fuel, starter, or ignition system when not in use. If your vehicle is equipped with a passive electronic immobilizer, you may be eligible for discounts and savings.
- Vehicle alarms will draw attention to would-be thieves with sirens, beeps and other loud noises. Some systems will also trigger flashing lights.
- Steering wheel locks are good visual deterrents. However, they may not be enough protection if your vehicle has a moderate to high risk of being stolen.







DISTRICT OF HUDSON'S HOPE PUBLIC WORKS NEWS & VIEWS



It's the festive time of year, and for those that celebrate, Merry Christmas, Happy Hanukkah, Happy Kwanzaa, and all the other festivities I've missed. Best wishes to all

November is a time for planning the up-coming year. We, at Public Works are assessing our needs for 2020 and developing our work plan for the year. We are also developing some service level planning for winter maintenance, grass cutting, as well as preparing orders for next year's flowers. The service level planning allows us to make the best use of our resources, however, the best laid plans are still subject to the cooperation of the weather.

November did see the completion of our quonset hut (at least all but the front). We now have sheltered storage in the back of the public works yard. This will be used for offseason equipment, as well as water/sewer pipe storage.

November saw our first significant snow fall, and our crews were out before the Remembrance Day ceremonies to ensure the roads and sidewalks were safe to use.



Crews have prepared our winter sand/salt mix, and yes, it is a sand mix this year, not a stone mix. Part of our stone crushing program this summer allowed us to prepare material for winter use. Please let us know your thoughts of this new mix at

Our new loader has a multi position snow blade attachment that should make it easier to clear parking lots and other snow clean-up jobs. The blade assembly was mated to the loader in the third week of November and is ready to use in future storms.

All the attachments have a "quick-attach" so changing between the bucket, snow blade and pallet forks is a simple and quick pro-

cess. This ensures we have the right attachment for the job at hand.

The storm sewers were also cleaned out in November. This removes leaves and other debris that accumulates in the catch basins. This debris can contribute to freezing of the storm sewer as storm water run off cannot flow away to the river. The seasonal lights are up at Beattie Park in preparation for the Lighting Up festivities on December 1st. Come out and enjoy the lights, hot drinks, Christmas floats and the cheer of friends and neighbours.

The staff and management of the Public Works Department wish you all the very best for a happy and safe holiday season. And remember, if you drink, don't drive, and if you drive, don't drink.

PROTECTIVE SERVICES

What is a Winter Tire?

British Columbia accepts "mountain snowflake" or "mud and snow" tires with at least 3.5 mm tread as winter tires.

Check your tires for these signs:

The mountain/snowflake symbol on the side of the tire These winter tires offer the best traction on snow and ice, and in cold weather.

The mud and snow symbol on the side of the tire These winter tires offer better traction than summer tires, however, they are less effective than mountain/snowflake tires on snow and ice, and in cold weather.

3.5 mm tread Tires must have 3.5 mm of tread remaining to be considered winter tires.

Matching Winter Tires You must have at least 2 matching winter tires on the same axle, but it is recommended to use 4 matching tires.

Studded Tires

May be used on BC highways from October 1 to April 30, but **must** have mountain/snowflake or M+S symbols to be considered winter tires.

When are Winter Tires or Chains Right for Me?

Winter tires and chains can make your vehicle safer.

You **MUST** use winter tires (passenger vehicles) or carry chains (commercial trucks) between October 1 and March 31 on **most BC Highways.**

British Columbia's climates range from freezing cold to pleasantly mild in the winter; equipping your vehicle appropriately depends on what you are driving and where you are driving. Drivers in some parts of the southern coast, where regulations are more relaxed due to warmer weather, should use discretion when equipping their vehicles.


