### 1. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting called to order at 6:00 p.m. with Mayor Dave Heiberg presiding.

### 2. **DELEGATIONS**

Mayor Heiberg and Council unanimously agreed to extend the time allocated for the Dawson Road Maintenance Delegation as per s. 30 Delegations (3), Council Procedure Bylaw No. 765, 2009.

- D1(a) Kevin McNee, Manager Operations, Dawson Road Maintenance presented on Winter Preparedness and noted the following:
  - There are currently three trucks and a grader for Hudson's Hope, with one truck still to come and therefore response times for Hudson's Hope will be faster
  - 9.5 mm of winter sand is now being used and is safer for windshields, with 12 mm of winter sand having been used in the past, although noted that 9.5 mm may prove to be too small
  - Required maximum response time is 90 minutes for up to 4 centimeters of snowfall
  - Canyon Drive is Class C, which is a school bus route, and the response time is within 4 hours
  - People can submit requests to Dawson Road Maintenance who are then obligated to respond within 24 hours

Below please find highlights of some of the activities done or going on in the Public Works Department during the last month;

- Water Treatment Plant (WTP):
  - a. Work Progress: While the progress of Well drilling and Testing are satisfactory, we are facing challenges on overall progress of New Water Supply Systems.
  - b. Pump Testing: Pump testing sub-contractor (Precision Services) is testing the production capacity and quality of water. The field work of Well #1 was done on November 13, 2019 and the contractor is working on Well #2 which should be finished by the week of November 25, 2019.
  - c. Pump Design, WTP Pre-Design, and Tender: Review and revision of draft Designs and Tenders for Pumps and WTP is going on. A 3<sup>rd</sup> Party consultant of BC Hydro is doing peer review of the design and tender. We are behind schedule for design and tender by six (6) weeks. However, it is estimated that the overall completion may be within the deadline.
  - d. Monitoring well: Installation of a 5" diameter monitoring well completed on November 3, 2019 near the swimming pool.
- Adam street lift station: Recently we received two (2) alarm calls from Adam Street Lift Station during
  the normal work hours. Similar calls we received few times during the last six (6) months, some of
  those were after hour call outs. We must upgrade the electrical system like Kendrick Lift Station.
- Snow cleaning: First heavy snow fall of the season occurred during the Remembrance Day weekend. Staff did a good job in cleaning snow.
- Christmas light: The preparatory work of Christmas lights is going on. Should be done by the week of November 25, 2019.
- Quonset hut is completed except the front wall and a door, which will be done in coming spring.
- Lucas subdivision: Fill materials work completed by contractor and deficiencies fixed by in-house crew.
- Light Industrial Subdivision: Submitted a letter to the Ministry of Transportation for waiver of Traffic
  Impact Assessment (TIA). Followed up with them. They are reviewing the memo and will get back to us
  after getting feedback from their design review team.
- Water conservation study: Urban Systems submitted a draft report on water conservation study. Staff reviewed the draft and provided comments on the draft report.
- Except Beattie Lift station, all capital projects for 2019 have been completed. Working on Capital Projects Planning for next year.


This report is a synopsis of the activities of the various branches of the Protective Services Department.

# Hudson's Hope Fire Rescue



Hudson's Hope Fire Rescue hosted the annual Halloween fireworks show which resulted in the department raising over \$1500.00 for Muscular Dystrophy. The display this year was the first year that the entire show was conducted using electronic firing devices rather than the traditional hand-lighting method. To achieve this, department member participated in many hours of training and preparation to ensure that this transition went smoothly. This electronic method provides many advantages over hand lighting, including improved safety for staff as well as greater control over the visual aspects of the display.

The department also conducted the annual door to door food drive for the Friends of Hudson's Hope on 05 November 2019. This year was the best ever in terms of the amount of food donated and gathered from the community. The department also received \$946.00 in cash donations for the Friends of Hudson's Hope.

Three fire department members completed 16 hours of training on the weekend of 09-10 November in Chetwynd. This training focused on fire ground supervision and incident command, and meets the Team Leader requirements as per the provincial Playbook training standard.

One member attended 20 hours of Incident Safety Officer training 15-17 November in Charlie Lake. This training provides the student with the skills needed to effectively recognize hazards on the fire ground, and to implement risk management measures to ensure the safety of the responders.

The Director of Protective Services will be presenting to Council in December a report on the implementation of a risk-based regular system of fire inspections. This system of inspections for public buildings is a requirement of the BC Fire Services Act, and the report will outline the responsibilities of the District as well as a rationale on inspection frequencies. Inspection frequencies will also be outlined in a new policy which will also be presented to Council in conjunction with the report.

