Police Report May/June 2023



The Hudson's Hope RCMP responded to 45 calls for service between July $21^{\rm st}$ to August $22^{\rm nd}$. 39 written violations and warning tickets were issued to drivers between the above dates for various motor vehicle related offences. Highway and road safety continues to be a focus for the Hudson's Hope RCMP.

On July 22nd, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received a report of a stolen vehicle from the area of Miller Rd / Hwy 29. It was reported that a grey Chevy Equinox had been stolen from the work site at around 15:45hrs. No suspects observed at the time, but the stolen vehicle was later observed heading toward Fort St. John but was unable to be located by police. This file remains open for investigation.

On July 31st, the Hudson's Hope RCMP conducted a search of a residence along Fredette Ave., after it was confirmed that individuals had squatted within the vacant residence and left property and items behind. Upon the search, police located and seized 5x firearms, thousands of illegal cigarettes, drugs and drug paraphernalia, and several other weapons defined by the Criminal Code. All these items were seized for public safety, being that the residence is vacant and was assessible to the general public. This file remains open for investigation.

On August 6th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP assisted the BC Conservation Services with a joint agency check-stop along Hwy 29. During the check-stop, several motorists were stopped and checked for various Motor Vehicle Act safety topics and as result, 2x prohibited drivers were located and subsequently charged.

On August 18th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP stopped a motorist after their truck had been observed driving over the curbs and lawn of the Hudson's Hope school parking lot, and later observed contravening several Motor Vehicle Act offences as it travelled throughout the town. Based on the investigation, the driver was detained for being impaired while in operation of a motor vehicle and later failed the road-side sobriety test. The driver was served a 90-day driving prohibition with their vehicle

being impounded for 30-days. The driver received further several violation tickets for Motor Vehicle Act offences.

On August 19th, the Hudson's Hope RCMP received several complaints for 5-6x ORV's (side x sides) that were observed driving erratically throughout the Dinosaur Lake campground and ATV campground area. Police attended scene but were unable to locate the ORV's as they had already left the area prior to police arriving on-scene. Though this area holds a designated ATV campground and only one access to the lake, caution should be exercised when operating an ATV/ORV in this public area due to the presence of public and children along the road ways and paths. The Hudson's Hope RCMP is working with the District of Hudson's Hope to get more visible signage in the area to hopefully restrict the usage of ATV's/ORV's along the high-volume public areas in which many tourists and visitors frequent.

As everyone within Hudson's Hope is well aware of, this season has provided the town with a high volume of furry, fruit seeking bears, in which the RCMP and BC Conservation Services have received many a call on. Enforcement agencies have been working steadily to monitor and mange the situation as best as can. The residents and property owners of Hudson's Hope, are being asked to do their part in this management and remove as many attractants as possible from their properties, so to limit the need for one of these bears to pay them a visit. Homeowner Information to Building Permits

The District of Hudson's Hope wants to assist homeowners and contractors to avoid unnecessary delays and expense in planning and construction of residential projects. Below explains when permits are required, requirements for the permit, possible other documents that may be required and other information to assist you in obtaining your building permit. Additional information is available at the District Office or online at www.hudsonshope.ca

A BUILDING PERMIT IS REQUIRED TO:

- construct a new home;
- locate mobile / modular home;
- construct a commercial, industrial or public use building;
- construct a new accessory building e.g., carport, farm building, garage or storage shed;
- renovate existing buildings;
- undertake any structural work such as interior partitions;
- enclose a porch or roof over a sundeck;
- move or demolish a building;
- re-roof a building;
- · reconstruct after damage;
- plumbing system changes;

INFORMATION TO BE SUBMITTED WITH A BUILDING PERMIT APPLICATION

The following items must be supplied along with a completed Building Permit Application before a Building Permit can be issued. A Building Permit fee is based on the value of the building or structure and will be calculated by the Building Official.

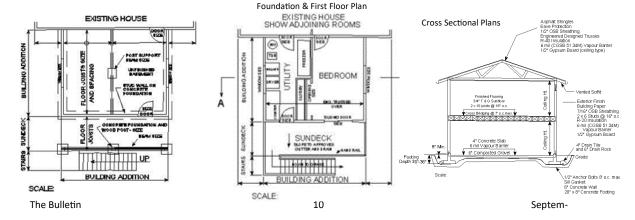
1. BUILDING PLANS

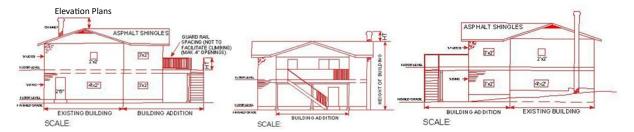
Two sets of detailed building plans. If you cannot draw the necessary building or site plans, then you should obtain the services of a qualified person.

