

Homeowner Information to Building Permits

The District of Hudson's Hope wants to assist homeowners and contractors to avoid unnecessary delays and expense in planning and construction of residential projects. Below explains when permits are required, requirements for the permit, possible other documents that may be required and other information to assist you in obtaining your building permit. Additional information is available at the District Office or online at www.hudsonshope.ca

A BUILDING PERMIT IS REQUIRED TO:

- construct a new home;
- •locate mobile / modular home;
- construct a commercial, industrial or public use building;
- •construct a new accessory building e.g., carport, farm building, garage or storage shed;
- renovate existing buildings;
- •undertake any structural work such as interior partitions;
- enclose a porch or roof over a sundeck;
- •move or demolish a building;
- •re-roof a building;
- •reconstruct after damage;
- plumbing system changes;

INFORMATION TO BE SUBMITTED WITH A BUILDING PERMIT APPLICATION

The following items must be supplied along with a completed Building Permit Application before a Building Permit can be issued. A Building Permit fee is based on the value of the building or structure and will be calculated by the Building Official.


1. BUILDING PLANS


Two sets of detailed building plans. If you cannot draw the necessary building or site plans, then you should obtain the services of a qualified person.

Example Floor Plans

- scale not less than 1:50 metric (1/4 inch to 1 foot);
- size and location of windows and doors;
- location of all plumbing fixtures;
- location of all mechanical equipment.

- all rooms, size and use of each;
- all dimensions;
- finished and unfinished areas; —





2. SITE PLAN

- full legal description of lot: lot number, plan number; district lot number (from your tax notice or Title);
- lot dimensions;
- adjoining street names;
- locations and uses of existing and proposed buildings or additions;
- distances from all property lines for existing and proposed buildings or additions;
- location of legal road access to the property;
- size, location and number of parking spaces;
- existing and proposed wells or other water sources;
- location of existing or proposed sewage disposal fields on property;
- location of any watercourses on property showing distances from existing or proposed buildings or additions;

This information is intended to assist the general public in applying for a Building Permit within the District of Hudson's Hope.

BUILDING INSPECTIONS (Typical)

The Building Bylaw requires inspections at the following stages of construction;

- Footings prior to pouring concrete.
- Backfilling after completion of damp-proofing, drain tile, and drain rock (if required), but prior to backfilling.
- Plumbing before any part of the plumbing system is covered.
- Framing after the entire rough-in plumbing, electrical and mechanical equipment is installed and the framing is completed to lockup stage, but prior to insulating.
- Insulation and Vapour Barrier after all insulation and vapour barriers are installed, but prior to covering.
- Final when the building or portion thereof is completed and ready for occupancy, but prior to occupancy thereof.

An Occupancy Certificate is required prior to occupancy of a building. In order for an Occupancy Certificate to be issued, all inspections above must be approved.



Police Report: March 2022



Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to 19 calls for service between January 19th and February 16th, 2022. 44 written violations and warning tickets were issued to drivers between the above dates for various motor vehicle related offences. Highway and road safety continues to be a focus for the Hudson's Hope RCMP.

Please make note of the numerous construction sites along Hwy 29 toward Fort St. John. Due to the increase of work sites along the highway, there is a large fluctuation between the speed zones for each site. Police will be monitoring these areas as they are a posted construction zone and fines will range from \$196.00 to \$253.00 for speeding violations within a marked construction zone.

On January 20th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of an online fraud in which an individual purchased an item via the Facebook Market Place and upon paying for the item via e-transfer, they later discovered the sale to be fictitious and fraudulent, resulting in no receivement of the paid for item.

Online frauds and scams have become very prevalent over the past couple of years and police advise the public to thoroughly research and confirm proof of items prior to purchase.

Individuals can visit the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre website at: www.antifraudcentre.ca or phone: 1-800-495-8501, to seek advice on where to report, depending on the scam.

On January 25th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a drone that was observed flying over several properties in town. Upon investigation, it was found that a company that is conducting work along the river for the BC Hydro Dam projects, has been utilizing a drone to conduct aerial surveys of specific areas. It was confirmed that the drone operators are following specific regulations and flight plans in accordance with Transport Canada.

On February 6th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP were advised to a report of a dog being shot on a private property along Canyon Dr. Upon the investigation, it was found that a small dog had been shot and killed with a small calibre round for unknown reasons by an unknown individual(s). At this time, police are still investigating the incident and if anyone has any information pertaining to this crime, they can contact the Hudson's Hope RCMP Detachment or anonymously through Crime Stoppers.

On February 14th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a dog attack on a deer. It was reported that an individual witnessed an unknown German Shepherd type dog, mauling a young deer in town. Police were unable to locate the suspect canine but later located the injured deer and she was dealt with accordingly. As per the Hudson's Hope Bylaws: Control of Dogs,

- No dog owner shall permit any dog to be at large,
- No dog owner shall cause, permit or allow his or her dog to cause damage to the property of another person,
- No dog owner shall take or allow any dog onto any public beaches, swimming areas, parks, or school grounds unless the applicable areas have been designated and posted as "dogs on leash allowed",
- No dog owner shall allow or permit any dog to harass or chase wildlife.

Fines for the above contraventions can range from \$60.00 to \$120.00 if fined.



Monthly Police ha ha:

A rookie police officer was out for his first patrol in a cruiser with an experienced officer when a call came in for a report of an unauthorized gathering of people on a local street corner. All eager to conduct his first police investigation, the rookie drove down the street and observed a small crowd of people standing on a street corner. 

"Beaton, Frank"

On October 3, 1898, Hudson's Bay factor Frank Beaton and his family left for the Hudson's Hope outpost. Winter had come early and surely Frank and his family must have experienced great hardships during this first winter at the outpost. After Mr. Beaton

spent one winter as the factor of the post at Hudson's Hope, he realized that the post would be better situated on the other side of the river at the end of Portage Trail because more trade would result. In 1899, the store on the south side of the river was dismantled and the logs floated across the Peace River to the north side and rebuilt. That same year, the Hudson's Bay Company sent in a surveyor and seven acres of land was surveyed and recorded. Eventually, the Hudson's Bay Company land was sold to the Fellowship of the West for \$1.00 on which the St. Peter's Anglican church was built. Also, land was sold to the Hudson's Hope Historical Society on which the Museum was set up, and land was acquired by the Department of Highways for the highway.







Our library adheres to communicable disease prevention guidance from WorkSafeBC and have a COVID-19 Safety Plan in place.

Pay special attention to provincial health orders to avoid any confusion or disappointment with our regulations upon entry to the library. As per provincial guidance, in the case of a community outbreak or exposure event, we may need to implement stronger restrictions at any time.

In accordance with provincial guidance, masks are mandatory while visiting indoor public spaces for anyone 5 and older. This is also required for people attending our programs, children ages 5 and older as well as any adults attending with them. Proof of vaccination currently required for adults attending library programming.

An additional reminder to show kindness to our staff as we may not be able to immediately downgrade our communicable disease prevention strategies. This is due to ongoing medical concerns of the staff. We thank you for your patience and understanding.

Cognitive Care Kits: We have received two cognitive care kits from Northern Health! These are lendable cognitive care kits (vitality/activity kits) to caregivers/library patrons in the community.