### **Emergency Preparedness**

The Northeast BC (NEBC) Emergency and Public Alert System continues to be advertised throughout the Peace through a variety of venues including print, radio, billboards, and attendance at trade shows. The District of Hudson's Hope continues to promote the system on our Facebook page, website, PSA, and the Bulletin. To date there are 1063 subscribers within the Peace including 123 within the Hudson's Hope area. To ensure that new residents to the area are aware of the program, the District has worked with BC Hydro to include information into their new employee orientations for local facilities. This information describes the merits of the NEBC Emergency and Public Alert system, as well as information on how to sign up.



### BACKGROUND:

Chapter 26, part 5, Section 130 of the Community Charter states that;

- (1) The Council must, in accordance with its applicable procedure bylaw, provide for the designation of a Councillor as the member responsible for acting in the place of the Mayor when the Mayor is absent or otherwise unable to act or when the office of Mayor is vacant.
- (2) If both the Mayor and member designated under subsection (1) are absent from a Council meeting, the members present must choose a member to preside.
- (3) The member designated under subsection (1) or chosen under subsection (2) has the same powers and duties as the Mayor in relation to the applicable matter.

District of Hudson's Hope Council Procedure Bylaw No. 765, 2009 Part 2, Section 8 provides for the designation of a Councillor as the member responsible for acting in place of the Mayor. The proposed 2020 Acting Mayor Schedule is attached.

### BACKGROUND:

At the April 8, 2019 Council meeting, Council passed the following resolution

RESOLUTION NO.107/19

M/S Councillors Quibell/Gibbs

That

"Council direct the Public Works department to investigate the signage needs within the District and to bring back a report outlining where new signage is required and where existing signage needs to be removed."

CARRIED

As per the Council direction, staff visited all of the roads of the District of Hudson's Hope to gather information on traffic signage. These include Regulatory and Warning Signs. A further assessment will be required for Information signs.

Traffic signs should be designed and installed in accordance with the Canadian Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices (CMUTCD) and/or the Provincially adopted variations. The CMUTCD is the nationally recognized document for traffic control signs in Canada and is endorsed by all provinces.

Signs are broken into four (4) prime categories, Regulatory, Warning, Construction and Information. Each of these sign groups have individual characteristics, although there is overlap in the Warning and Construction signage with the prime difference being colour.

Regulatory signs include such items as "Stop", "Speed", "No Parking", etc. and are primarily black on white with a red border. Warning signs include, "Sharp Turn", "Checkerboard", "Playground Ahead", etc. and are usually black on yellow background with a black border. Information signs are primarily destination guidance signs, such as tourism information, street names, points of interest; these are typically a blue background.

Uniformity in traffic signs has led to standards which have adopted pictograms as opposed to written messaging wherever possible. The pictures are more universally understood and do not typically require any translation from one language to another. In addition, signs are assigned a number which is mostly consistent across the country.

Staff have identified 142 regulatory and warning signs in the District. These signs were identified by travelling around the District and physically recording them. Of these 142 signs, 70 were stop signs (Rb-1); all of these but one is a standard 60cm x 60cm size.

Ra-1 STOP sign

The purpose of a STOP sign is to clearly assign right-of-way between vehicles approaching an intersection from different directions when traffic signals are not warranted or not yet installed, and it is determined that a YIELD sign is inadequate. The STOP sign requires the driver to stop the vehicle before entering the intersection, yield to any traffic in or approaching the intersection and then proceed when safe to do so. STOP signs are not intended, nor should they be used as a speed control device. There use should be limited to the control of right-of-way conflicts.

It was noted that there was some misuse of signs (or incorrect signage) at various locations. This included using a "TAB" sign (Rb-7T) for speed control as opposed to a full speed limit sign (Rb-1). Also, the use of "Playground Ahead" (Wc-3) has been used where there are no playgrounds such as Ferguson Street at Jamieson Ave, Kruger Street at Canyon Drive, Paquette Ave at Kyllo Street, Peck Ave at Dr. Greene Street etc. Further assessment of these signs should be undertaken with a view to removing signs which do not serve their intended purpose.

Wa-31 No Exit

The purpose of the NO EXIT sign is to warn motorists at an entrance to a side road that the side road has no outlet. The sign is intended to divert through traffic and prevent unnecessary and potentially hazardous back-tracking manoeuvres.

