



Canada Sun Guide

When you get a sunburn, the long-term effects of skin injured by the sun can be very serious. The more time young people spend unprotected in the sun, the higher their risk for developing skin cancer later in life. Dermatologists describe a burn as being the skin cells' response to injury. Getting a tan also injures skin cells. When skin cells are damaged skin cancer can result from these irreparable cell mutations.

Outdoor physical activity can be healthy, fun and safe if you remain protected. Follow the *Canada Sun Guide*, created by Canada Safety Council and other partners, to help Canadians combine sun safety with outdoor activities.

Minimize Sun Exposure

- Schedule outdoor physical activities when UV rays are at their weakest—before 11am and after 4pm, especially between the months of April and October.
- Always keep children under the age of one out of the sun.
- Remember that skin doesn't have to be hot to burn, so don't be fooled by cloudy or overcast weather.
- Remember too that water, snow, sand and concrete can reflect and increase the sun's burning rays.



Seek and Create Shade

- Seek natural shade from trees and buildings.
- Plant trees in schoolyards and other play areas.
- Use shade umbrellas, or create other forms of shade if natural shade is not possible.
- Keep playpens, strollers and carriages in shaded areas.

Cover Up

- Cover children's heads, necks and ears with a broad brimmed hat when outdoors.
- Protect arms and legs with tightly woven, loose fitting, cotton clothing.
- Children should wear a T-shirt over their bathing suit, and long shorts instead of short shorts.
- Wear UVA/UVB protective sunglasses—children can wear them too.

Use Sunscreen

- Have children use a broad spectrum sunscreen (protects against both UVA and UVB rays) with an SPF of 15 or more.
- Apply sunscreen generously before all outdoor physical activities. Remember to apply at least 20 minutes before sun exposure. Reapply often, as perspiration will reduce the effectiveness.

Police Report June/July 2021



Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to 45 calls for service between May 17th and June 19th. 68 written violations and warning tickets were issued to drivers between the above dates with 47 of those violations being speeding in the school zone along Beattie Drive. Highway and road safety continues to be a big focus for the Hudson's Hope RCMP with the school zone along Beattie Drive and the various construction zones along Hwy 29 being the chief focus for traffic enforcement at this time.

Please make note of the numerous construction sites along Hwy 29 toward Fort St. John. Due to the increase of work sites along the highway, there is a large fluctuation between the speed zones for each site. Police will be monitoring these zones as they are a posted construction site and fines will range from \$196.00 to \$253.00 for speeding violations within a marked construction zone.

As many local residents have observed, there are two new shiny and flashy (literally) traffic enforcement signs that have been permanently erected within the 30km/hr school zone along Beattie Dr. These have been put in place to assist with the visualization of the school zone and to help reduce speeding through this zone. On May 22nd, the Hudson's Hope RCMP stopped a motorist for speeding through the school zone along Beattie Dr. who was found to be travelling at a speed of 91km/hr. The driver subsequently received an excessive speed ticket in the amount of \$368.00 and several points against their driver's license.

Between the above noted dates, the Hudson's Hope RCMP further charged three other motorists for excessive speed through the marked 30km/hr school zone, with recorded and confirmed speeds between 71 to 92km/hr.

On May 24th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP stopped a vehicle along Hwy 29 after receiving a report that the driver may be intoxicated. Upon the investigation it was confirmed that the driver had surpassed the legal limit and was subsequently charged with operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol.

On May 26th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP, in conjunction with CVSE members, conducted several road-side check stops throughout the town. During the check stops, several commercial and personal vehicles were stopped and ticketed for various traffic and Motor Vehicle Act offences.

On May 28th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to an industrial workplace accident that occurred within the Hudson's Hope area whereas a worker was severely

injured and transported to a local hospital where they were later flown out to a larger medical facility to receive medical treatment. This incident has since been turned over to Worksafe BC.

On June 6th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP conducted RCMP boat patrols on Dinosaur Lake. During several stops and checks of boaters, police checked for impaired operations and that all vessels were in compliance with the Canada Shipping Act, ie: safety equipment, proof of competency, and licencing/registration.

On June 10th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP stopped a motorist for speeding within the school zone along Beattie Dr. and during the investigation, it was found that the driver of the motor vehicle was prohibited from driving within the Province of British Columbia and was subsequently charged for driving while prohibited.

On June 14th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a motor vehicle accident involving a vehicle vs cow. The driver reported that they had been travelling along a township road when an escapee cow had jumped out in front of the vehicle, resulting in the vehicle striking the cow. Minor damages to the vehicle were incurred, and the cow fled the scene with no life threatening injuries but learnt this day that the greener grass was not worth crossing the fence for.



