The 2021 Business License statements have been mailed out. If you no longer require your Business License, please call the District Office to have your license cancelled. If you do not have a business license or are unsure if you require one, please stop in or call for more information.

Bylaw No. 504, 1994 clearly states "that no person shall carry on, within the Municipality, any business unless he or she is the holder of a valid and subsisting license issued to him or her under the bylaw by the License Inspector and shall pay therefore, to the License Inspector, the sum stated in the bylaw". The annual cost for a business license is

Reduced Fines

The Fee for a dog picked up at large is \$60.00. There is an additional fee of \$60.00 if they are not licensed (this does not include any boarding fees, if applicable).

Police Report Dec/Jan 2020/21



Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to 32 calls for service between December 15th and January 26th. 47 written violations and warning tickets were issued to drivers between the above dates with 36 of those violations being speeding in the school zone along Beattie Dr. Highway and road safety continues to be a big focus for the Hudson's Hope RCMP with the school zone along Beattie Drive and the construction zones along Hwy 29 being the largest focuses for traffic enforcement at this time.

On December 19th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP conducted a roadside checkstop along Beattie Dr. whereas police monitored motorists for mobile cellular device usage and speeding infractions. A violation ticket for distracted driving starts at \$368 with an additional \$175 for penalty points totaling \$543 for the first offence. If there are sequential ticketed violations for this offence within a 12-month period, the fines will almost double with each ticket which can result in a fine of \$14,928 by the 10th ticketed violation.

On December 22nd, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a tractor trailer hauling an insecure load of hay along Canyon Dr. Police located the truck and found that there were no tie straps or any means of securement applied to the large round bails which posed a risk to passing motorists. The driver of the truck was fined for insecure load of a commercial truck.



On December 22nd, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a cow moose that had walked out onto a frozen creek and fallen down. Due to the ice, the moose was unable to gain its footing and laid in place. After several hours, the moose was still observed in place and due to the cold weather and the fact that the moose was laying on straight ice, there

was a high likelihood that the moose could freeze to death due to lack of body heat. Police attended and with the assistance of a local resident and his tractor, the moose was successfully pushed off the ice and though unhappy to be touched by humans, tow straps and good ole muscle strength were utilized to further heave the cow moose onto dry ground where it later regained its footing and trotted off, never to speak of this incident again.

On December 31st, the Hudson's Hope RCMP stopped a vehicle for speeding along Canyon Dr. Upon the investigation, police confirmed that the novice driver was operating a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol, therefore the driver was issued a 12-hour driving suspension and several violation tickets.

On January 9th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP were advised of a local business that was operating in contravention of the EPA – Protective Measures (Covid -19 Order). Upon further investigation, police confirmed the violation and the business was fined with a \$2,300 ticket under the Covid-19 Act.


On January 23rd, the Hudson's Hope RCMP conducted a vehicle check-stop along Canyon Dr. where several vehicles including commercial trucks were stopped. No violations were observed during this check-stop, however police were able to confirm that the commercial trucks hauling rock along Canyon Dr. are still currently following all safety measures.

HOUSE NUMBERS SAVE LIVES

The Importance of a 9-1-1 Address

Properly displaying your civic number on your house or at the end of your driveway ensures fast emergency response for the **AMBULANCE**, **FIRE** and **POLICE** Services. Precious minutes can pass while the emergency vehicle attempts to locate the emergency incident.

It is strongly recommended that you ensure that a civic address is posted with the following guidelines in place:

- the civic address the District has assigned to the premises must be displayed on the principal building on the premises and must be legible from a minimum distance of fifteen (15) metres;
- where a building is set back from the street or roadway fronting the property such that the assigned street address is not clearly legible from the street or roadway, or where landscaping or architectural appurtenances or other obstructions obstruct the address, the assigned street address shall also be displayed at the driveway entrance from the street or road serving the building on a weather-resistant sign permanently mounted on a post and visible from all direction of traffic flow; and
- letters or numbers displayed on a building must be of a colour which contrasts with the background colour of the building or sign.


