Police Report: May/June 2022



Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to 37 calls for service between May 20th, 2022 to June 17th, 2022. 41 written violations and warning tickets were issued to drivers between the above dates for various motor vehicle related offences. Highway and road safety continues to be a focus for the Hudson's Hope RCMP.

Please make note of the numerous construction sites along Hwy 29, between Hudson's Hope and Fort St. John. Due to the increase of work sites along the highway, there is a large fluctuation between the speed zones for each site. Police will be monitoring these areas as they are a posted construction zone and fines will range from \$196.00 to \$253.00 for speeding violations within a marked construction zone.

The Hudson's Hope RCMP would also like to remind drivers that with summer just around the corner, the use of studded winter tires is prohibited between May 1st to September 30th of each year. Driving with studded tires during those times can result in a fine of \$109.00. As of note, studded tires on the dry asphalt makes a loud and distinctive noise that catches the ear of nearby police!

On May 20th, 2022, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received several complaints regarding ATV's and other ORV's (off-road vehicles) that were driving erratically throughout the Dinosaur Lake Campground area. Police attended the area several times throughout the May long weekend and issued several violation tickets and warnings to riders who were found to be operating their ORV's in contravention of the ORV Act.

On May 20th, 2022, during a routine traffic check-stop along Hwy 29, the Hudson's Hope RCMP stopped a motorist who was believed to be under the influence of alcohol. Upon a breathalyser test, the driver was confirmed to be under the influence of alcohol and was subsequently charged for driving while impaired.

On May 20th, 2022, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of threats against a person at the Dinosaur Lake Campground area. Based on the investigation, police located and arrested the suspect who was later charged for Uttering Threats and was provided a court date.

On May 26th, 2022, the Hudson's Hope RCMP attended a residence along Beryl Prairie Rd. for a residential property fire. Upon arrival, police found the local Fire De-

partment attempting to control and extinguish the fire which had spread throughout the property and engulfed several vehicles and outbuildings. No injuries or damages were incurred to any persons or surrounding residences and the cause of the fire was a result of the home owner burning off grass which got out of control.

On May 29th, 2022, the Hudson's Hope RCMP stopped a motorist along Hwy 29 after their vehicle was clocked at doing 49km/hr over the posted speed limit through a construction zone. The driver received a fine of \$368.00 for Excessive Speed and the complimentary 7 day impound of their vehicle.

On June 8th, 2022, the Hudson's Hope RCMP stopped a motorist along Beattie Dr. after their vehicle was clocked at doing 73km/hr over the posted speed limit through the local marked school zone. The driver received a fine of \$483.00 for Excessive Speed and the complimentary 7 day impound of their vehicle. Excessive Speed is dictated as exceeding the posted speed limit by (tier one) 41 – 60km/hr, which comes with a fine of \$368.00 and an automatic 7 day impound of the vehicle, while (tier two), more than 60km/hr over the posted speed limit, comes with a fine of \$483.00 and an automatic 7 day impound of the vehicle.

On June 16th, 2022, during a rainy and dreary Wednesday morning, Cst. SCHMIDT received a call for two deer that had fallen into a local lagoon and were unable to get themselves out. With the help of his beautiful sidekick (wife), who was attached to the end of a lasso so she didn't end up taking a dip into the merky depths of the green lagoon herself, and a couple personnel from the District of Hudson's Hope, they were able to get the amphibious deer to the edge of the banks where one of the rescuers used her trusty lasso and snagged the waterlogged and tired ungulates. With a heave 'n a ho...onto dry land they found themselves, rescued from the dark depths of Davy Jones Locker! The buck was kicking and bucking immediately and ran off, whereas the doe, who was beyond exhausted, took a little while longer to shed her sea legs. In the end, both the deer made a full recovery and learnt this day, that one should never drink from the green water!

Homeowner Information to Building Permits

The District of Hudson's Hope wants to assist homeowners and contractors to avoid unnecessary delays and expense in planning and construction of residential projects. Below explains when permits are required, requirements for the permit, possible other documents that may be required and other information to assist you in obtaining your building permit. Additional information is available at the District Office or online at www.hudsonshope.ca

A BUILDING PERMIT IS REQUIRED TO:

- construct a new home;
- locate mobile / modular home;
- construct a commercial, industrial or public use building;
- construct a new accessory building e.g., carport, farm building, garage or storage shed;
- renovate existing buildings;
- undertake any structural work such as interior partitions;
- enclose a porch or roof over a sundeck;
- move or demolish a building;
- re-roof a building;
- reconstruct after damage;
- plumbing system changes;

INFORMATION TO BE SUBMITTED WITH A BUILDING PERMIT APPLICATION

The following items must be supplied along with a completed Building Permit Application before a Building Permit can be issued. A Building Permit fee is based on the value of the building or structure and will be calculated by the Building Official.


1. BUILDING PLANS


Two sets of detailed building plans. If you cannot draw the necessary building or site plans, then you should obtain the services of a qualified person.

Example Floor Plans

- scale not less than 1:50 metric (1/4 inch to 1 foot);
- size and location of windows and doors;
- location of all plumbing fixtures;
- location of all mechanical equipment.

- all rooms, size and use of each;
- all dimensions;
- finished and unfinished areas; —





2. SITE PLAN

- full legal description of lot: lot number, plan number; district lot number (from your tax notice or Title);
- lot dimensions:
- adjoining street names;
- locations and uses of existing and proposed buildings or additions;
- distances from all property lines for existing and proposed buildings or additions;
- location of legal road access to the property;
- size, location and number of parking spaces;
- existing and proposed wells or other water sources;
- location of existing or proposed sewage disposal fields on property;
- location of any watercourses on property showing distances from existing or proposed buildings or additions;

This information is intended to assist the general public in applying for a Building Permit within the District of Hudson's Hope.