On June 16th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP were updated by the Northern Lights Wildlife Shelter that the bear cub that police and Conservation had seized from a search warrant on a local property back in June of 2020, was in route to be released back into the wild. "The Rock", who had been following Dwayne Johnson's meal guide, has since grown to be one of their largest black bear yearlings, and was now fully fit to be released back into the wilds where he belongs. The Wildlife Shelter stated that "The Rock had been

outfitted with a snazzy earing (ear tag), and that they encourage hunters to report back to them if they are to ever legally harvest a bear that has one of these ear tags. This is to inform the wildlife shelters and rescues that a tagged bear has been harvested and they can update their files for educational purposes being that once a bear is released back into the wild, they generally never know how long one of their released bears has lived for or as to how far they may have travelled from the release site.

The Importance of a 9-1-1 Address

SAFE BOATING

LICENSING AND REGISTRATION

A Canadian pleasure craft may be licensed or registered.

Pleasure Craft Licence

If you operate or keep your boat mostly in Canada, and it is powered by one or more motors adding up to 7.5 kW (10 hp) or more, you must get it licensed, unless you register it. You must also license dinghies or tenders you carry aboard or tow behind a larger boat. Licence numbers need to be displayed in contrasting color, as close to the bow as possible, on both sides of the vessel.

A pleasure craft license is a free document giving your boat a unique license number that is valid for 10 years. The Pleasure Craft Licensing System allows Search and Rescue personnel to access information about your boat 24 hours a day, seven days a week in the event of an emergency. This could mean the difference between life and death! If your boat does not need a pleasure craft license, you can choose to get one for safety reasons. Failure to license your vessel, failure to have license on board, or allowing unlicensed vessel to be operated by another, may result in a fine of \$287.50 being issued.

Proof of Competency

Going out on the water requires basic boating safety knowledge and a good understanding of the "rules of the road" for Canadian waterways. That's why everyone who operates a motorized pleasure craft must carry proof of competency on board. This includes all types of motorized boats, no matter their size or horsepower of the engine (this includes small boats with electric motors.)

What are the Accepted Forms of Proof of Competency?

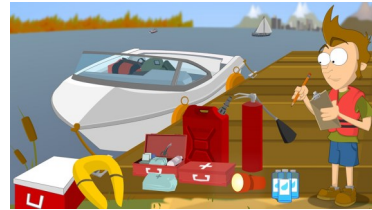
Proof of competency can be any of the following:

- a Pleasure Craft Operator Card;
- proof of having passed a boating safety course in Canada before April 1, 1999;
- a specified marine certificate; or
- a completed rental boat safety checklist (good only for rental period).

Operating a vessel without prescribed competency, failure to have proof of competency on board, or allowing a person without prescribed competency to operate vessel, may result in a fine of \$287.50 being issued.

Boat operators must insure they comply with all safety requirements and have all required safety equipment. Non-compliance with Canada Shipping Act and Small Vessel Regulations may result in fines being issued to the operator. As always, impaired operation of a vessel is a Criminal Offence. Visit www.tc.gc.ca for complete information on all requirements related to licensing and safety equipment.

July at the Hudson's Hope Museum



Summer is in full swing at the Museum; all the heritage flowers are starting to bloom, and the cabins are open for visitors!

This month's article will be a bit different as it is dedicated to **Dave Kylo** - A living historian and jack of all trades.

Dave Kylo may have been born in Vancouver but has called Hudson's Hope Home for most of his 87 years. He grew up on the banks of the Peace River, with his three brothers - a wild and memorable upbringing. He drove truck for the Oil and Gas industry, worked as a driller during the construction of the WAC Bennet Dam, a Rancher and an Outfitter as one of the owners of Kylo

Brother's Outfitters. Dave took hunters, adventurers, and scientists up the river (and Lake) by boat, horse, truck and plane. He was also the treasurer for the Northern BC Guides for many years. Dave and his wife Margaret raised their four girls in Hudson's Hope (Beryl Prairie), but moved back into town in 1997. They also bought a motorhome in 1976 and have never stopped exploring since.



Dave has spent countless hours volunteering his time around our small community. Every year he's volunteered at the museum helping with building



maintenance and display construction and creation. He has been an active member of the Hudson's Hope Historical Society for many years, and an integral part of the reconstruction of the Rutledge building in 2016-18. He also helped move and reconstruct the Peck House, MacDonald Cabin and Machine shed and the other buildings on the grounds in the mid 70's.

Each year Dave has also spent time maintaining the Portage, Steam-vents, and many other trails around town. Each year he will head out and hike them (sometimes on his quad) with his weed-wacker and chainsaw - making sure that they are cleared and walkable - he also makes and upkeep the signs for the trails.

On a personal note, for the last ten years Dave has been my go-to man. When my history books couldn't help me, I could always ask Dave and if he didn't have the answer he would do his best to find out. He is the most dependable, sweet and knowledgeable man who is always quietly helping out. I am so thankful to have been able to work alongside him for the last decade! I wish him and Margaret well on their next adventure! They will be missed!