Automated External Defibrillators


What are They?

An automated external defibrillator (AED) is a small, portable device used to identify cardiac rhythms and deliver a shock to correct abnormal electrical activity in the heart. AEDs are used to treat <u>sudden cardiac arrest</u> (SCA).

Up to 40,000 cardiac arrests occur each year in Canada. That's one cardiac arrest every 13 minutes.

Eighty-five per cent of cardiac arrests in Canada happen outside of hospitals, and having an AED close by can make all the difference. The American Heart Association warns that for every minute lost before defibrillation, the survival rate






Where are They?

Quick access to an AED can greatly improve a patient's survivability rate, and knowing where AEDs are located within your community can help facilitate this. Fortunately there are a number of AEDs located within the District of Hudson's Hope. Emergency responders including police, fire and BC Ambulance all have devices on their apparatus and vehicles. There are also AEDs located at the Arena in the winter and the Pool in the summer. Staff at these locations have training in their use. Hudson's Hope School has an AED in the staff room and has staff trained in its use. Other places that might be less obvious are the Library where an AED is on site, and staff and board members have received training in AED and CPR, and Silver Willow Court where they also have an AED available.

PUBLIC SERVICE NOTICE

LED Street Lights

BC Hydro has completed the conversion of all streetlights except four (4) from High Pressure Sodium (H.P.S – orange glow) to Light Emitting Diode (LED – white glow). Out of the remaining four lights, which are very high, two lights are near the intersection of Hwy 29/ Ross Street and two lights are in Beryl Prairie. These four lights will be done by BC Hydro crews in the near future.

The conversion of streetlights project commenced on January 6th, 2021 and was completed on January 10th, 2021.

These new streetlights help improve public safety by increasing the visibility of sidewalks and roads at night and help to reduce light pollution. LEDs also last longer and require less maintenance.

Item Returns and Drop-Offs: All normal book returns and donations are only accepted in the exterior book drop due to quarantining protocols. Vulnerable Patron Access on Mondays includes front line and essential service workers later in the day to accommodate vulnerable patrons first.

Canada Reads: The library has all of the Canada Reads books on order! Some will have arrived by the time this goes to print, but others are delayed. Patrons may only take out only one Canada Reads contender title at a time and have the book returned within a week so that other patrons have a chance to read them before they go head-to-head on March 8-11. Overdrive Merged with RBDigital: RBDigital's eBook and audiobook collections have been transferred over to Overdrive. RBDigital is still providing eMagazines as well as IndieFlix. This means that you will be able to access magazines through RBDigital or Zinio apps and website, you can access IndieFlix through RBDigital or IndieFlix apps and you can access all of our electronic audiobook and eBook collections on Libby or Overdrive.

Overdrive Collection Boost: NELF (North East Library Federation) has approved a budget to supplement the collection provincially organized Library2Go collection on Overdrive. This new budget allocation impacts all seven member libraries here in the north east! The newly allocated funds will allow the Federation Manager to review the NELF holds list

monthly and purchase copies exclusively for our NELF patrons, thus decreasing the wait time for our members. This means that items that currently have a 6 month hold could be reduced to 15 weeks or even down to an immediate hold as soon as NELF makes a purchase! The purchase plan moving forward is to add titles once a month based on a predetermined threshold of holds within the system. This will not impact <u>all</u> 6 month holds, only those that reach a certain threshold for all NELF library patrons, meeting purchase requirements for the NELF budget. So, with this news, please don't be reluctant to place a hold because the wait list is long... it may not be as long of a wait as it appears to be!

Did you know... that you can login in to your Overdrive account by linking over to their website from our website, rather than through the app? Accessing your account this way allows you to recommend titles before they are purchased by the Overdrive team! By doing this, you are automatically added to the hold queue! This is a great feature that allows you to get on the hold list for your favorite authors before they are added to the catalogue!