The NO EXIT sign must be used at the entry point to a roadway that has no outlet. The sign must be posted conspicuously on both sides of the entrance, at an angel of 45 degrees to the centreline of the no exit road, so as to be easily seen by traffic approaching from the left, right or head-on.

The use of the bulbous CU-DE-SAC sign has fallen out of favour over the last few years and the NO EXIT sign is the preferred replacement.

### Condition Assessment

Of the 142 signs installed, 52 were considered "good", 45 were considered "fair", the balance (45) were in "poor" condition.

Approximately half of the signposts were leaning – an indication of weak base. This can be remedied by reinstalling the posts into a firmer footing. Older "U-Channel" posts or leaning round posts should be replaced with "Square tube" posts. Solid round posts can be sanded and repainted to a bright white (perhaps a summer student task).

At the intersection of Kyllo Street and Fredette Avenue, all three STOP signs are missing the "3-Way" TAB. This is an indication to motorists that traffic stops on all approaches and should be installed.

Speed limit signs indicated only by a TAB sign should be replaced with a proper Rb-1 SPEED sign. The KM/H tab is not required as all speed limits in Canada are measured in kilometres. There are ten (10) SPEED signs, three are TAB signs only and half of all SPEED signs are in "poor" condition.

Of the 70 STOP signs, 12 are in "POOR" condition and should be replaced, sooner rather than later.

On Holland Street, immediately north of MacIntosh Crescent there is a SCHOOL CROSSING sign over a PLAYGROUND AHEAD sign. The PLAYGROUND AHEAD sign is superfluous as the SCHOOL CROSSING sign conveys the message that children are present.

### Missing Signs

The District has numerous dead-end roadways. These should all be marked with the two (2) "No Exit" signs and at the end of each there should be a CHECKERBOARD (Wa-8) sign. There are at least nine (9) CHECKERBOARD signs in the core area alone.

### Installation

Installation of multiple traffic signs is best completed with a crew of three, one to auger holes and two to follow up with the post and sign blade and backfill the hole. Replacement of sign blades can typically be completed by a single employee, removing and reinstalling the sign only.

### Reassessment of Need

Many of the signs in town can be removed (e.g; Rose Ave at Stage St. STOP sign) or replaced with a sign with lesser regulatory control, e.g. STOP sign to YIELD sign or no sign.

All regulatory, warning and construction signs now have some level of reflectivity to improve visibility. The recommended replacement schedule for signs is a maximum of ten (10) years. At this age the reflectivity of the signs is gone.

### **ALTERNATIVES:**

- 1. Develop a multi-year plan to replace signs deemed to be in "poor" condition, replace the signs which are incorrectly used, and those that are "missing" from the road network.
- 2. Do nothing

### FINANCIAL ASSESSMENT:

The average cost for installing a traffic sign is \$300 per sign (materials, equipment and labour). This cost goes down if several signs are being installed at the same time and in the same vicinity. Based on a recent purchase, the material cost for a typical sign is \$55 and a post is \$120.

To replace signs on an on-going basis, approximately 10% of all signs should be replaced every year – not including damaged or new signs. After an initial replacement of worn signs and wrong/missing signage an annual budget of about \$2,000 per annum for next 10 years should be sufficient to maintain the installed sign inventory.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

THAT Administration consider traffic sign replacement cost under Operating Budget to commence a multi-year replacement/ management strategy for traffic signs.

### Province moves forward with leaders' table on caribou recovery in the Peace

Victoria - Premier John Horgan met with Chief Ken Cameron of the Saulteau First Nations and Chief Roland Willson of the West Moberly First Nations on Wednesday, Nov. 6, 2019, to discuss moving forward with a leaders' table to support the recovery of the endangered central group of the southern mountain caribou, while maintaining the social and economic well-being of communities in the northeast region of British Columbia.

The leaders' table will build on the work initiated by Minister Doug Donaldson and staff with the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development.

The leaders' table will discuss next steps in moving forward to implement the Intergovernmental Partnership Agreement that was negotiated in response to the threat to the caribou identified under the federal Species at Risk Act. The leaders' table will also review potential approaches to mitigating natural resource and land use impacts of the agreement, while advancing caribou protection.

The leaders' table will include the Chiefs of the two Nations, CEOs and executives from the forestry, mining and oil and gas industries, local government representatives, including mayors and a representative of the Peace River Regional District, as well as deputy ministers from the governments of Canada and British Columbia.

It is anticipated that the first meeting of the leaders' table will take place later this month. The Province's facilitation team will be in touch with participants over the next few days to arrange a meeting date.