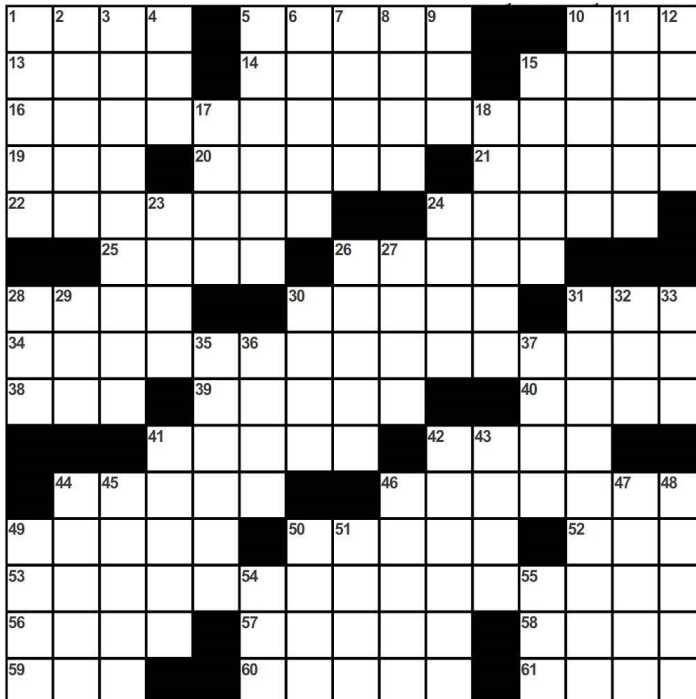

Children can only sign up for one group due to COVID prevention regulations as well as the program on Wednesday and Thursday will be the exact same program.

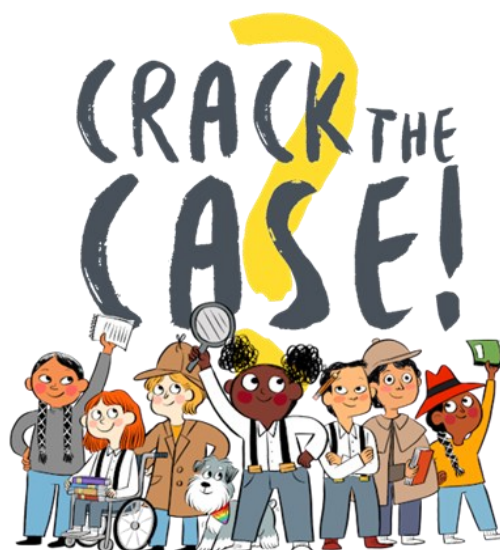

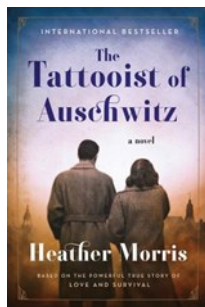


me know if you are interested and what time would work best for you! I am more than happy to work around a time that accommodates the majority of our teens.

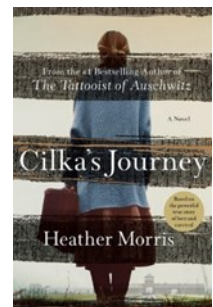

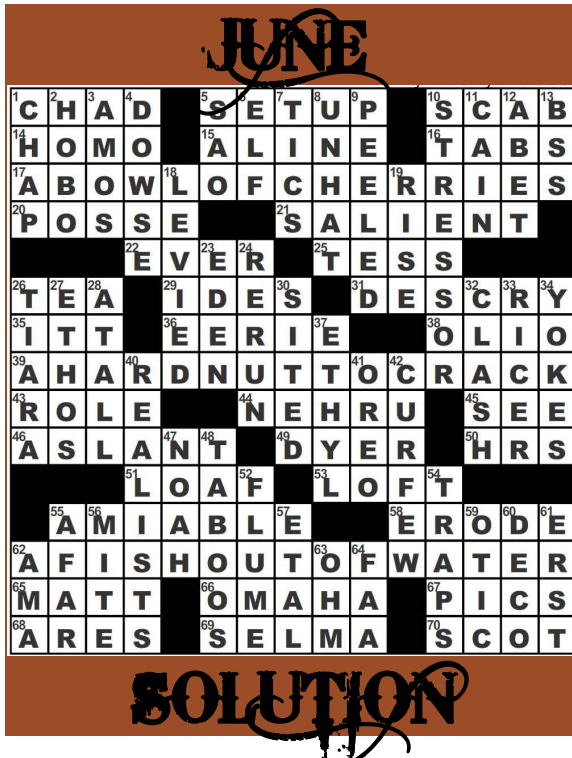

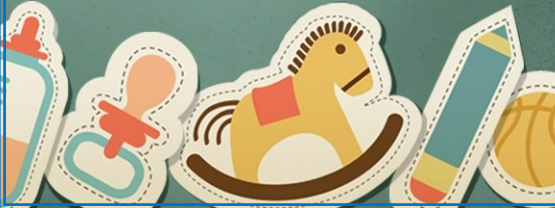