DRIVEWAY CROSSING EXISTING BUILDING ADDITION SUNDECK SEPTIC LANE SCALE:

BUILDING INSPECTIONS (Typical)

The Building Bylaw requires inspections at the following stages of construction;

- Footings prior to pouring concrete.
- Backfilling after completion of damp-proofing, drain tile, and drain rock (if required), but prior to backfilling.
- Plumbing before any part of the plumbing system is covered.
- Framing after the entire rough-in plumbing, electrical and mechanical equipment is installed and the framing is completed to lockup stage, but prior to insulating.
- Insulation and Vapour Barrier after all insulation and vapour barriers are installed, but prior to covering.
- Final when the building or portion thereof is completed and ready for occupancy, but prior to occupancy thereof.

An Occupancy Certificate is required prior to occupancy of a building. In order for an Occupancy Certificate to be issued, all inspections above must be approved.





Welcome to the Hudson's Hope Museum

"Jim Beattie"



Jim Beattie

Early 1914, Jim Beattie arrived with a party of 7 men with teams of horses. They passed through the settlement of Hudson's Hope on their way to the Omineca, where they hoped to find large quantities of Gold. The portage was too narrow for their teams so they spent some time widening it before they could cross. That fall, Jim Beattie and Billy Hill returned to Hudson's Hope with their teams of horses via the Laurier Pass as there was no ice on the river. Jim's plan was to start a freighting service across the portage.

Mrs. Jim Beattie arrived in 1914. She came downriver via Crooked River from Prince

George. As she crossed the portage, she was told that she was the first white woman who passed this way. This same year, Mr. & Mrs. Jim Beattie had their first child, the first white baby born in the settlement.

In 1919, Mr. and Mrs. Beattie moved to 20 mile (20 miles above the head of the canyon) where later it was named "Gold Bar". It was here that they built a prosperous grain & cattle farm and raised their family. Jim was often away, trapping, freighting and he was "Justice of the Peace". While he was away, Mrs. Beattie and the children tended to the farm.

As their family grew up and moved away from the farm, many of which stayed in the area, Jim passed away. Mrs. Beattie and the twins stayed and worked the farm at Gold Bar until the construction and subsequent flooding of WAC Bennett Dam. Mrs. Beattie moved into Hudson's Hope. Their valuable farm and many years of hard work now lies beneath Williston Lake






SAFE BOATING

LICENSING AND REGISTRATION

A Canadian pleasure craft may be licensed or registered.

Pleasure Craft Licence

If you operate or keep your boat mostly in Canada, and it is powered by one or more motors adding up to 7.5 kW (10 hp)



A pleasure craft license is a free document giving your boat a unique license number that is valid for 10 years. The Pleasure Craft Licensing System allows Search and Rescue personnel to access information about your boat 24 hours a day, seven days a week in the event of an emergency. This could mean the difference between life and death! If your boat does not need a pleasure craft license, you can choose to get one for safety reasons. Visit http://www.tc.gc.ca/eng/marinesafety/debs-obs-paperwork-paperwork_boat_licence-3212.htm, or call 1-800-267-6687 for more info.

Failure to license your vessel, failure to have license on board, or allowing unlicensed vessel to be operated by another, may result in a fine of \$287.50 being issued.

Proof of Competency

Going out on the water requires basic boating safety knowledge and a good understanding of the "rules of the road" for Canadian waterways. That's why everyone who operates a motorized pleasure craft must carry proof of competency on board. This includes all types of motorized boats, no matter their size or horsepower of the engine (this includes small boats with electric motors.)

What are the Accepted Forms of Proof of Competency? Proof of competency can be any of the following:

- a Pleasure Craft Operator Card;
- proof of having passed a boating safety course in Canada before April 1, 1999;
- a specified marine certificate; or
- a completed rental boat safety checklist (good only for rental period).

Operating a vessel without prescribed competency, failure to have proof of competency on board, or allowing a person without prescribed competency to operate vessel, may result in a fine of \$287.50 being issued.

Boat operators must insure they comply with all safety requirements and have all required safety equipment. Non-compliance with Canada Shipping Act and Small Vessel Regulations may result in fines being issued to the operator. As always, impaired operation of a vessel is a Criminal Offence. Visit www.tc.gc.ca for complete information on all requirements related to licensing and safety equipment.

CARELESS RECYCLING CAN KILL TO RECYCLEBE



THE PROBLEM

Putting explosive and hazardous materials in your packaging and paper recycling bin is dangerous and can have life they don't end up in -threatening implications. BC's major recycling collectors and processors saw an increase in fires in 2019, with several of them having endangered lives and forced the temporary closure of facilities. Hazardous waste like propane canisters, lithium-ion batteries included in cell phones and laptops, and other items can catch fire or explode during the recycling process, turning a regular household item into a deadly weapon. Please dispose of hazardous items properly.



HAZARDOUS ITEMS

Hazardous items like these can cause serious harm to recycling staff and facilities. Ensure your recycling bin:

•Propane canisters ·Needles .Flammable liquids .Helium tanks .Knives .Cell phones and laptops (lithium-ion batteries) .Butane canisters Bear spray Ammunition .Flares .Electronics Batteries for e-cigarettes Lighters and matches .Household batteries .Paint

WHY IS THERE SUCH A RISK?

The risk for fires or explosions is especially high for material collection vehicles and receiving facilities due to the presence of significant amounts of paper. The combination of easily

flammable material, the type of machinery used, plenty of oxygen and large amounts of material sorted into piles where sparks can smolder for lengthy periods of time undetected makes the presence of hazardous material especially precarious.