Example Floor Plans

- scale not less than 1:50 metric (1/4 inch to 1 foot);
- size and location of windows and doors;
- location of all plumbing fixtures;
- location of all mechanical equipment.

- all rooms, size and use of each;
- all dimensions;
- finished and unfinished areas; —





2. SITE PLAN

- full legal description of lot: lot number, plan number; district lot number (from your tax notice or Title);
- lot dimensions:
- adjoining street names;
- locations and uses of existing and proposed buildings or additions;
- distances from all property lines for existing and proposed buildings or additions;
- location of legal road access to the property;
- size, location and number of parking spaces;
- existing and proposed wells or other water sources;
- location of existing or proposed sewage disposal fields on property;
- location of any watercourses on property showing distances from existing or proposed buildings or additions;

This information is intended to assist the general public in applying for a Building Permit within the District of Hudson's Hope.

BUILDING INSPECTIONS (Typical)

The Building Bylaw requires inspections at the following stages of construction;

- Footings prior to pouring concrete.
- Backfilling after completion of damp-proofing, drain tile, and drain rock (if required), but prior to backfilling.
- Plumbing before any part of the plumbing system is covered.
- Framing after the entire rough-in plumbing, electrical and mechanical equipment is installed and the framing is completed to lockup stage, but prior to insulating.
- Insulation and Vapour Barrier after all insulation and vapour barriers are installed, but prior to covering.
- Final when the building or portion thereof is completed and ready for occupancy, but prior to occupancy thereof.

An Occupancy Certificate is required prior to occupancy of a building. In order for an Occupancy Certificate to be issued, all inspections above must be approved.

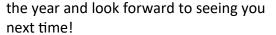
Trinity and Cassidy: thank you both for all your hard work. And some extra thanks for always giving me a laugh on the slow days!

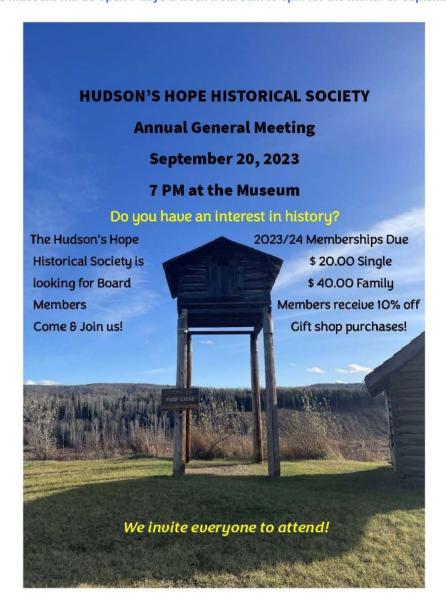

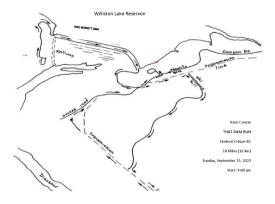

Hello Hudson's Hope!

It was my initial intent to support communication when I got into council and it's easy to get lost in the work. The recent All Candidates Forum reminded me of people's desire to have updates and so I wanted to provide one!

This list definitely doesn't cover everything that has been reviewed, debated, discussed, and decided, but here are some of the high-lights since I have joined council. Some main issues that council has been working through in council meetings:

Water Treatment Plant - the district has bi-weekly meetings concerning the Water Treatment Plant. District staff has been working incredibly hard to provide consistent water services to the community and to meet the northern health guidelines to finally remove our boil water advisory. Council has worked to support the process, to move the progress of the treatment plant from aquifer to surface water, and to provide communication to the public. The next steps of the process is to develop the plan, support, communication, and complete the permanent water treatment plant.

There has been turnover of senior staff in the district since the council was inaugurated in November of 2022. Council is supporting the development of the team, including the addition of the Deputy Chief role. This new role was created to support and increase retention for the Fire Chief (Director of Protective Services). This role is also expected to provide additional support to municipal bylaws.

Council only has one employee that they manage (the Chief Administrative Officer- CAO). As the previous CAO tendered their resignation in June, we have an interim CAO (Chris Cvik) who will be filling the role and has worked with the district previously. An advisory committee which includes the mayor (Travous Quibell), two councillors (Tashana Winnicky and Tina Jeffrey) and the interim CAO will conduct phone interviews and in-person interviews. This designated group will provide a recommendation concerning filling the position

to council. (Note: This recommendation will be done in-camera as it deals with personnel.)

