

HOME OWNER GRANTS AND YOU

The home owner grant <u>reduces</u> the amount of property taxes you pay each year on your <u>principal residence</u>.

The regular grant (also called the basic grant) amount for people under the age of 65 in our area is \$770.00. The additional grant for Seniors (over 65) or persons with disabilities, the amount is \$1045.00.

Do I Qualify?

To qualify for the grant, you must:

- 1. Be the registered owner of the residence
- 2. Be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident of Canada
- 3. Live in BC
- 4. Occupy the residence as your principal residence.

For the purpose of claiming the home owner grant, you can only have <u>one</u> principal residence. If you own more than one home, you cannot designate which one is your principal residence. Your principal residence is the usual place that you <u>live</u> and conduct your daily affairs.

You must apply for the grant each year to receive it. When you receive your property tax notice, we highly recommend that you claim your homeowner grant, even if you are not able to pay your property tax amount owing at that time.

Claiming your grant will **reduce** the amount of your balance owing on your taxes. If you are unable to pay the amount owing before the due date, claiming your grant will also **reduce** the **amount of the penalty** applied to your account.

If you forget to claim your grant before the end of the year, on January 1st, the amount will roll to Arrears and start collecting interest. You may be able to claim the grant retroactively.

You can claim your home owner grant by signing the form on the back of your current property tax form. This can be dropped off at the District Office or mailed. You can also claim your grant online at www.hudsonshope.ca and follow the links on the page for the home owner grant.

Under this Act, one can be issued a violation ticket and a fine for the following

Failure to wear face covering in an indoor public space (includes the
wearing of a face covering that does not cover a person's mouth and
nose, and wearing of face coverings made of material insufficient to
provide coverage of the mouth and nose),

Section: 3(1), fine of \$230.

Note: Face shields alone **ARE NOT** considered to be face coverings.

- Abusive or belligerent behavior (regarding a face covering requirement or policy towards an operator or visitor of an indoor public space),
 Section: 5(2), fine of \$230.
- Fail to comply with direction from an enforcement officer (ie:when asked to leave an indoor space),

Section: 6, fine of \$230.

- Contravention of the Gatherings and Events Order,
 Section: 2(2), fine of \$2,300.
- Contravention of the Food and Liquor Serving Premises Order, Section 2(2), fine of \$2,300.
- Promote or encourage attendance at non-compliant gathering or event,
 Section: 4, fine of \$230.
- Fail to comply with patron conditions or requirements,
 Section: 7(1), fine of \$230.



Police Report Oct/ Nov 2020



Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to 24 calls for service between October 18th and November 16th. 61 written violations and warning tickets were issued to drivers between the above dates with 44 of those violations being speeding in the school zone along Beattie Dr. Highway and road safety continues to be a big focus for the Hudson's Hope RCMP with the school zone along Beattie Drive and the construction zones along Hwy 29 being the largest focuses for traffic enforcement at this time.

Police have been monitoring the multiple construction zones along Hwy 29 between Hudson's Hope and the Half Way Bridge and have issued a multitude of speeding tickets to drivers over the past few weeks. We are asking drivers to take heed to the white regulatory speed signs and drive accordingly so that the construction workers and flaggers can conduct their work safely.

On October 20th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a theft from motor vehicle from within the parking lot of a local hotel. It was reported that early in the morning the owner of the vehicle observed a dark colored mini-van parked behind his truck and saw an unknown person standing beside the open door of his truck. By the time the owner exited and reached the parking lot, the van had sped away. Several pieces of survey equipment and other personal items were noted to be stolen. This continues to be an open file at this time.



On October 20th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a cow that had fallen through the ice atop a slough and was unable to get out. Upon police attending, they found a young calf still treading water and surrounded by ice, unable to get out on his own. Police used what means were available to break the ice up, creating a path, and with the help of locals and some per-

sons who stopped to help, a lasso was placed around the calf and he was heaved out. Though wet and exhausted, "Dugout Danny" eventually got to his feet and was later observed being scolded by his mother.

The Bulletin 10 December 2020

On October 24th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a vehicle collision along Hwy 29 with one of the vehicles fleeing the scene prior to police attending. Upon police locating and stopping this vehicle, the driver was found to be intoxicated and was subsequently charged with operating a conveyance while impaired with the truck and trailer being towed.

On October 27th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a fraud in which a local resident was the victim of. A call was received from an unknown person who was claiming to be the daughter of the call-taker and that she had been involved in a motor vehicle accident in which a child was injured and that she was being charged and needed bail money. A short time later, another unknown person called and advised the call-taker that he was a lawyer and that he required money for bail for her daughter but that she could not speak to anyone about this. Unfortunately, before the call-taker caught onto the fact that this was a fraudulent call, monies had been forwarded. Police are still investigating this file but would like to advise the public that if they receive any calls that sound suspicious in nature, to contact their financial institutes and or the RCMP prior to forwarding any money.

On November 10th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of an abandoned Polaris Ranger side x side ATV that was found near a work site along Canyon Dr. This ATV had been sitting in place for several days with no one around, therefore police seized it and are currently looking to track down the owner.

Heating Safety

There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fireplace. But did you know that heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

BE WARM AND SAFE THIS WINTER!

- Weep anything that can burn at least three-feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms monthly.



Your Source for SAFETY Information

Heating Equipment Smarts

Install wood burning stoves following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.

Install and maintain CO alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning. If you smell gas in your gas heater, do do not light the appliance. Leave the home immediately and call your local fire department or gas company.

Half of home heating fires are reported during the months of **December**, **January**, and **February**.

Re: In-water works begin on Hudson's Hope berm

Dear Hudson's Hope resident,

We're writing to let you know that in-water construction will soon be starting on the Hudson's Hope shoreline protection berm.

This means that we will be placing riprap in the water, as we start to build up the berm. Excavators will be used to place riprap (large crushed rocks) hauled from Portage Mountain Quarry.

Berm construction is starting in the eastern end of town near D. A. Thomas Road, and gradually moving west. The berm – a large barrier made of riprap, rocks and gravel – will reinforce the shoreline and protect it from potential erosion once the Site C reservoir is filled.

Environmental monitoring

- Water monitoring: We've installed two monitors in the water to regularly sample and
 measure the sedimentation of the water. Work will be paused if the impact of the work on
 water quality exceeds permitted levels.
- Air quality monitoring: The air quality monitoring station in Hudson's Hope is currently
 measuring dust and exhaust during construction of the berm.

What to expect

- Nearby residents may experience increased levels of noise, dust and vibration during work hours.
- Boaters must stay away from machinery and construction in the water. Boater safety signs have been placed in the river.
- · For safety reasons, the public must stay out of construction zones.


