HUDSON'S HOPE SIGN - PEACE VIEW PULLOUT, HIGHWAY 29

RECOMMENDATION

THAT Council refer to Staff to research costs associated with replacing the current Hudson's Hope sign at the Peace View Pullout on Highway 29 for inclusion in the 2021 Operations Budget discussions.

BACKGROUND

The current sign that is located at the Peace View Pullout on Highway 29 near Fort St. John was purchased by the District in 2012 for approximately \$4,000, which included a one-hour design charge, a 96"x96" vinyl roll print, 4x4 pressure treated posts and strapping, miscellaneous supplies, travel costs and installation. The sign was installed 8 years ago and is badly damaged and should either be removed or replaced, and if a decision is made to replace then pictures and text could be updated.

Staff checked with the Planning Department of the Peace River Regional District to ask if they had any knowledge of the process for removing or replacing the sign, and they suggested contacting the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure. The Ministry advised on January 6, 2021 that they have reached out to their contact in the Provincial Sign Program regarding the process that would need to be followed to remove or replace the sign and that they would follow-up with the District.



RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That Council be authorized to attend a half-day Budget Workshop to review the draft Operating and Capital Budget for 2021.

BACKGROUND:

On November 7, 2020, the District Council attended a half day Strategic Planning session to review the accomplishments of the 2020 capital projects and review the needs of capital projects in 2021.

Also, on December 14, 2020 Council pre-approved three (3) capital projects for early tender in 2021.

DISCUSSION:

The purpose of the Budget Workshop is to review and discuss the Draft Operating and Capital Budget for 2021 by Council. The attendance of this meeting will be the Mayor, Council and concerned staff.

The operating budget discussion would be simple, as we are just proposing a 2% increase in most of the account codes to cover inflation. This year, we are going to show three columns in operating budget to show the comparison of couple of years of operating revenues and expenditures: 2020 budget, 2020 actual as of December 31, 2020, and 2021 proposed budget.

The Capital Budget for 2021 would be discussed in detail. Council pre-approved three (3) capital projects for early tender in 2021 which are i) water quality improvement in the water reservoir, ii) MacDougall Sanitary & Street Rehabilitation, iii) Lynx Creek Re-pavement (Ph-2). Staff identified these three projects as top three projects for 2021. Staff would submit draft work sheets for each capital project for consideration. In addition, there will be a brief discussion on a draft 10 years capital plan (2021-2030) in this meeting.

ALTERNATIVES:

- 1. Organize a half-day Budget Workshop on any Saturday (February 13, February 6 or February 20) from 9am to 12:00pm. Alternatively, it would be organized in any workday from 4 to 7pm (or 5 to 8pm).
- 2. Do not organize Budget workshop and submit proposed budget directly to Council like the other years.

- Maureen LeBourdais, Director, Cariboo Regional District: Discuss the Regional Connectivity Learning Network, a learning commons that helps local governments understand what is needed to improve internet connectivity in north-central BC.
- Mike Pilon, Director of Projects, CityWest: Present on the expansion of internet infrastructure, particularly its fibre-to-home technology, to communities in northern BC
- Garth Frizzell, President, FCM and Councillor, City of Prince George: Provide a national overview of local
 governments' needs and FCM's work to drive federal government funding for broadband internet infrastructure
 in rural communities
- Christine Gagne, Partner Programs Manager, Northern Development Initiative Trust: Discuss provincial government funding programs to support internet infrastructure and connectivity in northern BC communities

Northern Health administers first COVID-19 vaccines in Prince George

The first doses of COVID-19 vaccine were administered to a group of high-risk health care workers in Prince George on Tuesday, December 22.

The first person to receive the vaccine in the Northern Health region was Biserka Becker, a care aide at Jubilee Lodge in Prince George (see photo above). Biserka was vaccinated along with a group of health care workers from University Hospital of Northern BC, and the nearby Jubilee Lodge long-term care facility.

Dr. Marietije Slabbert, the physician lead for the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) at UHNBC, was also among the group to receive the vaccine. Dr. Slabbert is considered a high-risk health care worker because of her work in the ICU.

"This has been a really long journey for people working in health care, and the community at large, and it's wonderful that this vaccine has finally

arrived in the North; it's like the best Christmas present ever," said Dr. Slabbert. "The teams of physicians, nurses, care aides, cleaners -- everybody has been working so hard, and we'll continue working hard to get this vaccine to every person in the North who wants to be vaccinated."

Northern Health is distributing the vaccine in accordance with the priority vaccine groups as recommended by the <u>National Advisory Committee</u> on <u>Immunization</u>, beginning with:

- High-risk health care workers
- Long-term care and assisted living residents

As more vaccines are approved by Health Canada, more communities and more groups of people will receive the COVID-19 vaccine. We expect to be able to immunize all Northern BC residents who wish to have the vaccine by the end of 2021.

All COVID-19 vaccines will be free to everyone in British Columbia.

BCCDC testing guidelines updated to include priority symptoms

The BCCDC has updated testing guidelines to reflect priority symptoms. People experiencing the following symptoms should seek a COVID-19 test right away:

- Fever or chills
- Cough (Either new onset or worsening/exacerbation of chronic cough)
- · Loss of sense of smell or taste
- Difficulty breathing

People experiencing two or more of the following symptoms (not related to any other pre-existing conditions) for more than 24 hours should also seek a COVID-19 test:

- Sore throat
- Loss of appetite

- Extreme fatigue or tiredness
- Headache
- Body aches
- Nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea

For those who have had close contact with a COVID-19 case, and have even a single symptom included above, testing is recommended.