Understanding local government of course takes time and I have jumped right in working to understand the process as soon as possible. This has included:

- -I have attended all council meetings to date (16 or so since inauguration).
- -Attending a two day orientation for new council and mayor members in Dawson Creek.
- -Attended a full day meeting to review district financials prior to council approval.
- -Attended one half day and one full day meetings for strategic planning. This was to develop the four year strategic goals utilized by the district staff, which was also presented to the public for input before being finalized.
- -Attended a full day orientation in community infrastructure including the pool, three sewage lift stations, solar panel arrays, district shop, municipal lagoon, water storage, and the water treatment plant.
- -Attended a two day conference for the North Central Local Government Association (NCLGA). Worked to develop relationships with other communities in the region. At this conference, all present members vote on motions that are put forward by different councils of the region. If passed, these motions are submitted and voted at the Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) conference. If the motions are passed there, UBCM will lobby for those motions to the provincial government.
- -Attended a strategic meeting for the Northern Community Lights College (NCLC). I followed up with their director to get more resources for Hudson's Hope. I organized a meeting in Hudson's Hope with their CEO and five other representatives, and the district/council, and opened it to members of the public. This was to discuss the needs, ideas and opportunities for Hudson's Hope for post secondary options and support in town.

I was designated as Acting Mayor for two months, which included supporting communication to the public, chairing four council meetings, presenting the district gifts to the 2023 graduates, preparing/delivering the opening speech for Canada Day, attending bi-weekly meetings with the CAO, and attending the Regional Community Liaison Committee (RCLC).

The RCLC meeting was a full day meeting which included a tour of the lodge facility of Site C and the Site C facility itself. The lodge facility will be put out to bid to be purchased and can accommodate approximately 1700 individuals. There was discussions that this facility could be used as an addiction support facility or social housing. There are many potential opportunities for this to benefit the region but the direction is not currently defined as it is very early in the process. I also vocalized concern over the unstable geology beneath the dam.

Council includes a variety of committees:

I was designated to the Student Councillor committee which has a grade 11 or 12 student join in on council meetings. The student works to develop a student council and provide input from the youth perspective. In return, a scholarship is provided from the district.

Became the chair of the Recreation Facility committee which is subdivided into two committees: one for the Pool and one for the Community Hall/Recreation Centre. For this committee, several meetings have been held.

A Terms of Reference was developed and committee members selected. Meetings included the review of the history of the committee, identifying next steps, and review of terms of reference. An RFP (Request for Proposal) was historically developed and approved by the previous council. This was provided to the subcommittee for review and approval. Once completed, direction will be submitted to council.

The goal is the release of the Request for Proposal (RFP) for bid beforehand to gain an architectural firm that can provide three options for a new recreation/community hall, and to help facilitate the public consultation process throughout all stages of the facility development to ensure it will be inclusive of public needs. I am a member of the Signs Committee which is chaired by Councillor Kelly Miller. We have had several meetings and ongoing discussions for the review and development of trail brochures for the community. Councillor Miller has also been working to address additional sign requirements for the community, such as for the new ATV campsite.

I was the council representative for the Council Remuneration Committee, which worked with a public member to provide recommendations back to council concerning compensation. The intent from the bylaw is that this be completed prior to the new council being in place, but unfortunately, it had been delayed.

Outside of Council, I try to represent where I can as well. For example, I attended the open house for the NPSCU. The CEO of Interior Savings and several representatives were there. I advocated for better services and pricing locally, including in-person support (reintroduction of tellers), lowering costs, and re-expanding bank services to properly support our locals.

I have greatly enjoyed learning about how local government works, helping to make sound choices on behalf of the community, and how I can advocate for our town's needs on a regional/provincial level. If you made it to the end of this extensive update, congratula-

tions on being invested in the com-

munity as well!!!

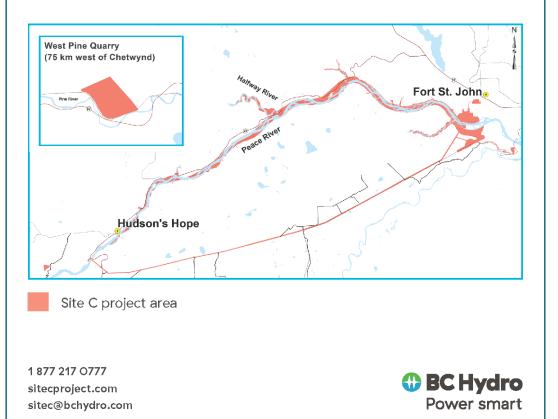


Do not hunt or discharge firearms in Site C project areas

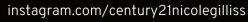
